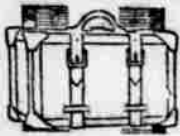
Back from Newport—

Ruch to Get Transfer—

Giles M. Ruch, former instructor in the University school of education, who recently went to Fort McDowell, Cal., with a party of drafted men, will be transferred to the medical corps of the United States army and attached to the psychological service, according to a telegram received yesterday by Dr. E. Father Lane Not Coming—

The Albany Herald denies the report that Father Lane, of Albany, will come to Eugene to succeed Father Moran as pastor of St. Mary's Catholic church. The paper states: "When Father Lane was asked about moving to Eugene late Tuesday he stated that there was nothing to it." The paper states: "Father Lane explained that the priests are given their church appointments by the archbishop but that the priest is consulted regarding a change and accepts before it becomes effective. Father Lane stated that Archbishop Christie, who has charge of the western portion of the state, had not mentioned the change to Eugene to him and that it was absolutely untrue that he was to go to Eugene."

Woolen Mill Gets Machinery—

Six new looms for weaving woolen material, shipped from Worcester, Mass., have arrived at the plant of the Eugene Woolen Mills company and will be installed within the next few weeks. The looms will replace old ones now in use and are expected to facilitate production at the plant. A new 150-horse power motor has been ordered and will be used for supplying emergency power. Two small motors and a steam engine are now used for this purpose. Under normal conditions the power for the mills is supplied from the millrace, which has now been closed for several weeks as a result of the washing out of a dam, which had apparently been tampered with.

Grannis Goes to Presidio—

Frank L. Grannis, of Marshfield, passed through Eugene Monday on his way to the cadet officers' training camp at Presidio, California, where he will receive instruction in military science. Mr. Grannis, who was recently elected as a member of the faculty of the Eugene high school, will be one of two members of the faculty members who will take the course provided by the war department in fitting themselves to act as instructors of the high school cadets during the coming school year.
