**FIRST S. A. T. C. MEN
TO LEAVE DEC. 1ST**

Next Contingent to Start for
Camps January 1; Third, One
Month Later.

December 1 has been set as the date for the departure of the first contingent of S. A. T. C. men from the University of Oregon unit for the army camps. The second contingent will leave January 1, and the third a month later. Instructions to this effect have been received from the war department by Colonel W. H. C. Bowen, commandant of the Oregon unit.

This arrangement, Colonel Bowen explains, has been made with a view to getting the men to the central training schools approximately at the dates of the opening of new classes.

The selection of the men to leave on the different dates will be made by the personnel officers at the University.

Those who are sifted out by December 1 will have one month less than a full term of instruction here, while those who remain until February 1 will receive an extra month of instruction.
