

FILM WILL NOT BE SHOWN ON SUNDAY IN EUGENE THEATRE

Manager A. H. McDonald Issues Statement Announcing Change in Plan to Present Wa. Feature on Three Days.

In canceling the Sunday performance of "The Hearts of the World" Manager McDonald of the Eugene Theatre last night issued the following public statement:

"Aside from business motives I desired to show 'The Hearts of the World' on Sunday, because I believe that it is, from an educational, historical and patriotic standpoint, a picture that every man, woman and child in Lane county would be benefited by seeing, and that within a visiting area of Eugene, there are 5,000 men employed in lumbering and farming, who could do so on no other day, without interruption of work which is of vital importance. It is an impossibility to show this picture more than twice daily, owing to the fact that it is accompanied by an orchestra, and the strain of playing more than the two shows, which are of about three hours each in length, is greater than their physical endurance and then two performances daily on Friday and Saturday will not afford seating capacity for Eugene alone. These facts were submitted to the members of the council, individually, and six members signed a permit for it to be shown with the approval of the mayor. The seventh member was consulted prior to the circulation of this petition, and from my conversation with him, I gathered the impression that he too, would sign it, or if he did not, he would certainly make no objection to the pictures being shown. The eighth member of the council was absent from the city."

"However, it develops that technically, this action has not the same legal force and effect as if granted at a meeting of the council. (The reason it was not presented to the council at a regular meeting was because there was no meeting to be held in time to enable me to contract for the picture), and is therefore illegal, at which fact I have just become cognizant—and while I believe that the city ordinance is itself illegal, I am too law-

abiding a citizen to test out even so illegal ordinance by breaking it, and have therefore determined not to show 'The Hearts of the World' on next Sunday.

"I regret the disappointment of the many who will be unable to see 'The Hearts of the World' on Friday and Saturday, and therefore not at all, not alone because they have been deprived of a wonderful spectacle, but because they are deprived of the right to exercise and obey the dictates of their own conscience. The most violent opponent of the showing of this picture on Sunday cannot without making himself ridiculous, object to 'The Hearts of the World' from any standpoint whatsoever.

"The council had my assurance that no steps would be taken to open the theatres regularly on Sunday, nor would they countenance such a proposition without submitting the matter to the people for a vote and to those who know the council and to those who know me, the idea that this was a subterfuge for regular Sunday opening, is absurd. Neither they nor I transact business in that manner."
