mind could stand, and they turned loose with vengeance. Black puffs were all around us, but we kept on with motors at full speed, diving, looping, turning and making them still madder.

"Meanwhile the group which went up first, crossed the lines at a high altitude, with motors off, gliding along. They were unnoticed on account of the racket of the motors of the stunt group, and succeeded in getting positions above half a dozen balloons before Helms was the wiser.

"They they dived, each man straight for a balloon, shooting as he came, the guns being loaded with incendiaries.

"Out of every sausage there came an observer hanging on a parachute and the machines on the ground frantically hauled in the boche sausages. The whole flock of American planes sped across the lines, having cleaned the sector of German balloons with one general dive.

Norman Hall Praised.

"It takes courage of a special sort to stand the archies and bullets. Captain Norman Hall, who is now a prisoner in Germany was an ideal aviator in this respect. As the boys say, 'he wasn't scared of hell!'

PUT 'BUMS' TO WORK SAYS KING OF HOBOES

Jeff Davis Would Have Absolute Non-Producers Peel Potatoes in Cantonnments.

Washington, Aug. 12.—Jeff Davis, "hobo" king blew into town today to interest General Crowder in work for the country's 'bums.'

"You see," said Jeff, "the difference between the hobo, tramp and bum, is that the first can and does work, the second can and will work if he has to, and the third won't work."

"Now 50,000 hobos are working for their country today. They've gone out of our ranks into the army and navy. This work or fight law will cut a majority of the tramps, but the bum—the older bird, who frequents the barrel house and missions, a drag on society—we've got to get him.

"I'm going to see General Crowder and try to get him interested in having these bums put to work peeling potatoes and doing jobs around cantonnments. I say free the soldiers from this stuff and let the bums do it."

U-BOATS APPEAR TO BE OPERATING ALL ALONG COAST

Warfare of Submarines on Fishboats and Other Small Craft Extends from New England to the Carolinas.

STEAMER SONORSTAD IS ADDED TO TOLL OF SHIPS

Captain of Norwegian Vessel Says Torpedo Passed Clear and Then Turned and Came Back, Striking Amidships.

GERMAN "SPORT"

An Atlantic Port, Aug. 13.—A German officer trampled the Stars and Stripes after executing a dance with the flag about his neck, survivor of a fishing schooner sunk off the Georges bank, who were held aboard the submarine, declared on their arrival here today. The crew of the little fisherman were helpless to stop the performance. The submarine's crew jeered at the fishermen, while the flag torn from the masthead of the schooner Lena May was trampled on.

Washington, Aug. 13.—German U-boats now appear to be operating all along the Atlantic coast.

From New England to the Carolinas, the sea scavengers are exacting their toll of fishing smacks and other small vessels and have even gassed a light-house.

The navy department today added another victim in the Norwegian steamer Sonorstad, torpedoed off Fire Island yesterday morning.

The navy is taking all measures to meet the spectacular terrorist efforts of German U-boat commanders. Thus far, however, there is no direct evidence that any of the enemy submarines have been sunk. There is some cause to believe that a destroyer, which had a brush with one of them, disposed of it.

Secretary Daniels stated today that all possible precautions have been taken to protect coast stations from further gas attacks by German submarines.

Asked whether gas masks had been issued, Daniels said: "Oh, yes, we are doing all those things."

The Sonorstad, it was later revealed, was sunk only 25 miles off Fire Island. The navy department issued the following statement on the sinking of the Sonorstad:

"The navy department is informed that the Norwegian steamer Sonorstad was sunk at 8:15 a. m. yesterday, August 12, 25 miles southeast from Fire Island. The captain and 30 members of the crew were rescued and have reached port. There were no casualties.

the wake of a torpedo; the engines were reversed, avoiding the torpedo, which was seen to go under the bow of the vessel. The ship was drawing only seven feet of water and the torpedo continued on its course. The captain ordered full speed ahead. The torpedo, he states, turned sharply to the left and returned, hitting the vessel between the third and fourth holds, on the port side. In five minutes after being struck, the whole deck amidships was awash, and the crew left the ship. The ship, they state, was standing directly up and down with the bow in the water, about 14 feet being visible.

The "boomeranging" of the torpedo responsible for the sinking of the Sonorstad was attributed by navy officials here to a jammed rudder. It was pointed out that if the rudder did not function properly a torpedo might very easily swerve in its course and completely turn around. Also some experts added that imperfect gyroscopic mechanism has been known to cause a torpedo to turn about in its course. They thought advanced that possibly the Germans had perfected means of controlling a torpedo's course by wireless was believed unlikely, though possible.

More Gas Attacks Expected. The captain and his 30 men got into two boats and made for Sandy Hook. They were sighted by a submarine chaser at 6:35 a. m. and rescued. Four of the men of the crew reported that they saw a periscope sticking about six feet out of the water and moving very rapidly. The torpedo they estimated was about 12 feet long.

That the Hun gas attack off the South Carolina coast may be followed by other similar attacks, was the belief of navy men today. According to reports made to the department on the attack on the lighthouse, the gas lasted 30 or 40 minutes. Its color has not yet been ascertained nor its effect on trees and shrubbery, but a full report on the attacks has been asked by the navy department.

An Atlantic Port, Aug. 13.—Captain George Hansen, of the steamer Sonorstad, sunk by a submarine off Fire Island declared today that he believed the queer antics of the torpedo before it struck its mark, were due to it hitting something in the water, which deflected it from its course. He asserted that the torpedo, after missing his ship, and going by, came back and struck his vessel. It was suggested that the torpedo might have been controlled by wireless.

Fishing Vessels Sunk. An Atlantic Port, Aug. 13.—The fishing schooner Acushla arrived here today with 14 men from the fishing vessels Progress, Starbuck and Helena May, all sunk by a submarine off Georges banks. The men were picked up 80 miles southeast of Cape Cod.

The crew of the schooner Mary A. Sennett, which was brought to this port, told of the sinking of the schooners Old Timer and Cruiser. They declared the crews of these vessels were shelled when they left their ships and probably were killed, as nothing was seen of them after the vessels sank.

The attack on the Mary A Sennett, the Cruiser and the Old Timer was made by two submarines, according to the survivors. This is the first report that more than one submarine took part in the Georges bank raid.

The fishing vessels known to have been sunk are the Progress, Helena May, Earl and Nettie, Reliance, Mary A. Sennett, Starbuck, Kate Palmer, Cruiser and Old Timer.

Warning Is Received. An Atlantic Port, Aug. 13.—Passengers arriving today aboard a British steamer reported their vessel received a wireless yesterday afternoon apparently from a United States patrol boat, stating that a U-boat had been sighted off Fire Island on the New York coast and that other patrol boats were pursuing it.

Another wireless, received at four o'clock this morning from an unidentified Danish steamer, is declared to have stated that the steamer had been attacked by a submarine off Nantucket island and was sinking.

The British steamer left England with a convoy, but became separated from the other craft in a fog the first day out and made the rest of the voyage alone.

TYPHUS SWEEPS ISLAND. Washington, Aug. 13.—Typhus is sweeping the island of Metelen, near Greece, where 60,000 refugees from Asia Minor and Thrace are being cared for. Cables to the Greek legation today indicated extreme suffering and famine.
