ALLIED WAR REVIEW.

MUTT AND JEFF.

DISTRUST OF HUN PROPOSAL IS FELT IN ALL QUARTERS

Churchill Says Offer Fills Him with Misgivings; Newspapers of Allied and Neutral Countries Wary.

Glasgow, Oct. 8.—Winston Churchill, British minister of munitions, speaking here, expressed lack of faith in the purpose of the new German government, as outlined in the latest German peace proposals.

"The last proposals for peace from Germany fill me with misgiving," he said. "A new government has been formed, but is it a government of repentance or maneuver?"

"We cannot accept smooth words as expiation for foul deeds. We cannot stop without a guarantee. Wilson, Clemenceau and Lloyd-George cannot be trapped."

"Owing to the shortness of the season in France and the uncertainty that our demands will receive the required recognition, we have no right to court the immediate end of the war."

Rome, Oct. 8.—Newspapers of Italy show distrust for the new peace proposals from Berlin and Vienna. They caution the public to be on guard against treachery.

Madrid, Oct. 8.—The latest German peace proposal has stirred officials and newspapers of Spain. The consensus of opinion is that the time for peace talk will be not until the allies have entered German territory and vanquished the enemy.

The Diario Universal says: "It is clear the allies cannot treat with the Germans until they enter German territory, realizing that the Kaiser is trying to save the dynasty."

"The peace Germany has demanded is not peace," declares the Opaco. "Vanquished peace is not here because Germany has not assented to President Wilson's points without modification."

Chicago, Oct. 8.—That Austria-Hungary must be wiped off the map, giving autonomy to its many nationalities, is the opinion expressed here today by Professor Thomas G. Masaryk, head of the new Czechoslovak nation.

"The freedom of the oppressed nations can never be guaranteed while the dual monarchy dominates them and is itself dominated by Germany," said Professor Masaryk. "Germany merely uses Austria as a bridge to Constantinople," he said. Masaryk called Prince Max's speech asking peace "nonsense." He said it should stir America to greater efforts to over-subscribe the Liberty loan.

Masaryk was here to take part in the Illinois centennial celebrations.

Uses Cleaver as Tomahawk on Burglar in His Room

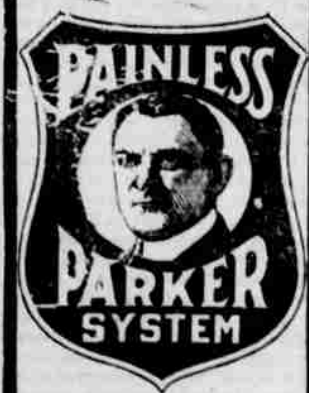

Expect Answer to Hun Note To Be Made Today

vided Austria and Germany will make necessary concessions.

That is the extreme disposition, as reflected here. The American attitude, as reflected by congress, the press and the general public is to leave the peace door open only to one concession, an unconditional surrender.

Early this afternoon the president called into consultation with him Secretary of State Lansing, Colonel House and Private Secretary Tumulty.

Colonel House for a long time has made a close study of the international situation with a view to printing data needed in the final peace settlement. As the president's closest adviser, he probably will have an important bearing on the executive's answer.

Secretary Lansing is believed to favor an answer along the lines of that originally given Austria. But there are indications that something less brief will be the retort.

Washington, Oct. 8.—That America's answer to the Teutonic peace offer would be forthcoming today, or very soon afterward, was the indication in official quarters this forenoon.

Both White House and state department spokesmen professed to be ignorant today of the time or nature of the president's reply. It seems apparent that the president was shaping his own course and had not yet seen fit to take into his confidence either White House assistants or the state department.

Rumor had it that President Wilson will elucidate his position in an address to congress, but this version lacked confirmation.

It was known that the president had given deep consideration to the nature of his reply. There was a general feeling that quick, terse action would serve American purposes best. Speculation with respect to the reply turned on two elements.

First, will President Wilson consult the allies as to his course?

Second, will his answer inform the Teutons, as has been done in the past, that the present Teuton form of government is not to be trusted and that peace cannot be made until the government is responsible to the people?

In the first case, the only light forthcoming was information from the state department that the president would not necessarily advise with the allies, even though he was asked by the Teutons notes to transmit the situation to them.

As for the second, experts in propaganda said the present situation offers a golden opportunity to drop the idea that autocracy must be stripped away before peace can be made with the Teuton nations. Such a statement, forcefully made at this time, it was argued, might stir up the brewing spirit of revolt at least in Austria, and cause a break in the political alignment of the central powers.

President Wilson has repeatedly said he does not desire to dictate the form of government to Germany and Austria, but, at the same time, he has pointed out that there can be no trust in the Hohenzollern Hapsburg murder-burglars. Hence, it is a preliminary to any peace discussion that the people of the central powers shall be speaking rather than that their war lords shall be the mouth piece.

The unanimity of the response of the nation—no peace until there is an unconditional surrender—makes it certain that the president will voice a firm rejection of the tricky Teuton notes. The only subjects for decision are questions of form and substance.

The Turkish peace offer probably will be delivered today or tomorrow via the Spanish embassy.

west of Damascus and is about 175 miles southwest of Aleppo. It is connected with Aleppo by a railway which joins the Damascus-Aleppo line at Homs, about 100 miles north of Damascus.

The character of the fighting along the west front indicates the Germans are preparing for what may be a general retreat from the North sea to the Rhine region, but that they will make the Champagne-Artois battle one of the decisive engagements of the war. This is particularly true of the encounter between the Argonne and the Meuse, where the enemy has contested every foot of ground with unusual bitterness.

The French and Americans made slight gains along the Suipe, the former capturing Berry-au-Bac, near the junction of the Suipe and the Aisne and reaching the outskirts of St. Etienne-Sur-Suipe. Further east the village of St. Etienne-a-Arnes was recaptured after it had been lost to the Germans.

The day communique of the German war office mentioned violent attacks by the Americans between the Argonne and the Meuse, a front of about 15 miles. Unofficial reports state that this fighting resulted in the capture of Chateau-Chevre and important heights west of the Aire.

In the St. Quentin region the French have slightly improved their positions. The British, in an attack on a four-mile front southwest of Douai yesterday, captured the villages of Oppy and Blache-St. Vaast. Some progress was also made by them south of Cambrai.

French Advance Mile

Paris, Oct. 8.—French troops advanced about a mile in the region north of Rheims yesterday, reaching the village of Coudé, at the junction of the Suipe and Aisne rivers, the war office announced today.

Bazancourt (eight miles northeast of Rheims) was captured and Isles-sur-Suipe (a mile east of Bazancourt) was penetrated.

"In the region of St. Quentin there was artillery activity last night," the communique said.

"On the Suipe front we reached the



borders of Conde. We also penetrated Isles-sur-Suipe and took Bazancourt, despite violent but unsuccessful German counter attacks."

Russia Throws Off Bolshev- vik Yoke Rapidly

convention at Ufa was composed of all the members of the constituent assembly, representatives of the temporary governments of Siberia, the Urals, North Russia and Estonia, representatives of the cosaks of Orenburg, Uralish, Siberia, Irkutsk, Semiretch, Yenisei and Astrakhan; representatives of the governments of the Bashkirs and Kirghis of Turkestan and the Turko-Tatars of the interior of Russia and Siberia; representatives of the convention of municipalities and zemstvos of Siberia, the Urals and the Volga; of the Social-Revolutionary; Social-Democratic; Socialist-Labor and Constitutional-Democratic parties, of the Social-Democratic group "Yedinstvo" and the association for the re-birth of Russia.

Workmen Are United.
This government unites the overwhelming majority of the workmen, peasants, democratic, bourgeois and the intellectual classes of Russia in the common aim of saving the country and the revolution.

The chief consideration of the new government is the fear of a possible premature peace by the allies and Germany before the re-entrance of Russia into the war.

Ambassador Bakhmeteff is keeping the new government informed of every diplomatic move made by the United States in an effort to assure it that the possibility of a premature and inconclusive peace is so remote as to be without the bounds of possibility.

Cables received at the Russian embassy today outline in detail the principal position on which the new government is founded.

1. Until the moment of the convocation of the constituent assembly the Russian provisional government is the sole possessor of supreme power over the whole territory of Russia.

2. On order of the Russian provisional government all functions of supreme power temporarily exercised by the regional governments are transmitted to the provisional government.

3. Definition of the limits of power of the regional governments which are to be founded on broad, regional autonomy, is confined to the judgment of the Russian provisional government.
