133 APPLICATIONS ARE FORWARDED TO TRAINING SCHOOLS

Colonel Bowen Names Men Whose Papers Have Been Sent to Artillery, Infantry and Machine Gun Camps.

Colonel William H. C. Bowen, professor of military science and tactics at the University of Oregon, designated as one of the representatives of the war department in Oregon to pass upon applicants for admission to the central officers' schools Thursday announced a list of 133 men, including 64 who are residents of Portland, whose applications have been forwarded to camp commanders.

Thirty-two of the applicants for admission to the artillery school at Camp Zachary Taylor, near Louisville, Kentucky, all of whom are in training at the second University camp, were examined Thursday the Oregon civilian committee for the examination of applicants for the central officers' schools, which met with Colonel Bowen Thursday. \$500 IS GIVEN FOR WOMEN'S BUILDING

Eugene Members of Collegiate Alumnae Pay Up Their Pledge Ahead of Schedule.

The Eugene members of the Association of Collegiate Alumnae have made the last payment upon their pledge of \$500 toward the fund for the woman's building to be erected on the campus of the University of Oregon. The pledge was made in 1916 and the final payments were not due until 1919. The money has been invested in Liberty Bonds and will be held in this form until needed.

Payments amounting to \$400 were made in October, 1917, and that amount was invested at that time in Liberty bonds. Two more bonds were purchased in April and the final payment on the bond was made Thursday by Mrs. L. R.

The president rose early today, planning to spend the morning on the golf links and the afternoon motoring. He was pleased at the fine, clear, cool day. Although the president has with him George Close, presidential clerk and stenographer, he plans to do only such work as is absolutely necessary. No visitors were expected today.

Police and Soldiers Disperse Sinn Fein Meeting

Dublin, Aug. 16.—Police and 500 soldiers dispersed a meeting at Omagh, where John Dillon was about to deliver an address. There was no violence.

Dillon refused to the last to desist from efforts to speak, claiming the right of a member of parliament to address his audience.

The gathering was broken up and the Sinn Fein demonstration stopped.

PARIS IS BOMBED

Paris, Aug. 16.—Hostile airplanes dropped many bombs in the Paris region last night, inflicting some casualties. It was officially announced early today. The alarm was sounded at 10 p. m. and "all clear" at 12:32 a. m.
