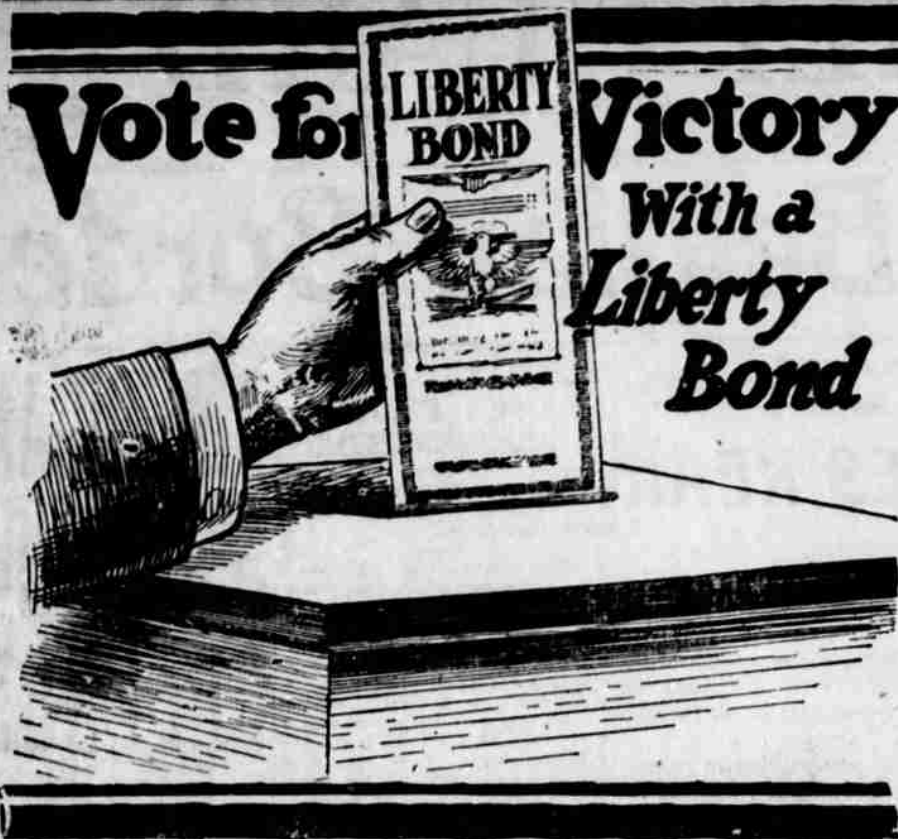

AMERICANS SMASH HUN DEFENSES

the defenses by artillery preparation, but the surprise attack enabled the infantry to penetrate the lines within a few hours and hold them.

The Austrians were anxious to surrender. One captain was found waiting on the trunk of a fallen tree.

All the principal centers behind the German lines were bombed extensively in connection with the attack. Tons of explosives were dropped on Metz, Vionviere and points along the Meuse.

Eighty-five allied planes crossed the enemy lines during a period of less than an hour.

Lieutenants Erwin and Esterbrook brought down two boche machines and forced another to retire.

Major Whittesey, commander of the battalion which was rescued after being trapped in the Argonne forest for five days, returned to his regiment yesterday, saying he needed no rest.

With the American First Army, Oct. 10.—Heavy fighting is under way in the region of Romagne (between the Meuse and the Argonne) where the Germans are rushing in reinforcements and concentrating artillery.

The enemy is frantically reinforcing the sides of what remains of the Argonne pocket, while withdrawing in the center.

More than 200 allied bombing planes, 100 battle planes and 50 chasers are in action. The Franco-American air forces simultaneously attacked the cantonment area near Damvilliers and Waville (east of the Meuse, where the Germans were massing for counter attacks, shooting down 12 boches, with only one casualty.

Continuous Yankee artillery fire cracked the Kriemhilde line near Romagne. The infantry, storming the Romagne hills found wrecked German artillery in the demolished positions.

Artillery Smashes Works.

The remaining defenders, unable to retreat through the American artillery and machine gun barrage, crawled forward toward our positions and waited to surrender.

The enemy machine gunners back of these defenders, put up quite a resistance, especially in Cusnel wood, which the advancing doughboys mopped up before noon. A great mass of German infantry protected by machine gunners was encountered on either side of the wood and the American advance was temporarily halted.

The artillery during the attack worked so fast that gunners threw cold water over the barrels of the guns to cool them off.

The army is enthusiastic over the success of the attack, as it leaves no further organized trench and wire defenses to the Germans.

The Romagne heights, now held by us, also dominates the enemy position for miles to their rear.

Pershing Reports 2,000 Captives

Washington, Oct. 10.—Continued advance by the Americans east of the Meuse to the outskirts of Sivry and penetration of the German line west of the Meuse, with capture of 2,000 additional prisoners Wednesday, was reported by General Pershing today.

"East of the Meuse our troops maintained their yesterday's advance in spite of violent and repeated counter attacks," the communiqué said, "and progressed to the southern outskirts of Sivry and into the Bois de Chaume. West of the Meuse, against freshly engaged divisions, we have penetrated the enemy's line between Cusnel and Romagne-Sous-Montfaucien. In the Argonne forest we have taken important heights south of Marcy and have joined hands with the French at Lancon. Over two thousand additional prisoners have been taken."

ALLIED ARMIES WITHIN TWO MILES OF HUN BASE

OF SUPPLY AT LE CATEAU

Why should we?" asked a German private who became a willing prisoner.

While the fighting was resumed in full force at dawn yesterday morning and some advances had been recorded north of Cambrai, even before that hour, the break was not noticeable until mid-day.

Then some tanks and whippets were sent as scouts across objectives varying from four to six thousand yards beyond the starting point. A short time later the infantry had deployed in many places far ahead of these objectives.

German Losses Staggering

The number of captured and slain Germans is staggering. Prisoners already filled the prepared cages to overflowing, while dead Germans and dead German horses strewn the ground everywhere. This, despite the fact that the English, Scotch, New Zealand, French and American troops participating in the advance have escaped with light losses.

Among the hundreds of German dead, wherever the Americans rushed forward, an unusual proportion were found with only a single clear bullet wound, bearing out admirably reports of the remarkable use the Yanks made of their rifles against the boche machine gunners.

The youngsters were not too busy shooting to take prisoners, however, as is shown by the fact that 1,050 men and 50 officers were in the American cage before noon and more were coming back.

They also took time to assist 32 old men and women and some children to escape from Mont Brehin to the rear.

These French townfolk had been in the hands of the Germans for four years. The Australians captured the town three times before it stayed captured. In the meantime the citizens remained in their cellars four days and nights. When some Americans passed through on their way to join their comrades up in front, they asked to be sent back. This was promptly done.

Yanks Have Successful Day.

These French people made no complaints of German cruelty. A French of-

ficer, experienced in handling refugees, explained discrepancies in stories of enemy treatment of civilians by saying it depends largely on the personal character of the German town commandant, who is an autocrat in complete control.

The tanks had one of the most successful days yesterday in their comparatively brief military career. They went forward in long zig-zag lines, crushing machine gun nests and meeting with only a minimum of disasters.

Lieutenant Kohr, of Washington, D. C., commanding a tank squadron with all-American crews, said:

"We went straight through them without a bubble. There wasn't a single ditch between the kick-off and the goal."

"When I left," said Carmon Denier, of Yorkville, Tenn., "the Germans were running every way, ducking into cabbage holes. They didn't want to fight."

John Bunton, of Greenville, S. C., and Charles Freeman of Anderson, S. C., confirmed Denier's statement.

A German officer in the prisoner's cage of a certain American brigade, when asked why his soldiers ran, sighed and said:

"German officers have a hard time now. The men won't fight. The Kaiser's order of the day, telling us he wants peace, was read by the men when we received it day before yesterday. It hasn't helped any. The war is over, so far as we are concerned."

Another officer said he didn't suppose the allies would agree to peace now. Asked why he thought that, he replied that he "didn't know, just felt sure."

A third officer was greatly interested in the peace proposal and wanted all the details. He said the democratizing of Germany already is under way, but that he doubted if the people want to dismiss the Kaiser.

It was a great day in the air, not only for the airplanes, but for propagandists, who sent up hundreds of paper balloons, carrying messages to the German troops.

The refugees from Mont Brehin reiterated the valuable effect such literature is having on the German soldiers.

Cambrai Completely Looted

Entering Cambrai last night I saw notices on the walls ordering evacuation of the city at midnight Tuesday. The inhabitants were permitted to remove only what they could carry. All portable things were left at the town hall, under the protection of the German authorities, though no liability was assumed for their safety.

Investigation of the first 15 or 20 houses revealed that all had been looted completely. The cathedral, used as an observation post by the Germans, had been badly shelled. The tower appeared ready to fall. The figure of the Virgin atop the tower, however, was undamaged. Twenty fires could be seen along the street leading toward the center of the city. In some of the burning houses the windows were still unbroken, indicating the destruction was the work of deliberate arson and not shells.

The taking of Cambrai badly upset the German plans for retirement. They had been seeking to maintain a gradual withdrawal outside the city, the defenses of which had made it almost the strongest point anywhere in the line. This explains yesterday's desperate counter attack with captured British tanks. It was broken up with anti-tank guns which the British had captured from the Germans.

Huns Expected to Hold

Holding Cambrai, the Germans expected to spend two weeks retiring toward Douai and an equal length of time reaching the Guis defense line along the Oise.

Because of this pivot's importance, it was expected that the enemy would resist to their utmost along the line of towns and villages behind Cambrai.

While British cavalry was operating well to the eastward of Bertr (four miles west of Le Cateau) infantry marched through the village in column formation. It was one of the most remarkable sights of the war and has scarcely been duplicated since the Germans first over-ran Belgium.

Leon Attack Renewed

Paris, Oct. 10.—Renewal of the attack in the Leon region was announced by the French war office today. Progress was made there, as well as east of St. Quentin and in the Champagne.

"During the night our pursuit of the enemy continued east of St. Quentin," the communiqué said.

"We occupied Landricourt wood and passed Beaurieux and Fontaine Notre Dame."

"North of the Aisne (in the Leon region) we vigorously pushed the enemy back in the region east of Ostel. We

hold La Croix San Stele tableland and crossed the Aisne canal further eastward in the region of Villers-en-Francheres.

"In the Champagne a sharp attack allowed us to take Liry, with some prisoners."
