WALNUT GROWERS WILL VISIT COUNTY

Itinerary of Western Association For Trip To Start Next Monday is Announced.

The itinerary for the automobile trip of the Western Walnut association to walnut groves in the Willamette valley, next week, has been announced by H. V. Mede, of Oregno, secretary of the association. The party will leave the Imperial hotel in Portland, Monday morning at 8 o'clock. The first stop will be made at the Groner grove in Washington county. The schedule provides for dinner at Newberg. In the afternoon the groves at Dundee will be visited, after which the travelers will go to McMinnville for supper. Leaving McMinnville at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning, the party will visit Eola Crest, Westland, Peach, McNary's grove and take dinner at Salem. In the afternoon stops will be made at Skyline, Jefferson, Albany and take supper in this city. The cars will leave Eugene Wednesday morning for Corvallis, Independence, Monmouth, Dallas and then home.

333 Sick and Wounded Are Returned to U. S. in Week

Washington, Aug. 22.—A new reflection apparently of the recent Marine drive came today in the war department's announcement of the return of 333 sick and wounded soldiers to the United States for the week ending August 16, as against 63 the previous week. They have been sent to reconstruction hospitals.

Thomas Mooney Case May Go to U. S. Supreme Court

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—The ruling of the state supreme court denying Thomas J. Mooney, labor leader, convicted of complicity in the preparedness day bombing, a re-hearing, lost to Mooney his last chance for a new trial in California courts.

After the reading yesterday of an elaborate brief by Attorney McNutt, in which he stated reasons for the re-hearing, the court ruled denial of a new trial.

The attorneys state that the case may be appealed to the United States supreme court.

All But Five Are Saved From Torpedoed Steamer

Washington, Aug. 22.—Three unnamed civilians, two naval guardsmen, David W. Johnson and Chester C. Eldredge, were the sole persons reported up to today as missing in the torpedoing of the cargo steamer *Montana* in foreign waters, August 16. Eighty-one survivors have been landed.
