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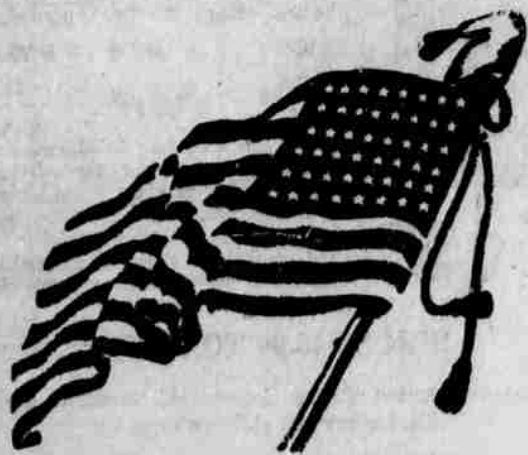

MOVING FORWARD

HUNDREDS of American boys gave their lives for their country on the battle line in France yesterday. Some of those who made the supreme sacrifice no doubt were from Oregon. The casualty lists when they come may contain the names of men from Lane county.

These men have given everything for their country and its ideal of right, justice and freedom. They have given their lives that the spiritual values of God shall triumph over the material values of the German emperor. They have given their lives for America and all that America means as a factor in the titanic conflict.

The man or woman whose heart was not thrilled with the announcement that "the first American offensive started this morning," is unworthy of a place under the same flag with the men who are moving forward "over there."

Moving forward! That is the thought that every American should have in mind.

Moving forward! Every man, woman and child can help to make more effective the advancing army of American manhood in France.

An announcement has been made that Dr. Esther Pohl Lovejoy, of Portland, a woman who has visited the battle front in France, will deliver an address here in connection with the sale of the bonds of the fourth Liberty loan. She will speak at 8 o'clock tonight at the armory.

Dr. Lovejoy is one of the leaders among the women of the nation who are moving forward. She is one of the mighty army of citizens that is rendering effective service at home.

Lane county should start tonight to move forward with the fourth Liberty loan by giving Dr. Lovejoy a tremendous ovation because of the message she brings and what it means to every American.

Our boys "over there" are advancing. Some of them have given so much that in comparison the most any of us can give is very little. There are some who possibly cannot buy bonds, but there are none who cannot show their red-blooded enthusiasm for their country's cause by their presence not only at the meeting to be addressed by Dr. Lovejoy but by their presence at every similar assembly of citizens to hear speakers who may be sent here during the course of the fourth Liberty loan campaign.

The people of Lane county, with the boys at the front in the midst of "the first American offensive," should show that they, too, are moving forward when their country calls and make the Dr. Lovejoy meeting a demonstration that will rouse to its highest pitch the patriotism of city and county.

CONSOLIDATING WAR FUNDS

DURING THE WEEK of November 11, a campaign will be inaugurated to raise a fund of \$170,500,000 for war activities of the Y. M. C. A., Catholic War Council and kindred organizations. President Wilson, in a letter to Raymond B. Fosdick, chairman on training camp activities of the war department, gives the plan his approval. He states:

"It was evident from the first, and has become increasingly evident, that the services rendered by these agencies to our army and to our allies are essentially one and all of a kind and must of necessity, if well rendered, be rendered in the closest co-operation. It is my judgment, therefore, that we shall secure the best results in the matter of the support of these agencies, if these seven societies will unite their forthcoming appeals for funds, in order that the spirit of the country in this matter may be expressed without distinction of race or religious opinion in support of what is in reality a common service.

"This point of view is sustained by the necessity, which the war has forced upon us, of limiting our appeals for funds in such a way that two or three comprehensive campaigns shall take the place of a series of independent calls upon the generosity of the country."

In giving out the president's letter, Mr. Fosdick made the following statement:

"The budgets of the seven authorized societies have been approved by the war department, through the commission on training camp activities, for the following amounts:

"Young Men's Christian Association	\$100,000,000
"Young Women's Christian Association	15,000,000
"National Catholic War Council (including the work of the Knights of Columbus and special war activities for women)	30,000,000
"Jewish Welfare Board	3,500,000
"American Library Association	3,500,000
"War Camp Community Service	15,000,000
"Salvation Army	3,500,000

\$170,500,000

"This sum, which is probably the largest ever asked for in a single appeal, will be the goal of the drive for the week of November 11. With the entire country behind it I am confident of its success."
