TWO YOUNG WOMEN VICTIMS OF PLAGUE

Miss Catherine Heilig, U. of O. and Miss Eleanor Sanderson Bible University, Victims.

Influenza has claimed two young women as its victims in Eugene. Miss Catherine Heilig, who was a student at the University of Oregon, and Miss Eleanor Sanderson, who was a student at the Bible University.

There seems to be little change in the influenza situation in the county, excepting that improvements are noted at the University.

The death of Miss Catherine Heilig, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James C. Heilig of Portland, occurred Tuesday afternoon at the Mercy hospital here following an illness of a week with influenza and pneumonia. The end came at 5:30 o'clock. In the fore part of the afternoon it had seemed that Miss Heilig's condition was improving.

Mr. and Mrs. Heilig were at the bedside of their daughter at the time of her death, having arrived here from Portland on Monday.

Miss Heilig was in her sophomore year at the University, where she was a popular member of Chi Omega. She was prominent both in student body and social affairs on the campus. She was 20 years of age.

The deceased is survived by the father and mother, the former being owner of the Heilig Theatre in Portland, a brother, John, in service in France, and a brother James, of Portland.

The remains have been taken to Portland for interment.

Miss Eleanor Sanderson, aged 17 years, died Tuesday at 8 p. m. at the home of her parents, Dr. and Mrs. E. C. Sanderson, 515 Twelfth avenue east, from influenza.

Miss Sanderson was taken ill a week ago last Saturday. Her mother and brother Mark are also suffering from influenza, but were reported as improving Wednesday morning. She was born September 27, 1901, in Eugene, and has spent her life here. She was a graduate of the Eugene high school and a student at the Bible University, of which her father is president.

Her sister, Mrs. Vera Hovis, died July, 1917. She leaves a father and mother and one brother, Mark.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

MAX DECLARES GERMANY MUST RESIST VIOLENT PEACE UNTIL ANSWERED

case, we have no choice but to assume a posture of defense, with the strength of people driven to the last extremity. In the event of such necessity, I have no doubt that the German government, in the name of the German people, will issue a call for national defense, in the way it spoke for the people when it took action for peace.

"We who honestly took a stand on the basis of a peace of justice, are undertaking this duty of not submitting to a peace of violence without fighting.

"Regarding the second possibility the German people must not be blindly brought to the conference table. They have a right to ask what a peace on Wilson's terms will mean for our life in the future. Our answer to President Wilson must be framed on the people's understanding of this question. The people want clearness. The discussion with our opponents and not our strength, will decide what we think is right.

National Epitaph Admitted.

"The essence of President Wilson's program for a league of nations cannot be accomplished unless all peoples have the right of self-determination. Realization of community law means arrangement of part of that unqualified independence which hitherto we, with others, considered an indication of sovereignty. Should we at home maintain the national egoism which until recently dominated our national life, then there would be no restitution and renovation for us. There would be a feeling of bitterness which would cripple us for generations. But if we comprehend that this frightful war is, over all, a victory for the plea of justice, and submit to it with no mental reservation, we will find in it the cure for our present wounds and a reservoir for future strength.

Prussian Equality Assorted

"None can foresee whether the next few weeks will call us to fight on, or open the way for peace. There is no doubt we are now equal to the task of either war or peace by carrying out our

government's program and definitely breaking away from the old system.

"The legal question will not stop at our boundaries, which we will never open for violence of our own accord. The principles upon which we have agreed as our rule of conduct also involve internal questions. Thanks to the parties' acquiescence in the government's proposal for electoral reforms, Prussia now has advanced so far that equal direct suffrage has been secured.

"Bills now pending before the reichstag make it possible for members of that body to enter the cabinet without resigning their seats. There is also a change in the law regarding the chancellor's representation. Hitherto the highest officials only were able to represent the chancellors. In the future, deputies may participate in the direction of the imperial policy, being responsible in the chancellor's name without actually being ministers. We are convinced the government and parliament thereby may supply precious forces for the people which up to this time have not been utilized.

Political Reforms Hinted

"I hope soon to reveal to the reichstag the results of the preliminary labors regarding legal extension of the chancellor's political responsibilities, which will be secured by formation of a state tribunal.

"The new system of imperial government involves a new government for Alsace-Lorraine. Alsations appointed by the governor and secretary of state, leaders of the second chamber of the diet, will be members of the provisional government.

"The aim of myself and my colleagues is a political authority for the German people. The people long have been in the saddle. Now they are to ride. Political development at the end of September changed everything guaranteeing continuance of the growth of the new system.

"The enemy is at our gates! Our first and last thoughts must be for the brave defenders whom we must defend against unjust charges. There are bad elements in every army. With the fundamental will of the people the army will disown them.

"In retrospect, the recent political harvest creates different feelings, some regarding it as a reckless descent in the direction of the destruction of existing orders; others believe the times are uncertain and are groping for reform. Both opinions should be expressed. Opposition insures parliamentary independence."

BRITISH IN NEW DRIVE GAIN MILE

at Ooverbroeck. The French advanced nearly two miles, south of Denz, crossing the Lys near Vive-St. Bavon.

French troops pushed the Germans back again in the Serre valley, clearing the south bank of the river as far east as Mortiers.

Fierce fighting was resumed in the region east of Vaudreux. In the face of German counter attacks, Czechoslovaks, co-operating with the French, recaptured the village of Terron-sur-Aune, four miles north of Vaudreux.

In the Balkans, the French have reached the Danube at Lom Palanka, and now hold the south bank of that river on a front of nearly 20 miles, in Bulgarian territory, facing the Rumanian frontier. Serbian, Montenegrin and French detachments continue to cut the rear guards of the retreating Austro-Germans to pieces, taking numbers of prisoners and great quantities of material.

British and Yanks Attack

London, Oct. 23.—British and American troops attacked early today on the Le Cateau-Solmes front (about 10 miles). Field Marshal Haig announced, "Good progress" was reported.

The British have captured Bruay, on the west bank of the Scheldt (three miles northeast of Valenciennes).

French Push Ahead

Paris, Oct. 23.—French troops gained slightly between Nizy-le-Comte and Le Thour, on the Serre front last night, the war office announced today.

"The Germans prevented an attempt to cross the Serre at Souche. Along the Oise there was a lively artillery duel throughout the night," said the communique.

"The first army so far in October has captured 81 guns, 100 trench mortars, over 700 machine guns, a number of other guns, munition depots and all kinds of material.

"On the Serre front the enemy continues vigilant, opposing our attempt to cross the Serre at Souche by machine guns. Further east we gained between Nizy-le-Comte and Le Thour, taking prisoners.

"Elsewhere the night was calm."

At an early hour this morning we attacked on the Le Cateau-Solmes front the statement said. "Good progress is reported."

Further north between Valenciennes and Tournai we have taken Bruay and have reached the west bank of the Scheldt and Biebriches and Espin. Considerable resistance was met on this front yesterday. In sharp fighting in which we pressed the enemy vigorously, we inflicted many casualties and drove him from his positions, capturing a number of prisoners.

CHURCHILL REQUESTS CHILDREN TO HELP

Victory Boys and Girls Will Conduct United War Work Campaign Throughout Ore.

Plans are being made in Lane county for the Victory Boys and Victory Girls to aid in the campaign to raise funds for the united war work. The request is being made to the teachers of the state by Superintendent Churchill. His letter follows:

"I was able to get first-hand information in Portland last Friday concerning the coming campaign in Oregon for the united war work to be held November 11 to 18. As you doubtless know, the Young Men's Christian Association, the Young Women's Christian Association, the Knights of Columbus, the Jewish Welfare, the War Campaign Community, the American Library Association and the Salvation Army have all combined their drives into the one drive. The campaign then is to be made on behalf of seven different organizations, all doing war work, and these seven are co-operating in this one campaign at the request of President Wilson. One feature of the campaign will be particularly interesting to us, namely, the Victory Boys and Victory Girls, which campaign will be conducted by Walter A. Goss as state manager. I went through with Mr. Goss, very carefully, his plans for conducting the campaign through the schools of Oregon, just as it was done last year.

"You will be advised from Mr. Goss' office what is wanted from us as a school organization. Under his leadership pupils in our public schools are to do their part in the coming campaign to alleviate suffering at the front and to mitigate the horrors of war. The move-

ment is nation-wide and from information I received at Mr. Goss' office Friday, I believe Oregon can lead the nation in the Victory Boys and Victory Girls just as we have led in many other war activities. I earnestly petition you to give this campaign every possible help and attention."

YANKS PLAY LEAD ROLE IN BATTLE

A heavy morning fog Thursday hid the German machine guns and almost caused the tanks to lose their way.

The German resistance was bitter. It began simultaneously with the attack, when they let down a heavy barrage that lasted 36 hours. It included gas and was directed at St. Souplet and the line of villages on either side.

Five German divisions, including the famous third naval, and elements of six others, participated in the fighting along the American second corps front, of which the New Yorkers had the left wing and the Carolinas and Tennessee troops the right.

The first day the German naval division attacked from the left and another division from the right. Fighting continued by moonlight.

When one battalion established headquarters at L'Abbe de Guise (a mile east of St. Souplet) the major used a tank for an office.

Molain, St. Martin-Niviere and L'Abbe de Guise were captured the first day in a two-mile advance. The river was waded in some places and in others was crossed on bridges built by the engineers.

At 7 o'clock on the first day the en-

gineers, engaged in building bridges for the artillery under shell fire, were snarled by prisoners who had surrendered to the tanks which had plunged on ahead.

Nuns Break and Run

On the second day the Germans held strongly until the middle of the afternoon, when they broke and gave ground. The British, in the meantime, had passed Le Cateau on the northward.

The Americans took Ribeville (two miles southeast of St. Souplet) and proceeded as far as Mazinghen (a mile northeast of Ribeville), which an officer entered by moonlight and found unoccupied. He reported back, whereupon a regiment marched in behind in command as though on a parade.

This gave the Americans the third ridge.

The three days' fighting resulted in heavy German casualties from rifle fire, as well as from artillery.

In a period of 13 days, only six of which were spent in actual fighting, the Americans advanced a total depth of 13 miles.

The entire second corps includes the fourth division of the regular army, the 30th (Wildcat) division of Tennessee, North and South Carolina, and District of Columbia national guard; the 36th division of Missouri and Kansas national guard, and the 77th New York and 32d Georgia, Alabama and Florida national army men.

OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL War Emergency Course and Certificate

Owing to the scarcity of teachers the Oregon Normal School will offer a War Emergency Course of twenty weeks outlined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The Course will begin with each of the terms beginning Nov. 16, 1918; Feb. 8, 1919; and April 12, 1919. The Superintendent of Public Instruction will consider it equivalent to the Teachers' Training Course and issue a certificate upon its completion valid to teach in the elementary grades for one year.

This Course will be open to those who have had two years or more of high school work or its equivalent. No age limit is required for entrance, but before a certificate can be issued applicant must be at least eighteen years of age.
