BOYS IN HIGH SCHOOL WILL FINISH WORK AT FIRST OF YEAR

Graduation of Seniors to Permit Their Entrance Into S. A. T. C. at University Is Plan Under Consideration.

Plans are under consideration by the board of education in this city which will permit the graduation of boys in the senior class of the high school about January 1, so that they may enter the S. A. T. C. at the University at that time. This action is suggested by the government with a view to training the boys for service just as fast as conditions will permit. Superintendent of Schools W. R. Rutherford stated today that the plan will require a new course of study and special classes, concerning which some sort of a definite announcement will be made within the next few days. The object will be to advance the boys in their school work just as rapidly as possible.

School will start in Eugene Monday, but it is probable that in the high school and upper grades there may be a good many absentees for the first two or three weeks as a result of many harvest activities. Superintendent Rutherford has issued a statement urging boys who are engaged in necessary work to continue their work for the present, and has given assurances that such students will be given an opportunity to make up their studies for lost time. He believes that there will be a demand for the early closing of schools next spring, and for that reason it would not have been good policy to delay the opening of the fall term of school, keeping all the children away from their studies while only a portion are at work.

LITTLE STORIES OF THE WAR

With the American Army in France, Sept. 13.—Grim-faced, begrimed and stained after several days of desperate, continuous battle, a platoon of marines was firing rapidly but calmly and accurately at the Hun ranks.

The foe's numbers were in the majority, but the sea soldiers' fire was proving speedily evening.

Suddenly the Huns dropped their rifles and cried "kamerad."

The marines waited for the surrendering enemy to approach. When the foe came within 200 yards their first lines dropped. They had been dragging machine guns by ropes attached to their belts.

About 30 marines fell before their comrades with a yell of rage and revenge surged forward. The bayonet let not a Hun survive.

This is another example of Teuton treachery. It is told by an officer and two members of the platoon now in a hospital.

London, Sept. 7.—(By Mail.)—Eagle Hut was crowded as usual the other night when a grizzled veteran in the uniform of the Second London Scottish regiment made his way to the desk and asked the "Y" secretary in charge if there was any one from Boston in the building. Before he joined the colors, Sergeant Major J. Ripple had lived in Boston, and he yearned for a sight of some one from the New England metropolis.

Over in one corner of the room two young men sat in earnest conversation. Both had been blinded on the Marne and one of them, George Arthur Sugden, had returned from a German prison camp after eight months to seek his cousin, Vincent Francis Ripple, a sergeant in the 31st Canadian Rifle, in which both had enlisted soon after the war broke out. By chance they had come together under the hospitable Y. M. C. A. roof and were busily engaged in having a real reunion when the "Y" man shouted through a megaphone:

"Is there any one here from Boston? A veteran who hails from Boston wants to see some one from home."

"Here! Here!" came from the corner and two sightless pairs of eyes turned toward the voice. And as the cousins rose to their feet and haltingly started through the lane made as the crowd stepped back, Sergeant Major Ripple pushed toward them. There was an expression of hope in his face that the casual observer would have said could not have been inspired merely by a desire to see some one from Boston.

Suddenly that expression of hope was changed. Sergeant Major Ripple had been looking everywhere for his son and his nephew.

"My son!" he cried, in a voice that shook with emotion. "Vincent! And George!"

And in a moment his great arms were crushing them to him. There were cheers, and not a few tears, as room was made in the corner for three.

Soon the two blind boys will return to America. They will go first to La Salle, New York, where Vincent was living when he enlisted. Sugden enlisted from East Calgary, Alberta. "But they hailed from Boston, and to them the Y. M. C. A. has more than justified its selection as an essential part of the

It developed that there are a number of others belonging to the sect in the Irving neighborhood and some scattered in other parts of the county.

"I would ask him please not to do it, but if he insisted on doing it, I would not interfere," Woltz replied.

Gens, the interpreter, became very indignant at the statements made by the prisoners. He took out his own registration card and held it before Woltz and Ponchuck.

"I came to this country to be an American citizen," he said. "I am no Donkabor. When they want me, I am ready to go and fight for this country."

Sheriff Elkins notified the federal authorities this morning that he had the men in custody. They will be held in the county jail until officers are sent from Portland. The penalty for failure to register is one year imprisonment.

The registration in Eugene yesterday was much larger than anticipated. It had been estimated that 1000 would register at the city hall. A total of 1170 cards were issued. The case of Donkabor at Irving was the only trouble reported.
