LONG DISTRICT HAS SCHOOL AT BOTH ENDS

Forest Supervisor Finds Teacher Holding School in Tent in Douglas County Forest.

Tramping through the timber in a pouring rain on the north fork of the Smith River, in Douglas county, last Thursday, R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the Siuslaw National forest, came upon a tent in which he found school in session. The teacher and seven children were huddled at work.

"Our district is so long that we have to have school at both ends," the teacher explained. "We hold school at the upper end a while, and then at the other end a while and in that way everybody gets some education."

Supervisor Shelley was in that part of the forest and had started out to find the school. Recently he received a letter from John H. Pearson, chairman of the school board in the district, known as No. 128, in Douglas county, asking for the designation of a piece of land upon which a school house might be erected. The district which is about a quarter of a mile in width extending along the river through the forest for a distance of 12 miles will have two school houses and one teacher.

USE OF GERMAN OVER PHONE ANGRERS CROWD

Mob Decorates Building of Company, Which Permitted Use of Language, with Paint.

Clarence, I. wa, Aug. 20.—Angered because the local telephone company is alleged to have permitted the use of the German language over its wires, a crowd last night daubed the building with yellow paint.

After coating the phone building the crowd, said to have been composed of leading citizens, applied the brush and bucket to a restaurant owned by Albert Hoffner, and a garage belonging to Hoffner. From the Hoffner building the crowd went to a furniture store owned by Henry Engleking and gave it a coat of the yellow.

Hoffner and Engleking are accused of being pro-German.

United States officials are en route. It was said this morning and a clean-up of pro-Germans will be made, it is believed.

EUGENE SCHOOLS OPEN ON ORIGINAL DATE

September 16 Date Set by Board at Meeting Monday; Two New Teachers Elected.

The Eugene board of education at a meeting last night decided that the schools in the city should open on September 16, the date originally set. The decision was reached after a discussion by the board of the suggestion that the date be postponed to permit boys and girls to assist in the harvest of crops in the county. The board takes the view that the pressure for an early closing of the schools next spring will be greater than the necessity for delaying the fall term. It is announced, however, that the policy will be to give boys and girls who remain out of school to assist the harvest of crops, an opportunity to make up their school work.

Two new teachers were elected by the board at its meeting last night, making the personnel of the teaching staff for this year almost complete.

One of the new teachers is Miss Katherine Howells, of Medford, who will have charge of science work in the high school. She is a graduate of the state college at Corvallis this year and this will be her first practical teaching experience.

The other teacher chosen is Miss Mathilde Veit, of Portland, who will teach in the upper grades in the elementary schools, but as yet she is not assigned to any particular building.

EMPLOYEES OF CITY THREATEN TO STRIKE

Tacoma Municipal Workers Union Asks \$25 a Month Wage Increase.

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 20.—A threat to strike is seen by some city officials in demands presented to City Commissioner H. Roy Harrison of the public works department today by a committee representing the newly formed Tacoma municipal employees union for a flat increase of \$25 per month in salaries. Other commissioners are to be served with similar schedules immediately, it was stated by E. H. Little, of the committee of the union having the matter in hand. The raise would affect every employee in the city hall from elevator girl up, and would be effective September 1.

The city is utterly unable to grant another raise of any sort and will be lucky to get through the year on the salaries as they now stand, Commissioner Harrison said.
