SENTIMENT UPON IRRIGATION PLAN

Rising Vote of Persons Present, Taken at Meeting Held in Eugene Chamber of Commerce Rooms.

Quite a large number of land owners and others interested in the proposed irrigation district gathered in the chamber of commerce Tuesday evening to listen to Ralph H. Schneeloch, who represents the Clark-Kendall company, bond buyers, explain the plans for irrigating and draining the lands north and northwest of Eugene. Dugald Campbell, of this city, acted as chairman of the meeting.

Mr. Schneeloch showed a large map of the boundaries of the proposed district and explained how the water would be placed on the land. He stated that the question of building a storage dam or using the water from Waldo lake was given careful consideration and that it had been found that for the sake of economy it had been decided to use the head-gates of the lake. During certain periods of the summer months there was not enough water in the Willamette river for irrigation and to supply the demand and prior rights of the Portland Light & Power company, at Oregon City, and that it was necessary that stored water be used during this period.

Mr. Schneeloch explained that the work of installing the ditches would be under the control of the company which he represented and that water would be placed on the high point of every 40 acres or fraction in the district. He also stated that there was a mistaken idea as to the leveling of the ground for irrigation purposes. It would not be necessary to cut the knolls or small hills, but that the actual leveling could be done with a drag and at the cost of a year's plowing. He stated that the cost of installing the system had not been figured down exactly, but that it would not be over \$50 per acre, and when it was completed the system would belong to the farmers who would see to its upkeep and to the distribution of the water.

As to the necessity for irrigation Mr. Schneeloch stated that the facts and figures had been gathered from the government records at Washington and Corvallis and from the state engineer's office at Salem. He also stated that the project would first have to be approved by the state officials before it would be submitted to the people for a vote; that the entire plan would have to be advertised for four weeks prior to taking a vote, and that the bonds could not be sold until after having been advertised for four weeks, and that seven or eight weeks would intervene between the vote on the project and the sale of the bonds. Any landowner within the district would have the privilege of showing that irrigation would not benefit him to the extent of the cost, and this would eliminate him from the district and any obligation whatever.

Many questions were asked by the farmers present, some of whom it is stated do not own land within the district, although they thought they did. These questions were answered by Mr. Schneeloch, and they brought out most of the essential facts regarding the project.

After Mr. Schneeloch had concluded, a number of farmers asked permission to speak and stated that they were against the proposed irrigation plan, some because irrigation was not needed, some because of the bonds, and some because of the manner in which the proposition was handled, but most of them agreed that the cost would be excessive, although some of those who were most vehement against the plan, are not in the district. Mr. Dunlap, at the conclusion of the meeting asked for a rising vote of those who opposed the proposition and at least half of the audience rose to its feet.

FARNHAM IS NAMED AS ASSISTANT HEAD OF POSTOFFICE HERE

Financial Clerk Receives Promotion Which Had Been Vacant for About Three Years.

Postmaster E. L. Campbell has received authorization to appoint Wilder R. Farnham, now financial clerk at the Eugene postoffice, to the position of assistant postmaster. This position was formerly held by Frank A. Page, but was abolished three years ago on account of decreases made in the postoffice work when Eugene was discontinued as a money order depository for southern Oregon.

The new accounting system, whereby 75 offices receive all their supplies and make all their reports to the Eugene office and the distribution of War Savings and Thrift Stamps to these offices has placed a larger amount of work on the postmaster than he has had to handle at any previous time. Under the circumstances Postmaster Campbell recommended to the department that the position be re-established and recommended that Mr. Farnham be promoted to the position.

Mr. Farnham has been employed as a clerk in the Eugene office for a period of over ten years and his promotion is made on merit.

Purchase Pure Blood Stock.
Cal M. Young and W. A. Ayres, of the Willamette district, north of the city, have just received 12 head of pure bred shorthorn cattle, which they purchased at the shorthorn sale conducted at the state college at Corvallis Saturday. Six of these animals are breeding cows and several in the herd show some of the best breeding records of any in the entire northwest.

To Save Tin Tubes.
The Linn Drug company will co-operate with the war trade board and officials of the bureau of mines in a plan to save 6,000 tons of tin a year, and at the same time provide several millions of dollars for the Red Cross. The proposal is to save the tin which goes into collapsible tubes, such as are used for tooth paste, shaving cream, vaseline and other things. The people are asked to preserve such containers, instead of throwing them away when empty, and turn them over to the Red Cross. Experts who have gone into the matter carefully say that the annual waste of tin is at least 6,000 tons and that this much block tin could be recovered and restored to use in habit metal or other of the more common uses for base materials, while at the same time the Red Cross would realize handsomely. Tubes and tin foil left at the Linn Drug company's store will be turned over to the local Red Cross.

SENATE DRYS SEEK TO PROVE REVENUE LOSS NEGLIGABLE

Members Favoring Immediate Prohibition Call Treasury Experts to Substantiate Their Contentions.

Washington, Aug. 28.—Senate drys who favor immediate prohibition of intoxicants from the United States, today called to their aid the treasury department experts to prove that no great financial loss will result.

Armed with a great mass of figures, working.

they plan to tell the senate that the claim that scores of banks will be forced to the wall unless liquor interests and banks which hold their paper are given 10 months or a year to settle their affairs is "bosh." They already have quoted a high official of the department as saying that six months would be ample time to let all the banks which have loaned money to liquor interests get out from under. But in spite of the radical drys' determination to fight for immediate drouth the belief grows that July 1, 1919, will be the date fixed.

The whole question probably will be settled one way or the other this week. Prohibition has the right of way, until disposed of.

Under an agreement the prohibition question comes up Thursday at the latest and must be kept there by the senate until voted on.
