FRITZ TREMBLES AT EACH BRITISH RAID

Fearing Tommies Will Add to Troubles by Driving, Boche Commanders Urge Caution.

With the British Armies in France, July 26.—Every British raid seems to start something like a panic in the sector where the kidnapping expedition occurs.
As the Tommies are busy man stealing the Germans are kept on needles and pins. Since the allies' counter offensive turned the crown prince's march on Paris into a harassing rear guard action, it is known that the enemy has spent many anxious moments.
Captured documents show the German high command is issuing order after order in an effort to stir its underlings to guard against surprise operations.
Further evidence has been obtained indicating the proposed offensive against the British may come soon, as Ludendorff is known to be under pressure from home to do something before his initiative is lost completely.

London, July 26.—British troops repulsed strong enemy attacks in the Hebuterne and Meteren sectors last night this morning, Field Marshal Haig reported.
"In the Hebuterne sector (Picardy front) yesterday evening, the enemy attacked our new positions under cover of a heavy barrage and was driven off with severe losses," the statement said.
"Early this morning a strong enemy local attack was repulsed in the neighborhood of Meteren. (Flanders front) after sharp fighting."
"During the night a party of our troops rushed a hostile machine gun post in the Merris sector."
"Hostile artillery has been active in the Somme valley and in the neighborhood of Boyelles."

bombardments are being directed on Fere-en-Tardenois, where the Germans' elaborate railway and highway system has been practically wiped out. The boches' losses in this region are staggering.

Pocket Is Narrowing
The tightening of the pocket about the crown prince's armies is increasing. While French, British and Italians are driving at the wings in the Soissons and Rheims regions, French and Americans are jamming in the sides, rendering the avenue of withdrawal narrower, the transport confusion greater and placing an additional expanse of roads and railroads under artillery fire.
The increasing number of fires in Fere-en-Tardenois and nearby villages apparently are from ammunition dumps and supply depots which the Germans are destroying because of their inability to remove them.
Meantime, refugees are beginning to return to the wrecked villages along the Marne, old men and children walking in the wake of the advancing Americans. High two-wheeled carts and baby carriages, filled with bedding and household goods, are mingling with the war traffic.
Devastation Is Terrible
Some refugees find their homes wiped out. Other houses are mere shells, with roofs torn off and walls pierced with shell holes. Crops are laid in waste. Wheat fields are dotted with dead men and horses and wreckage. In two months the Marne valley has been transformed from a beautiful, peaceful spot of wealth and plenty, into a scene of desolation, but here and there the old beauty is bravely standing out, where harvesting is being resumed.
Thrilling scenes of open warfare are constantly increasing. All the old ideas of trench fighting are demolished. Everything is now on the move. Mounted troops, armored cars, automobiles, guns, wagons and marching men fill the roads.
No unit has an established headquarters. Billeting places are camps besides the road, with the men sleeping on their arms. Ambulances and supply wagon drivers are working tirelessly day and night. Rolling kitchens are rushed up to supply hot food to any men appearing.

"My Four Years in Germany"

Ex-Ambassador James W. Gerard's "My Four Years in Germany" has found its way to the moving picture screen at last.
The success of this form of photography is emphasizing the intrigue and barbarism of which the Hun mind is capable was never more clearly displayed than in this picturization of Mr. Gerard's well known book.
The introduction of the various characters of the Kaiser's blood-thirsty official family is done with rare skill. The actors who portray the mad monarch, the Crown Prince and the others whose part in the despicable work is well known are men of skill and accomplishment. To the stage director there must be accorded a wide measure of praise, for the illusion is perfect and one gives scarcely a thought to the fact that it has been staged.
The first incident of importance is Mr. Gerard's arrival and the presentation of his credentials. Then comes what has since been known as the "Zabern affair," where a cowardly cavalry officer strikes down an aged beggar in the street.
The futile protest of the people against militarism is shown by the contempt with which their words are treated. This is followed by the speech of a socialist member of the reichstag and the sneering reply of those who believe in the Kaiser's infallibility.
More thrilling than all is the answer to the derisive words of the Germans. This is found in pictures of the soldiers of the allied nations and their indomitable courage and bravery. Pictures of their intrepid fighting and acts of daring cause the audience to applaud almost continuously.
The closing pictures of the American troops in action and the magnificent fighting of the Yankee boy who promised his "dad" that he would "get six Huns" brings forth tremendous shouts of approval.
This tremendous production in ten reels of absorbing interest will be seen in this city at the Eugene Theatre under managing direction of McDonald and Humphrey, Friday and Saturday.

Wilson and Oregon's representatives in congress urging the passage of legislation now pending which would make the nation dry.
A lively debate developed over whether the Synod should send a telegram to Congressman C. N. McArthur.
Edwan Rawden, superintendent of the Anti-Maloon league of Oregon stated that McArthur had advised him that he would not vote for the war emergency prohibition measure.
Some of the ministers stated that a message to McArthur would be wasting money.
Rev. Andrew J. Montgomery, of Portland, referred to a letter, which he had received from McArthur defending his stand, as "pusillanimous and little."
Dr. John H. Boyd, pastor of the First Presbyterian church in Portland, made a motion to send McArthur a telegram.
"The smaller the bullet the better the marksmanship and I move we take a shot at McArthur," he said.

BOCHE FEAR TEMPER OF YANKEE FIGHTERS

German Prisoner Says Cause of Huns Lost if All Americans Battle Alike.

Field, July 25.—(Night)—"If all the American army has the same temper, the German cause is lost," a German officer prisoner told his French captors today.
The officer said a German attack planned late in June, in the region of the Oure, was called off because of the manner in which the Americans there previously had fought.
Further evidence that the crown prince's offensive was held out to the Germans as a peace offensive was found on a placard in an evacuated trench, addressed to the French troops and signed by a German infantry corporal. It declared that England is using France to protect herself while America, fearing Japan, fought to earn England's support. But the chief argument was that the

German advance was irresistible, that Paris would soon be taken and that France should not delay peace by continuing to fight.

Italian Victor in First After-Night Duel in Air

Rome, July 26.—The first successful night duel between airplanes has been fought and victory won by an Italian aviator whose name is withheld, it was stated here today.
Tuesday night this Italian flyer attacked an Austrian bombing squadron in the moonlight. One machine was downed and fell in Treviso, both occupants of the machine being wounded and made prisoner. The Italian turned his gun on another plane, which also crashed down near Caposile and both occupants were drowned.

88 CASUALTIES LISTED

Killed in action 21, died of wounds 4, died of disease 6, wounded severely 60, missing in action 6, prisoner 1.

JAPAN ACCEPTS PROPOSAL
London, July 26.—Japan has decided to accept the American proposal to assist the Czechs in Siberia, an agency despatch said today.
