Council of National Defense and Manufacturers Reach Agreement.

In return for permitting the sale of so-called non-essential Holiday Gifts the Council calls upon the merchants not to increase their working forces or their hours of employment and to conduct a campaign for early Christmas shopping.

After conference with representatives of leading industries and retail interests concerned, it is found that the manufacture of goods for the coming Holiday season has been substantially completed, that the transportation of goods to the point of sale is also largely done.

The retail interests represented at the conference have agreed not to increase their working forces or hours of employment and to urge the Holiday purchases to be spread over the months of October, November and December.

The retail interests also have agreed to make weekly announcements of the ruling of the National Council of Defense. The Council has also agreed to co-operate with the merchants in carrying out the suggested measures.

The above suggestions, if faithfully and loyally put into effect throughout the country, will make possible a continuance of the Holiday custom without endangering the national interests thereby.

This announcement is definitely conditioned upon loyal and thorough co-operation in spirit and in letter on the part of sellers and buyers throughout the country.

FIRST PRACTICE FOR FOOTBALL SQUAD IS HELD ON CAMPUS

Regimental Team Gives Promise of Being Strong; Schedule Far from Made; Game at Pasadena Canceled.

The first football practice of the 1918 season was held at the University of Oregon Monday, with a large delegation of former varsity and freshmen squad members reporting to Sky Huntington, coach. There are at least a dozen of last year's varsity or freshmen back, and a large number of high school and smaller college stars reported for the initial practice. Dean H. Walker, graduate manager, is rapidly rounding a schedule into shape and expects by the end of the week to have definite replies from the University of Washington and the marines.

According to Colonel Lender, commandant of the civilian training camp, there will be several former well-known college stars in his camp and, as they are eligible to play on the regimental team, the prospects for a good gridiron season are encouraging. Lloyd Still and Dow Wilson are the two first team men of last season who are back and, with Jack Dundore and Landay McArthur, who spent last season on the scrubs, they will form the nucleus of this season's squad.

Of last year's freshmen eleven seven or eight are back, and they all appear to be ready for a strenuous year. Carl Mautz, is tipping the beam at 210 pounds and will probably clinch one of the guard positions. It will take a wonderful player to go around, over or under Mautz this year. Jacobberger, who did the kicking on the first team last season from fullback, seems to be the best in this department. John Brock, of Woodburn, is in the pink of condition and will make a strong bid for one of the line positions. He showed to advantage last year on the freshmen team and, as he is somewhat heavier this year, he should prove a valuable man to Huntington.

The game with the University of Southern California, which had been scheduled for Thanksgiving day, will have to be canceled, according to Walker. This move was made necessary by the ruling of the war department that the team may play only games that take Saturday afternoon and that can be reached by leaving the campus Friday evening. Just what service games with the teams of Camp Lewis and Vancouver can be played is being worked out. From present indications the season will be opened here by Multnomah club of Portland.

FALL OF GERMANY'S POLICY IN BALKANS AND RUSSIA FORSEEN

Russian and Rumanian Diplomats Predict Retirement of Bulgaria Means Restoration East to Allies.

Washington, Oct. 1.—Russian and Rumanian diplomats here today foresee the complete collapse of Germany's policy in the Balkans and in the east.

The signing of the armistice by Bulgaria on the terms laid down by the allies was interpreted by officials at the Russian embassy as the resumption of power in Bulgaria by the Russophile group of Bulgarian statesmen, represented by Premier Malinoff. This, it was declared, would prove in the near future a most powerful stimulant to the efforts of the revolutionary democracy to restore Russia's unity and independence.

The stimulant, Russian officials pointed out, would be both military and political.

The Russian embassy has received a cable confirming the report that Prince George Lvoff, formerly premier of the first provisional Russian government, is on his way to America to inform Ambassador Bakhmeteff and the American government of the latest events in Siberia and Russia.

Another cable received by the embassy indicated that General Horvath, who some time ago attempted a coup d'etat in eastern Siberia, which was frustrated by the action of the allies, will agree to submit to the authority of the Siberian government and accept a purely administrative post, probably as director of Siberian railways.

A cable from the central Russian government to the embassy also declared that General Bolderieff, who was named military chief of the new government, will hold this office temporarily and will be succeeded by General Alexieff. General Alexieff is now engaged in completing the organization of a new army in Siberia. He is assisted by the Czech-Slovak commander, General Guilla. Should events in the Balkans and the Ukraine justify it, it was pointed out, this new army will be rushed into the Ukraine preparatory to co-operation with the allied armies.

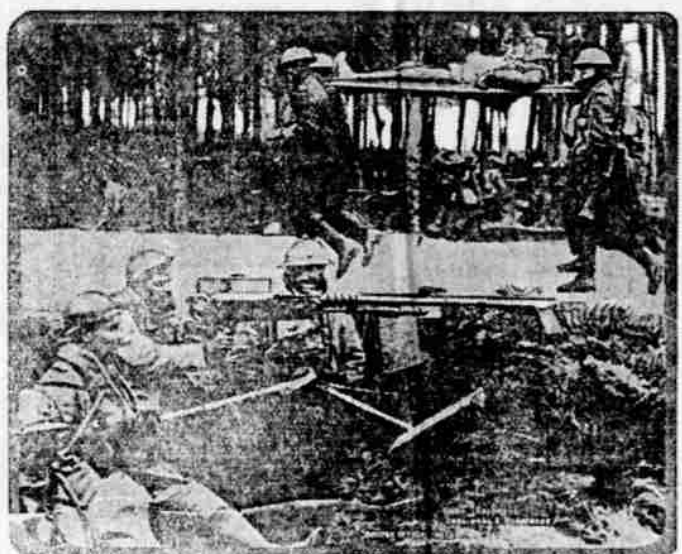

JOHN WESLEY GIBSON DIED WHILE FIGHTING BRAVELY AT FRONT

Lane County Boy Gave His Life as Volunteer in Effort to Take German Machine Gun Nest.

John Wesley Gibson, Lane county boy, volunteered for a service that cost his life when in the thick of the fighting at Boise de Relean, according to a letter received by his mother, Mrs. L. C. Sherman, from Captain Richard N. Platt, of Company K, Third Battalion, Fifth Regiment, United States marines, commander of the unit to which Gibson was attached.

Captain Platt tells how a call was made for volunteers to take a machine gun nest. Gibson was one of the men that responded. The letter, in part, follows:

"While with his company, Private Gibson had an excellent record. He was in all respects the type and exemplar of the best American spirit and action. His death is a loss to the marine corps, but it adds the name of a soldier who died doing his duty fearlessly and to the list of those who are making the great sacrifice in order that freedom may be preserved for the lives of men. For your personal loss there can be little consolation, but you can rejoice that you have been permitted to make this contribution to the greatest cause for which men can struggle and that your brave boy knew the worth of the cause for which he fought and counted its dangers as nothing if only that right might prevail."

The letter states that Private Gibson was killed on June 6 and that he was buried near where he fell.

Mrs. Sherman has two other boys in the service.

THIRD AND GREATEST DRAFT LOTTERY OVER

Drawing Proceeds for 20 Hours at Rate of 18 Numbers Per Minute.

Washington, Oct. 1.—Breaking all records for speed, America's third and greatest draft lottery ended at 8 o'clock this morning after proceeding without pause for 20 hours.

The clock was striking the hour when General Crowder personally plucked the last pellet from the bowl and "12,724" was called out as the final number.

Working in shifts throughout the night the officers in charge reached a speed of 18 numbers listed every minute in the closing hours.

CLOCKS TO BE TURNED BACK ON OCTOBER 27

Daylight Saving Under Act of Congress will Continue for Another Four Weeks.

Daylight saving continues for another four weeks, the clocks to be turned back at 2 a. m. Sunday morning, October 27, under the provision made last spring by congress. At that time sunset and sunrise will be an hour earlier and the sun will be in the sky another hour of sleep in the morning.

Army Bulletins Issued to War Off Spanish Influenza

Spanish influenza has not yet invaded Oregon. Preventive measures have been taken to prevent appearance of the malady. A special bulletin has been issued by Major J. D. Cope, head of the spruce production division, and ordered read to all air service detachments.

Recommendations and orders in part are:
