BOOKS FOR ARMY AND NAVY ARE SOLICITED

Eugene Library will Receive and Forward Volumes Given by People of City.

A request for books especially novels and good western stories, whether new or old, has been received at the Eugene public library from the American Library association. Books by Zane Grey, Rex Beach, Jack London, Ralph Connor, Owen Wister and O. Henry are the most popular.

More than 600,000 books have already been sent overseas, but the supply is nearly exhausted, and several hundred thousand more will be needed soon by the six dispatch offices which are now shipping books to France. The books are packed at the offices in strong cases so built that they serve as bookcases. They go on the decks of transports, are opened so that the men may have reading matter for use on the voyage. All these books are gathered together again, however, replaced in the cases and delivered to the proper officials in France. In France the books are distributed by an experienced librarian, representing the American Library association. Most of them go to Y. M. C. A., Red Cross and Salvation Army huts and hospitals and canteens. Others go directly to chaplains and officers.

The public library announces that it will receive and forward all suitable books. It urges the friends of the soldiers and sailors, many of whom have already responded most generously, to give more books.

Case of Mrs. Rena Mooney Postponed for One Week

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 7.—The case against Mrs. Rena Mooney, charged with complicity in the preparedness parade bombing, came before Superior Judge Dunne today and was promptly continued for one week.

"When the case is called next week I'll have something to say that may

interest you," Judge Dunne told Maxwell McNutt, defense attorney.

McNutt said he wanted to ask that liberty bonds be substituted for the \$15,000 cash bail on which Mrs. Mooney has been released. Judge Dunne refused to hear his appeal.

MRS. PROVOST DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Daughter of Oregon Pioneer Succumbs at Home of Sister, Mrs. E. L. Campbell.

Mrs. A. C. Provost died Tuesday night at the home of Postmaster E. L. Campbell. Mrs. Provost was a sister of Mrs. Campbell. She had been ill two months.

Mrs. Provost was born at Woodburn, Oregon, June 16, 1868, and was a daughter of the late James and Ellen Casey, pioneer settlers of the state. She had resided nearly all her life in Oregon. In 1887, she was married to F. C. Provost. Mrs. Provost had made her home in Eugene about two years during which she has been employed in the Hampton department store. She had formerly worked in large mercantile establishments in Portland, San Jose and Sacramento.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Ella Hagen, of Seattle, Washington, and Miss Florence Provost, of Portland, and the following brothers and sisters are left to mourn her loss: Mrs. Chas. N. Allen, Mrs. John B. Coe and Mrs. E. L. Campbell of Eugene, Sister M. Placida of Oregon City, John J. Casey of Billings, Mont., Thos. J. Casey of San Francisco, and Bat Casey of Redwood, Cal., besides four grandchildren and a large circle of friends and acquaintances. Interment will be made beside her parents in the family plot at Woodburn Oregon, Friday August 9th.

RATTLE OF MACHINE GUNS WILL BE HEARD AT UNIVERSITY CAMP

Captain Hass Plans to Give Target Practice Demonstration of Browning Weapon on Eugene Gun Club Range.

The rattle of the machine gun will be heard on the rifle range near the University of Oregon the latter part of the week when target practice with the new Browning gun will be given as a part of the instruction of the five companies of men who are receiving military training at the second summer camp at the University. Two of these guns were brought to Eugene by Captain Hass, machine gun expert from Vancouver barracks, who is explaining their mechanism and demonstrating their operation to classes of civilian soldiers in which there are some aspirants for commissions in the United States army who never saw a machine gun until they came to Eugene.

There are a comparatively few of the new Browning guns on the Pacific coast.

Captain Hass is using charts for the demonstration of the operation of machine guns used by the allies and also the guns used by the Germans. Instruction regarding the German machine guns is given in the United States army to enable men who should capture a gun to turn it upon the enemy.

Colonel William H. C. Bowen, professor in military science and tactics at the University, stated today that the demonstration with the machine gun would be given upon the range of the Eugene rifle club at the Elliott and Lucas ranches. The rifle club he stated had promised to fix up the range, so that it would be suitable for that purpose.

The men in attendance at the camp are displaying keen interest in the machine gun work, especially in view of the organization of the special officers' training camp for machine gun forces at Camp Hancock, Georgia.

Colonel Bowen today gave out figures on the organization of a machine gun battalion and a machine gun company as follows:

Battalion (four companies)—One major, four captains, 11 first lieutenants, 12 second lieutenants, two battalion sergeants, four first sergeants, one sergeant, first-class, four mess sergeants, four supply sergeants, five stable sergeants, 42 plain sergeants, 58 corporals, 13 cooks, four horse shoers, 12 mechanics, four saddlers, 26 wagoners, eight buglers and 561 privates. Total 28 officers and 748 enlisted men.

Company—One captain, two first lieutenants, three second lieutenants, one stable sergeant, one supply sergeant, one first sergeant, 10 sergeants, 14 corporals, three cooks, one horse shoer, three mechanics, one saddler, two buglers and 34 privates. Total six officers and 172 enlisted men.

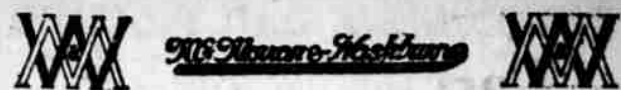
