ANOTHER PIONEER IS CALLED TO REST

James McClaren, Aged 85 yrs., Passes After an Illness of More Than Three Years.

James McClaren, aged 84 years and 10 months, and one of Lane county's pioneers, died Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock after an illness of about three years. Tuesday evening he suffered a paralytic stroke from which he did not recover.

Funeral services will be held at the Gordon and Veatch chapel Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock with Rev. A. M. Spangler in charge. Interment will be in the Masonic cemetery where Eugene Lodge No. 11, A. F. and A. M. will have charge of the services.

Mr. McClaren was born December 25, 1835, in the city of Glasgow, Scotland. He came to the United States in 1850 and spent his boyhood years in Philadelphia. In 1855 he came to Oregon and settled in Eugene, afterwards visiting California and Idaho, but finally settled in Eugene and was married to Miss Annie Blair July 17, 1870. To this union was born three children, only one of whom is now living, William F. McClaren of Eugene. He is also survived by his widow and one grandson, James B. McClaren of Portland.

Mr. McClaren was an honored member of the city council in the early days, and was also a member of the first fire department formed in this city. He was a charter member of the A. O. U. W. and the oldest member of the Masonic lodge in Eugene.

Deceased has always been highly respected in this community and was a loving and kind husband and father, a good friend to all, always willing to assist wherever possible in times of need. Although ill for a number of years his influence has carried far.

ALLIED INFANTRY WITH SUPPORT OF MONITORS MARCHES ON ZEEBRUGGE

that the Germans are on the point of collapse. The enemy probably intends to retreat to a line running through Antwerp, Brussels and Namur and thence along the right bank of the Meuse. Germany will no doubt attempt to delay the allied advance on the line of the Scheldt, which is of great natural strength, although no extensive prepared positions exist along it.

Important Gains Made.

Paris, Oct. 17.—(Delayed)—French troops made important advances on three fronts, the war office announced tonight. Co-operating with the Belgians and British in Flanders, they captured Pittem, Meulbeke and Wynghe. In the Oise region they reached the approaches of Wassigny and Guise. West of Grandpre they advanced in the face of violent counter attacks.

The French, co-operating with the British and Belgians in the magnificent advances in Flanders, today took Pittem, Meulbeke and Wynghe despite energetic resistance," the communique said. "In the region of the Oise we continued lively attacks throughout the day between the Andigny forest and the river and obtained notable gains. We took Petit Verly and Marchevenne, passed Grougis and Aisonville and reached the outskirts of Hauteville. On the left bank of the Oise we took Mont D'Origny. Twelve hundred prisoners were counted. "Between the Aisne and the Aire there was fighting west of Grandpre where the Germans violently counter attacked. We progressed a few north of Oilly."

12-Mile Advance Made.

London, Oct. 17.—(Delayed)—Allied troops today advanced more than 12 miles on the whole 35-mile front between the North sea and the Lys river, Field Marshal Haig announced tonight.

The British are on the outskirts of Tourcoing. Belgian cavalry is at the gates of Bruges.

"The advance continued on the whole front from the North sea to the Lys today to a depth of 20 kilometers," the statement said.

"The Belgians entered Ostend and their cavalry is at the gates of Bruges. We occupied Ingelmarskerk."

"The French captured Pittem, Meulbeke and Wynghe."

"The British are on the outskirts of Tourcoing and occupied the line of the Lys north of Courtrai."

Allies Hammer Blows Home

London, Oct. 18.—The allies are rapidly driving home their victories, both on the west front and in the Balkans.

While the Germans are being thrown back by continuous hammer blows from the North sea to Verdun, allied troops are over-running Serbia and have successfully invaded Montenegro.

Official reports show fully two-thirds of Serbia re-occupied, the Montenegrin town of Ipek captured, the allies within 12 to 20 miles of Austrian soil at two points and the Austrian army in Albania being rapidly outflanked from the north.

The entire Belgian coast appears to have been evacuated by the Germans. The Belgians are officially reported on the outskirts of Bruges, while it is reported that the enemy has fled from Zeebrugge, the last remaining German submarine base on Belgian territory.

Bruges is only seven miles from the Dutch border. Further south the allies have passed Thiek and are within less than 15 miles of Ghent. Across the border, in France, the British are officially reported on the outskirts of Tourcoing and are rapidly approaching Roubaix.

Douai is Entered.

Douai, which the British had dominated for weeks, has been entered. The Anglo-American attack yesterday

between Bohain and Le Cateau carried them to within less than a mile of the railway center of Wassigny and shortened the distance to the vital enemy base of Hirson to 20 miles. Le Cateau was completely cleared of Germans. More than 3,000 prisoners were taken in these operations.

French troops, co-operating on the Anglo-American right, made important advances along the Oise, mopping up more than half of the Andigny forest and penetrating to within two miles of Guise.

Further progress was made by the French and Americans in the Champagne-Ardenne region. The Americans improved their positions on both sides of the Meuse.

Unofficial reports have been received that allied troops have occupied Sedrak, in the trans-Caspian region.

REFORMATION IN PROGRESS IN GERMAN EMPIRE

ing reported German and Austro-Hungarian political reforms and regarding persistent, though unofficial reports that Germany was applying no torments to her path to retreat and was calling home her U-boats.

The political reforms may be sincere, it is admitted. On the other hand, there is much question as to whether the Germans have undertaken a sufficiently broad course to meet the president's terms—no Hohenzollern rule, or at least a powerless Hohenzollern rule.

For instance, Germany is apparently saying the kaiser cannot declare war except when Germany is invaded. This great war started on the false claim that Germany was to be invaded and it is foreseen that the present reported reform does not prevent the kaiser from starting war on a very meager provocation.

Camouflage Is Possible

These reforms may be regarded in Germany as meeting the president's demands; on the other hand, they may mean that Germany and Austria are preparing their own people and then are going ahead in a last endeavor to stir them up to the "war of defense."

The military requirements apparently are being met for the moment. According to all reports, the latest evacuations from the west lines have been without the ruthless military useless destructions that marked the earlier retreats. President Wilson decreed that such barbarities should cease as a peace preliminary.

Taken with the political reform, this military reformation is held as meaning that the German proposes to make a new diplomatic maneuver, in which he will claim he has met the president's terms.

Reports persist that an answer is being forwarded; and likewise that something in the way of a reply will come from the reichstag session. On both points, the government professed early today to be in the dark. However, it is anticipated that before many days the nation will find some new phase of the German peace offensive, for there is no mistaking the German desire for peace and the German effort to keep the peace subject alive, authorities say.

INFLUENZA CLAIMS THOMAS TOWNSEND

First Victim Among Members of Officers' Training Corps at University Reported.

The first death from Spanish influenza among the students in the officers' training camp at the University of Oregon was that of Thomas R. Townsend of Salem, who was a member of company D. The end came shortly before 6 o'clock Thursday evening at the Eugene hospital, he having been moved from the Phi Delta Theta infirmary several days ago.

Mrs. Townsend who came from Salem Tuesday was with him at the time of his death as were his brother, John, and sister, Mary.

A short funeral service was held at the Gordon and Veatch chapel at 10 o'clock this morning, after which a military escort of members of the training corps took the remains to the train. The remains will be interred at Salem.

Mr. Townsend graduated from the University of Oregon in 1900 and was later a teacher in the Eugene high school. Before enrolling at the training camp he was valley representative of the Allen and Lewis wholesale grocery house of Portland with headquarters in Portland. He was a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity and of the Masonic lodge.
