Italians Start Long Range Bombardment of Enemy Rear

Washington, Aug. 1.—Long distance bombardment of reserve concentrations behind the Austrian lines in Italy has been opened by the Italians, a Rome cable announced today.

The dispatch stated that enemy barracks north of Montello were destroyed and encampments of reserves were dispersed and put to flight by the Italian artillery fire. It is indicated that the Italian bog guns which are doing the bombardment have been erected on the commanding Montello heights.

Austrians Apparently Plan- ning Counter-Blow in Albania

Rome, Aug. 1.—The Austrians apparently are preparing for a counter-offensive in Albania, according to a dispatch from Valona.

They are heavily reinforcing their whole front, and General Pfanderbaltin has displaced General Hohenknappe as commander-in-chief. The enemy is particularly active on the 16-mile front, from Kuchi down to the Semeli, where they are massing troops gathered from the entire northern Balkan zone.

DON'T POISON YOUR BATTERIES

"Batteries, like human beings, are susceptible to poison," says Mr. Roy J. Anderson, local Willard expert. "When it comes to giving medicine to a battery, the only safe rule is to let an expert write the prescription and administer the dose—otherwise, the car owner is likely to find out that his battery has been killed instead of cured."

"There is one thing in particular that is just about as bad as any poison you could give your batteries. That is acid. Of course, there is acid in the battery solution, and a good many car owners will reason: 'If acid is what makes my batteries strong, then the proper thing to do when I think it shows a weakness is to add a little more acid. Then it ought to work better.'"

"That's altogether wrong. You might as well say that because a few drops of some powerful drug are good for heart trouble, a whole bottle would give the patient a better heart than anybody in the country. Not even the worst patent medicine fiend would be foolish enough to believe that."

"But, there are a lot of people who believe in drugging a battery in just this way, so they put in about a half pint of acid when the battery only needs pure water."

"The only way to be safe about adding acid is to fight shy of it. If you think your batteries need acid, go to the service station and get advice from an expert, who can tell you just what to do. Remember, that he has the same relation to the health of your battery as a doctor has to your own health, with this exception—that the battery man doesn't charge anything for the diagnosis."

Moss Lecture Subject.—Activities of the University extension division and school of correspondence study and the work of the collection of sphagnum moss were the subjects discussed in the University assembly in Villard hall Thursday. Extension work was described by Guy E. Dyer, acting director of the division, and the correspondence study and reading circle work by Miss Maxelle Hair, secretary of correspondence study. Sphagnum moss, its appearance, nature, qualities, habitat, and the methods of collecting it, were discussed by Professor Albert R. Sweetser, head of the department of botany in the University, who is special agent of the bureau of development, north-west division, Red Cross, for the collection of sphagnum in Oregon. Professor Sweetser showed samples of the moss, which is the most valuable absorbent substance known for the preparation of surgical dressings, having many times the absorbent power of cotton.

SOLDIER KILLED BY FALL.—New York, Aug. 1.—Lieutenant John F. Newton, 25, Sacramento, Cal., fell from the sixth floor of an apartment house early today and was killed. He recently had returned from France, where he was gassed while in action with his regiment, the 117th engineers.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 1.—Otto von Waldeck, son of the former German ambassador to Turkey, was interned at Fort MacArthur today, bringing a close to several weeks of investigation by federal authorities. He was first arrested in Nevada for failure to register as an alien enemy. When searched shortly after his arrest German code writings were found among his possessions.
