VON HERTLING LAYS DOWN NEW GERMAN PEACE CONDITIONS

Says Belgium Will be Retained Until Allies Pay Indemnities and Bow to Further Teuton Demands.

Berne, Aug. 7.—Replying to questions from members of the Right in the Reichstag recently, Chancellor von Hertling declared that Germany intends to keep Belgium until the allies fulfill certain conditions including payment of indemnities and re-establishment of Germany and Austria as before the war, plus the advantage obtained through the Russian and Rumanian peace treaties, according to advices received here today.

The new peace conditions laid down by Hertling were as follows:

Recognition of Germany's integrity, as before the war.

Recognition of all claims to Alsace-Lorraine by France.

Recognition of all German colonies, or their equivalent.

Recognition of Austria-Hungary's integrity, as before the war, plus territorial and economic advantages obtained through the Bucharest peace.

Recognition of Brest-Litovsk peace.

Recognition of Courland, Lithuania, Estonia and Livonia as included in Germany's sphere of influence.

Payment of indemnities to Germany by the allies.

Recognition of Germany's solution of the Polish question.

Recognition of the seas.

Renunciation by the allies of every form of boycott against Germany after the war.

Renunciation of Italy's claims regarding the Adriatic.

London, August 7.—Germany's monstrous levies on occupied territories will be taken into account in final peace negotiations, Lord Cecil, assistant secretary of state for foreign affairs, announced in the house of commons. She has already levied 2,350,000 francs (more than \$450,000,000 according to the pre-war rate of exchange) on Belgium he said.

21 SIGN ROSTER FOR NEW NATIONAL GUARD COMPANY IN EUGENE

Possibility Training Will Fit Men for Positions as Non-Commissioned Officers When Drafted is Factor.

Twenty-one Eugene men last night signed the roster for the organization of a company of National Guard Infantry in Eugene and it is believed that there will be no difficulty in securing 100 the minimum number required. The probability that the draft age will be raised and an opportunity for training that will fit men likely to be called for service to step into positions in the army as non-commissioned officers is creating an interest generally in enlistment.

Adjutant General John M. Williams addressed the members of the Eugene militia companies who last night attended the meeting in the armory, outlining the general regulations which will govern the organization of the regiment of infantry of which the Eugene company will be a part. Men between the ages of 18 and 45 will be taken. Their enlistment will be for three years of active service and three years in the inactive list. They will be subject to the call of the United States government for service. The minimum number of men required for the organization of a company is 100 and the maximum company strength 250.

One of the most remarkable pictures of contemporary American life, embracing the divorce question, and the more intimate phases of marital relations, is "Old Wives for New," produced by Cecil B. DeMille, from the novel by David Graham Phillips. It is an Art-craft picture and will be shown at the Rex Theatre next Wednesday and Thursday.

This is in every way a superlative motion picture offering, one that cannot fail of its appeal because of the vital theme and the masterly manner in which it has been handled. Briefly, it takes up the lives of a man and woman who marry young in the heat of youthful passion and who rue it later when the woman becomes slovenly and obese, while the man gains rather than loses in every way.

Into the widely popular domain of motion picture entertainment has come a new and powerful factor, Uncle Sam is now a movie manager. Co-ordination is the dynamo of efficiency and centralization of control its starting lever. Recognizing the great value of the movie, the United States government has taken over the work of visualizing on the screen the scenes of the Great War in order to show a pictorial history of what is being done over here and over there.

The New York Tribune recently said: "This is the first war of submarines and aeroplanes—and it is also the first war of movies. Just at present we should rate the movie as the most powerful ally that hard-pressed democracy has yet been able to summon to her side." In order that this powerful weapon may be utilized to its utmost, the committee on Public Information of which George Creel is chairman, now controls the work of the United States Signal Corps and Navy Photographers and arrangements have been made whereby the committee will also handle the work of official photographers of France, England and Italy.

With this comprehensive material at its command the movie history of the war will be co-ordinated so that instead of detached scenes sandwiched in with other views it will be shown in complete episodes. There will be a series of big feature pictures under the direction of H. C. Hoogland, the first of which, entitled "Pershing's Crusaders," will be shown here at the Eugene Theatre beginning Friday, Aug. 9th.

OKLAHOMA, KANSAS AND MISSOURI ELECT

Middle West States Name Candidates for State and National Officers.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Aug. 7.—Oklahoma's congressional body on returns today from yesterday's primary apparently was re-nominated. Senator Robert L. Owen, democrat, secured a big plurality. Congressman R. T. Morgan and T. A. Chandler, republican and Scott Harris, democrat, had no opposition.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 7.—Former Governor Joseph W. Folk has won by a substantial plurality the democratic nomination for the United States senate, according to fairly complete returns today.

Senator X. P. Wiley's managers concluded Folk's victory.

Judge Selden P. Spencer of St. Louis, Colonel Jay L. Torrey of Fruitville by 56,000 majority, early returns indicated.

Congressman Borland of Kansas City has been defeated on the face of early returns.

Topeka, Kans., Aug. 7.—On fairly complete returns today, Governor Arthur Capper is republican nominee for United States senator from Kansas. Figures on yesterday's primaries show him leading former Governor W. R. Stubbs and former Senator J. L. Bristow by a wide margin. Henry Allen, now in Y. M. C. A. work in France, apparently has the republican nomination for governor with a big plurality. Other indicated nominations are Senator William H. Thompson, democrat; for senator, and W. C. Lansdon, democrat, for governor.

Lightship is Shelled and Sunk by Submarine

Washington, Aug. 7.—The Diamond Shoals lightship off Cape Hatteras, North Carolina, was shelled and sunk by a submarine late yesterday afternoon when the submarine came within half a mile of the beach, the navy department announced today. The crew took to their boats and reached shore safely.

Boches Dread Capture.

Increasing boche terror of falling into the hands of the Americans can be observed. A hill southwest of Flumes was littered with German dead, all shot in the back when the position had become untenable. They had fled rather than surrender.

Two wounded boches who had been riding three days, begged not to be killed when they were brought in. They said their officers told them the Americans took no prisoners.

An American balloon observer made a sixth daring leap to safety when a Hun plane brought down his gas bag. In five previous attacks the boches had not got his balloon but had forced him to jump. Yesterday afternoon his balloon was shot down in flames, but the observer landed safely after a parachute ride.

MANY ARE INTERESTED IN OFFICERS' CAMPS

Percentage of Blank Applications Filled Out, However, is Comparatively Small

Requests for applications for admission to the central officers' training camps for infantry at Camp Pike, artillery at Camp Taylor and machine gun at Camp Hancock are being received by Colonel William H. C. Bowen, professor of military science and tactics at the University of Oregon, at the rate of 15 or 20 a day, but only about 15 per cent of the number making inquiry are filling out the application blanks.

Colonel Bowen stated today that he has since the first of the week mailed out blanks to more than 300 applicants and expects the ratio of those actually making applications to increase. The army training camps are going to take men regularly every 30 days so long as there is a demand for officers and Colonel Bowen believes that the interest manifested in Oregon indicates there will be no shortage of material here.

Nearly all the men in attendance at the second University training camp have indicated their intention to make application for admission to one of the central camps.

Two carloads of cattle will be Shipped 700 Miles From Goshen, Lane County.

Two car loads of registered Jersey cattle will be sent by rail 700 miles from the Middledale farm, near Goshen, Lane county, to the Interstate Fair at Spokane, Washington, according to an announcement made today. Twenty-two registered animals will be included in the shipment. They will also be exhibited at the Chehalis, Yakima and Oregon State fairs.

The Middledale farm exhibited herds at these fairs last year winning first on breeder's herd, breeder's young herd, producer's dam and getters sire wherever shown.

morning against French positions south of Auberive (eighteen miles east of Rheims) was repulsed.

With the French Armies in the Field, Aug. 7.—Now that the battle of the Marne pocket has been definitely won, here is time to tell the part played by an army of General Berthelot, who visited America en route from Siberia to take command. Only two weeks before the battle opened Berthelot's army held the line from Rheims to the Marne, and participated in some of the hardest fighting of the whole conflict.

A visit to the battlefield today reveals to some extent the nature of the engagement, which finally culminated in success. One indication is the unburied enemy dead and the great quantity of captured material such as 300,000 shells in Bois-de-Arrery, two complete German batteries and hundreds of machine guns. These also show how well the enemy is equipped. In many parts of the front line, machine guns were arranged seemingly like pickets while in nearly every nest was a minnowweeper.

French Are Outnumbered.

The Germans had 15 divisions (150,000 men) in their front line.

Berthelot had fewer. Nevertheless, on July 16, the second day of the German offensive, he received the order to counter attack. He did so effectively and the next day repented it. The spirit with which Berthelot's army fought continued greatly to slowing up the German advance across the Marne, farther to the west, which was their principal purpose. Some points, like hill 240, had orders to hold at any cost. They did. Often instructed to hold off the Germans as long as possible, even exceeded their instructions.

Berthelot was unaware of the French counter attack plan until it was under way. When General Mangin's counter offensive started, Berthelot was ordered to attack also, sending his reserves against the Andre river, a vital German position.
