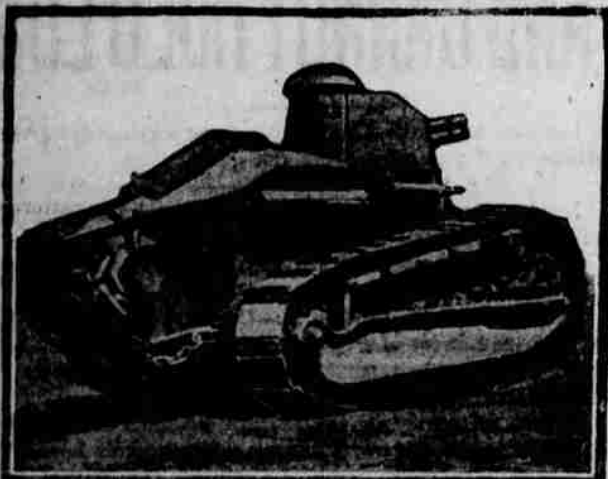

ONE ADDED TO LIST OF TRAGEDY VICTIMS

Private Essex, Assaulted With Axe by Comrade at Camp Fremont, Dies of Wounds.

Camp Fremont, Cal., Aug. 29.—The third victim of the Camp Fremont tragedy for which Sergeant Marvin Williamson is held responsible, was dead here today.

Private Clarence Essex, who Williamson attacked with an ax, died yesterday. Williamson will be turned over to civil authorities for trial on a charge of murder, officers believe. Major Josiah Kemp is conducting a military investigation to determine what will be done.

Williamson, under arrest, was chopping wood late Tuesday when he suddenly struck down Essex, his guard, with an ax, seized the guard's pistol and shot Miss Lucille Warren, of Portland, Or., killed Private Lloyd Jewel, another prisoner, who tried to stop him, and then shot himself. Williamson is not seriously hurt.

MEXICANS AGAIN FIRING OVER NOGALES BORDER

During the night a total of about 100 shots were fired. The Americans did not reply until about 40 shots had come across the line from the Mexican side.

This morning entire quiet prevailed during the hours immediately following daybreak, due to General Cabell's ultimatum that if the Mexicans did not cease their "foolishness," he would "take everything I have" across the line, and "take everything you have over there." That ultimatum was delivered last night to the Mexican consul from Nogales, Sonora.

Mexican troops have entrenched themselves in the hills south of Nogales and at daybreak this morning the indications were that a considerable force was accumulating.

Additional Mexican troops have arrived from the interior of Mexico, apparently under Carranza's orders to preserve the peace. There is uneasiness, however, in Nogales.

This uneasiness was further aggravated by the exchange of some 100 shots across the border last night. The shots were followed by a message from the Mexican leaders declaring the Americans had started the trouble and a crisp reply from General Cabell, commanding the Americans, that any further demonstrations would result in his troops crossing the border.

What the Mexicans propose to do was a puzzle to the people of Nogales today. At almost the moment the Mexicans were entrenching across the border their representatives were in Nogales conferring with American military and civil authorities.

As a result of this conference, it was promised that there should be no more hostilities and the civilian officials agreed to the opening of the border sufficiently to permit thousands of Mexican workmen to come across to the American side where they are employed each day.

While the conference apparently was devoid of any ill feeling it was followed by last night's demonstration, leaving the people early today in doubt as to the next development.

Many here believe that the closing of the border is playing the big part in the outbreak.

Civilians Blamed.

Washington, Aug. 29.—Indications today were that Mexican civilians will be mainly blamed for the Nogales skirmish. While representations may be made to President Carranza, it now appears unlikely that the incident will become a grave one. The state department proposes to withhold any possible diplomatic action until the military authorities on both sides of the line have had an opportunity to investigate fully.

With the border patrol strengthened at Nogales there is no doubt whatever of the American ability to cope with whatever contingencies might arise. Continuation of the firing last night appeared to be of an unorganized nature.

AUSTRALIANS CAPTURE DOMINATING POSITIONS IN DRIVE TOWARD CITY

North of Soissons the Germans are clinging to dominating positions at Cuffies (a mile and a half north of the city) and Juigny (where American troops are operating). The Germans are reported to be greatly strengthening their position in St. Gobain forest (between the Oise and the Ailette), which are regarded as already among the best defenses on the west front.

Huns Holding Desperately.

London, Aug. 29.—The Germans are strongly holding the southern and western outskirts of Noyon with machine gun concentrations, according to front dispatches received here today. The French have fully outflanked the town at Montagne-de-Forqueriecourt (a mile and a half northwest).

French troops have crossed the Rore-Noyon road near Sermaise (three miles northwest of Noyon) and Cantigny (two miles north of Sermaise). They have also reached the neighborhood of Cacy and Ramecourt (six miles southeast of Neale).

The west bank of the Somme is in the hands of the French from Camcourt to Roucy-le-Petit (two miles northeast of Neale).

French Gain Six Miles.

London, Aug. 29.—The Germans are now fighting with their backs to the Somme. In their advance yesterday, the French swept forward an additional six

miles on a front of about 25 miles, capturing 40 villages and reaching the new German defenses on the Somme from Camcourt, five miles south of Peronne, to the vicinity of Noyon. Part of this line is formed by the Somme and the remainder by the north canal. Joining this operation on the north the British made an appreciable advance on both sides of the Somme—where it flows in a westerly direction—capturing Curia north of the river and reaching a line near Herbécourt, four miles west of Peronne and Fresnoy, five miles south of Herbécourt, south of the river.

British troops also continued their program between Bapaume and the Scarpe, capturing Croiselles and advancing to Vaux-Vraucourt, five miles northwest of Bapaume. More than 10 miles of the Hindenburg line is now in British hands.

The French operation along the Oise, captured Suzoy, Pont L'Evêque, Vanchelles and Porqueriecourt, approaching to within nearly a mile of Noyon on the west.

Between the Oise and the Aisne, American troops repulsed several counter attacks near Juigny, four miles north of Soissons.

Night Comparatively Quiet.

Paris, Aug. 29.—Fighting in the Somme area last night was limited to artillery engagements, the French war office announced today. Raiding operations were reported on other fronts.

"On the Somme front last night there were violent bombardments," the communique said. "In Lorraine, German raids were unsuccessful. In the Champagne two French raids resulted in 15 prisoners. It was calm elsewhere."

26,000 Prisoners in Week.

London, Aug. 29.—German prisoners taken since August 21, total more than 26,000, Field Marshal Haig announced today. In the same period more than 100 guns have been captured.

"Strong German counter attacks along the Scarpe were repulsed yesterday evening and last night."

"South of the Somme we maintained pressure against the enemy during the night, advancing eastward," the statement said.

"North of the Somme, as far as the neighborhood of Fontaine-les-Croiselles (a mile and a half northeast of Croiselles) the night passed in comparative quiet."

"Astride the Scarpe the enemy made strong counter attacks yesterday morning and last night, east and southeast of Boiry and in the vicinity of Garrelle. They were repulsed with loss to the enemy in heavy fighting."

"Our advanced posts established west of Oppy (four miles southeast of Vimy) were withdrawn slightly last night as the result of repeated hostile attacks," the statement said.

"Prisoners taken since the 21st exceeded 26,000 and over 100 guns have been taken."

"In the recent fighting south and north of the Somme, tanks took an active part on all possible areas and rendered very valuable and gallant service in co-operation with the infantry and other arms."

CORRECT MILITARY SERVICE INSIGNIA FOR SERVICE FLAGS

The basic idea of the service is, that there shall be a star to represent each person, man or woman, actually in the military or naval service of the country. This does not include reserve forces or state national guard forces not yet in the federal military service.

A BLUE star shall be used to represent each person, man or woman, in the military and naval service of the United States or of the Allies.

For a person killed in action, a gold star shall be placed over the blue star, entirely covering it.

For a person wounded, a silver star shall be placed over the blue star, entirely covering it.

For a person who dies of disablement, a gold star will be placed over the silver star leaving a silver margin around the gold.

For those disabled or invalided home, a silver star will be placed over the blue star, leaving a blue margin around the silver.

For those who die in training camps of accident or disease, a gold star will be placed in such a manner as to leave a margin of blue.

The method of wearing mourning for those persons who die in the military and naval service was determined by the Women's Committee of the Council of National Defense at a meeting in Washington. This committee recommended that there should be worn upon the left arm a three-inch black band, upon which a gilt star should be placed for each member of the family whose life has been lost in the service.
