STRIFE ON INCREASE AMONG HUN NATIONS

Reports Say Germany and Austria Unable to Agree as to Disposition of Poland.

London, July 31.—A strife among the central powers appears to be increasing. Rigidly censored German despatches and comment heard through neutral sources show that Austria and Germany find it impossible to agree on the Polish question.

This is extremely interesting, following as it does, recent reports that the Turks and Germans had severed relations. The Turks and the Bulgarians are still deadlocked over the Dobruja situation.

Feeling is reported running high in Sofia and Constantinople. The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger, foreseeing a possible danger of strife developing urges all to halt their dissensions. Otherwise, the newspaper says, "what we have so far managed to gain probably will be lost."

Germans Threaten Reprisals for Raids on Austrian Towns

Berne, July 31.—Threats of air raid reprisals against the Italians for attacks on Austrian towns, are contained in an interview with Vice Admiral von Nagybanya, published in the Pester Lloyd today.

"The Italians ought to desist from raiding Pola, Trieste and towns along the Dalmatian coast," he said. "If they don't we are determined on reprisals." Raids on Venice are hinted at in the interview.

SALVAGE OF CANADA MARU IS UNDER WAY

Preparations Being Made to Save Liner Wrecked on Washington Coast Tuesday.

Seattle, Wash., July 31.—Immediate preparations are under way to salvage the Oenka Shosen Kaisha passenger liner Canada Maru, which grounded on the Washington coast yesterday, one mile south of Cape Flattery, with 176 passengers aboard and one of the most valuable silk cargoes that ever crossed the Pacific ocean.

The latest wireless despatches from the Canada Maru say the passengers and mail have been transferred to the steamship Galiano and are being landed at Neah bay. The crew is still aboard the vessel, which is taking water.

According to Captain Y. Yamamoto, the crew and cargo are in no danger if the present calm weather holds, but the ship is in a precarious position should a storm arise.

The United States coast guard steamer Snohomish is standing by in case of emergency.

The tug Milwaukee, of the Chicago-Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway company, with several scows was scheduled to arrive off Cape Flattery early today to lighten the vessel by removing part of the cargo.

The United States marine training ship Itasca left Seattle harbor last night with a regular crew and 150 marine recruits to assist in taking off the passengers and crew. The Canadian salvage steamer Salvor is scheduled to arrive at the scene of the grounding today.

The Canada Maru grounded at 9 a. m. Tuesday in a heavy fog which had hung for two days over Tatoosh island, and obscured the entrance to the straits. It is believed that Captain Yamamoto mistook the south point of Cape Flattery for Tatoosh island and was aground before he realized his error.

GERMANY CONTINUES TO OFFER EXCUSES

Enemy Newspapers Say "Small Withdrawal Necessary and Will Be Useful."

Amsterdam, July 31.—Further excuses for the German defeat on the Marne are appearing in German newspapers reaching here. The Frankfurter Zeitung declares:

"A small withdrawal was necessary and will be useful."

The Rheinisch Westfälische Zeitung denies the allies have gained the initiative, pointing out that the withdrawal from the Marne was made so that a solid front might be presented.

Reichstag member Traub chides the discouraged Germans:

"If Frederick the Great was here today he would say: 'You are suffering from cold feet and should be ashamed. We are losing courage as though we had suffered a big defeat. Let's act like men.'"

Doughboys clustered around, watching the lieutenant "munching" beans from a mess kit borrowed from a private. "He's got the stuff," they agreed, "but he ought to be sent back to the hospital. It's a crime to let him go to the front."

Doughboys returning from the front described how machine gun bullets rained around them during their assaults on the German nests yesterday. One battalion finally drove out the Germans after a costly charge uphill. In this advance, a captured gun was turned against the boches, who ran like rabbits, throwing their rifles and equipment down, and finally halting around a new machine gun nest. This was stormed by the American unit. After three Germans had been bayoneted, the resistance ended.

excellent work in destroying these barricades and shelters—then the Americans rushed in and routed the enemy in hand-to-hand fighting.

The signal corps, working under shell fire, has maintained uninterrupted telephone communications since the start of the battle, stretching new wires as fast as the enemy's bombardment destroys them.

Prisoners were brought in during the night from the 5th Bavarian reserves, the 5th and 6th chassateurs and the 5th foot guards.

Enemy Losses Heavy.

They reported that one boche company which was 100 strong before it crossed the Marne at the start of the German offensive, has only seven men left. Two men taken today said they were the only survivors of their unit.

There is a constant struggle for mastery of the air. German and allied planes are constantly diving in and out of the clouds. Some airmen exhibit great daring, swooping low to turn their machine guns upon batteries and roads packed with trucks from which great clouds of dust roll up, betraying the place where traffic is most dense. Aviators always select such highways for their work.

I went through miles of American trucks, wagons and marching men, moving forward. The men hardly looked human, they were so caked with dust. Military policemen at cross roads direct traffic, so despite the congestion, there is no confusion.

London, July 31.—Heavy fighting at various points on the Soissons-Rheims salient with Americans east of Fere-en-Tardenois holding the heights beyond Seringes and Sergey, was reported in despatches here early today.

(American) positions beyond Seringes and Sergey are at the point of the furthermost allied advance toward Fismes, the important German strategic center of the Vesle river. Seringes is about 10 miles from Fismes.

The night statement of the Paris war office announced that allied gains at Sergey, south of Seringes, were maintained against enemy assaults. An advance on the right bank of the Ourcq northeast of Fere-en-Tardenois also was reported officially.

Berlin described the allied attacks as being delivered in "dense, storming waves." It claimed defeat of American, French and British onslaughts and asserted the battle decreased in violence after these combats.

Counter-Attacks Fail.

Paris, July 31.—German counter-attacks against new allied positions along the line eastward from Oulchy-le-Chateau have been repulsed, the French war office announced today.

"Eastward of Oulchy-le-Chateau the Germans attacked new French positions. The enemy was repulsed, our positions remaining intact," the statement said.

"On the right bank of the Ourcq there was sharp fighting.

"Northeast of Fere-en-Tardenois, Seringes has finally been taken in an American counter-attack.

"Numerous German raids at Mesnil-St. Georges, east of Montdidier, in Le Pretere wood, on the right bank of the Meuse and in the Vosges, failed. Prisoners were taken in a French incursion in the German lines north of Pertheval-Hurth."

DETAILS OF CZAR'S EXECUTION RELATED

Former Emperor Calm When Told He Has but Four Hours to Live; Weakens Later.

London, July 31.—Details of former Czar Nicholas' execution by the Bolsheviks have appeared in the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger, despatches here today declared.

According to this account, the former emperor was awakened at 5 o'clock in the morning and informed that he would be killed in four hours. He remained calm, conferred with a priest and wrote letters, but at 9 a. m. the guards found him collapsed in a chair.

En route to the place of execution he fell to the ground and when he arrived at the spot where he was to die, he was unable to stand.

He leaned weakly against a post, the newspaper reported, and raised his hands as if about to speak, but the rifle shots drowned his voice as he fell dead.

Amsterdam, July 31.—Three Russian grand dukes, one of whom is believed to have been Grand Duke Nicholas, former commander-in-chief of the Russian armies, have been executed by the Bolsheviks, according to despatches to the Bayrische Landes Zeitung from Moscow.

TWO OREGON BOYS ON CASUALTY LIST

Sergeant W. M. Bower and W. E. Henrick Among Missing and Wounded.

In the casualty list of 194 names announced by the war department this morning are those of Sergeant W. M. Bower, of Amity, Or., and Private W. E. Henrick, of Lebanon. Sergeant Bower is reported among those missing in action and Henrick is listed as severely wounded.

Washington, July 31.—General Pershing's casualty list of 194 today showed: Killed in action 36; died of wounds 40; died of disease 4; died of aeroplane accident 1; died of accident and other causes 5; wounded severely 67; wounded (degree undetermined) 15; missing 24.

Washington, July 31.—Four killed in action, two dead of wounds and twelve severely wounded, were listed on the marine corps casualty report today.

BRITISH FLYERS RAID GERMAN REAR BASES

Enemy Railway Stations and Airdromes Bombed and Hun Planes Are Downed.

London, July 31.—Extensive bombing operations were reported today by the British air ministry communique. Seventeen enemy machines were destroyed and one driven out of control, it was stated. Three British machines are missing. The communique follows:

"On the nights of the 29th, to 30th our machines attacked the railway stations at Offenbourg, Rastatt and Baden. Stuttgart and Solingen were also attacked. Three hostile airdromes and numerous ground targets were bombed and subjected to machine gun fire. All our machines returned.

"On the morning of the 30th, our squadron successfully bombed the railway at Offenbourg.

"In the course of the combats three enemy machines were shot down and one other driven down out of control. One of our machines is missing.

"On the 29th a ground mist and low visibility interfered with artillery observation, but our fighting machines carried out their usual activities.

"Eleven tons of bombs were dropped on the ammunition dumps.

"During the night bombs were dropped by us on Bray and Bapaume. All our machines returned safely."

GERMAN DICTATOR IN UKRAINE IS KILLED

Field Marshal von Eichhorn Victim of Bomb Thrown by Social-Revolutionist.

Amsterdam, July 31.—Field Marshal von Eichhorn, German dictator in Ukraine has been assassinated, according to official word from Kiev received here today. Adjutant Captain von Dressler was also killed.

Previous reports said that von Eichhorn and von Dressler had been seriously wounded by a bomb thrown by a social-revolutionary plotter. The assassin was arrested. The Kiev despatches said von Eichhorn and von Dressler lived only a few hours after being hurt.

The Kaiser, before he learned that the men had been mortally wounded, telegraphed the following to von Eichhorn: "I learn with indignation and deep regret of this abominable crime."

German Women Oppose Importation of Laborers

Amsterdam, July 31.—German women oppose the importation of laborers from Holland to replace German workmen who are sent to the front.

Thousands of women recently greeted a new batch of these Hollanders with a shower of stones, according to reports today from Essen.

"Down the neutral job stealers," the women cried. Police, reduced to a tenth of their strength by war's demands, were helpless.

Most of the imported labor is sent to the Krupp works.
