

EDUCATION FOR MEN REVOLUTIONIZED BY ARMY TRAINING PLAN

School 6 Days a Week Through-
out Year; Intensive Courses
To Be Provided Beginning
With Fall Term.

The colleges of the nation are to be stripped for action in preparation for the Student Army Training Corps. Courses for men will be condensed into three months and non-essential courses will be abolished. Classes will be held six days a week from morning until night, with continuous session the year around.

This is the substance of a statement given out last night at the University of Oregon by Karl Onthank, secretary to President Campbell, following a conference at the University yesterday with Chancellor Edward C. Elliott of the University of Montana, director of the Student Army Training Corps for the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

The statement in part follows: "The University of Oregon is already a year ahead of most collegiate institutions," Chancellor Elliott said, "for the reason that it adopted last fall the four-quarter organization of the college year, and reorganized its courses on a three months' basis. This will make much easier the transition to the intensive work of the new regime under the student army training corps."

"No longer will students have Saturday free and considerable vacation periods during the college year. Classes, laboratory work and drill will last from morning until night, six days in the week. Courses which ordinarily have occupied a year are to be condensed to a single term of three months. All but the most essential subjects are to be eliminated from the course of study to be followed by student army training corps men."

"Athletics as an intercollegiate sport are to be a thing of the past, although games between companies and regiments will be encouraged, and it is likely that it will be possible to arrange for matches between teams from the University and Camp Lewis, Vancouver Barracks, Fort Stevens and student army training corps in other educational institutions. How far this program can be carried out depends entirely on war department orders, however."

"According to Chancellor Elliott's announcements at the University, the student army training corps will utilize to the utmost the plant, equipment and organization of the University for selecting

and training all kinds of officers and technical experts. Men will be admitted to the student army training corps by individual voluntary induction. They must first of all have secured admission to the University, upon presentation of their credits, indicating that they have graduated from a standard high school or its equivalent. Men who are not high school graduates may enter section A of the student army training corps for special vocational training. The University does not expect to handle this class of men however, confining itself entirely to section B of the student army training corps, which prepares for officerships in the army."

Three to Go on Hunt—Champ Callaway, of McMinnville, formerly of Eugene, Rev. J. S. McCallum and George G. Gross left on Thursday for the mountains above Oakridge on a deer hunt.

To Make Trip East—A. C. Dixon, manager of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, will leave Thursday night on a business trip east. He expects to be away from Eugene three or four weeks.

Have Storms in Mountains—Reports received at the office of the supervisor of the Cascade national forest show that a heavy thunderstorm was general in the territory on the upper McKenzie last Sunday.

Soldier Wins Promotion—Mr. and Mrs. A. Dennis, of Eugene route 4, have received a letter from their son, Vivian Dennis, announcing his promotion to a non-commissioned officer. He is now a sergeant clerk in the quartermaster's corps, stationed at Fort Worden, Washington.

Home From Chautauqua Tour—Donald Thompson, son of Captain Robert Thompson, has returned home after a trip in California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. He has been employed as a property man in Chautauqua work. He expects to remain in the city two or three weeks.

Tons of Cherries Dried—The total output of dried cherries at the plant of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association this year was 20,000 pounds, according to a statement made Thursday by Manager J. O. Holt. These must be sold at 30 cents a pound to cover the cost of fruit and expense of curing.

Girls Rapid Peeling Pears—Three girls who are peeling pears at the cannery of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association are handling about 25 bushels a day. They remove the skin only. Another set of workers cut the pears in two and remove the cores. The workers engaged in the work of peeling are paid at the rate of 15 cents a bushel.

At Fort Benjamin Harrison—Mr. and Mrs. Squire Inila, of Pleasant Hill, were Eugene visitors today. They have just received a letter from their son, Frank, who is now stationed at Fort Benjamin Harrison. They also have another son, Emmett, in the service. The boys are both 6 feet 1-3 inches in height and weigh over 200 pounds.

Red Cross Makes Appeal—The Lane county chapter of the Red Cross has received a shipment of between 25 and 30 sacks of moss and issued an appeal for volunteer pickers, to work Friday and Saturday at the headquarters. The work rooms will be open from 9 to 12 each morning and from 1 to 5 each afternoon. The chapter has asked the women of Eugene not to let the moss spoil.

In Eastern Camp—Charles L. Sigman, formerly an employee in the office of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, in a letter to T. L. Olsen, of Eugene, announces his arrival at Camp Meade, Maryland. Sigman left Lane county with a draft quota early in July. Sigman states that he was among 1,000 western boys who passed in review before Secretary of State Lansing, while in Washington, D. C. He expects to go overseas soon.

Must Exercise More Care—F. M. Wilkins, food administrator for Lane county, stated today that there are certain regulations which govern the issuance of sugar permits and these must be observed or permits cannot be issued. "Persons writing in for permits must state the number in the family and the amount of sugar they have already purchased this season," he said. "Unless they do this we cannot give them the permit. A large number of those who write fall to do this. I receive from 75 to 100 such letters each day, and very few of them contain this information."

To Hold Rate Hearings—The interstate commerce commission, according to word received in Eugene, will hold a hearing in Portland on September 20 for the purpose of considering a complaint against the 25 per cent increase in freight rates on fresh fruits and vegetables, fruit juices and empty containers westbound, and also to consider a complaint against the 10 per cent increase in express rates on fresh fruit and fresh fish. The commission will hold a hearing in Portland on September 23 for the consideration of re-consignment and diversion rules on fruit and vegetables. This hearing is supplemental to the Chicago hearing September 4 for the purpose of giving the northwest shippers an opportunity to present evidence.

Less Substitutes Required—New wheat regulations, to go into effect immediately, have been adopted, according to information received at the office of County Food Administrator Wilkins. Under the new regulations, the 50-50 basis for wheat is superseded by a 20-30 basis; that is, 20 per cent substitute to 80 per cent wheat flour, with the rule that the substitute must be either cornmeal, or barley flour. An endeavor is being made by the United States food administration to have all the millers turn out a mixed flour only, so that the flour consumer will have less difficulty in using the substitute. Hereafter, breakfast foods, such as cereals and other foods, which cannot be used conveniently in baking, cannot be purchased as wheat substitutes.

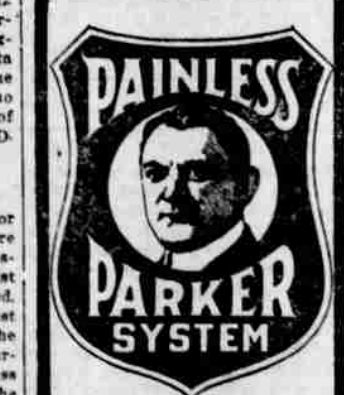
