THOUSANDS OF ACRES PLOWED AND SEEDED TO GRAIN IN COUNTY

Thousands of acres have been plowed in Lane county since the last rain, and hundreds of acres are already seeded to fall grain. It has been an ideal fall from the farming standpoint, farmers and crop specialists admit. While it is a little dry for fall plowing now, it has been very good for the last 10 days, they say.

"There is only one bad feature in the manner farmers are putting in the crops this fall so far as I can see," said Ira P. Whitney, county agent, today. "Too many of them are discing in their fall grain because it is a cheap and easy way. While under certain conditions it is all right to disc in fall grain they are found here in only a few places this season," he went on to explain.

All the harvest with the exception of the fruit crop, was cleared up before the rains, consequently no damage was done except to the prunes. And it is more than likely the rain increased the quality of the prunes and did more good.

LLOYD GEORGE MAY NOT ATTEND MEET

Melbourne, Australia, Oct. 7.—Premier Lloyd George has cabled to Ambassador Giddes at Washington that he cannot attend the forthcoming conference on armaments. Premier Hughes of Australia read the cable in the house of representatives. Hughes announced that Arthur James Balfour and Lord Lee would be two of the British delegates to Washington, and that Minister of Defense George Foster will represent Australia. A third delegation from the British Isles has been named, but has not been accepted.

In all, there will be six representatives at the armament conference.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 7.—The United States government is gratified that the British dominions are to be represented in the Washington conference on limitation of armaments and far eastern questions it was declared today at the state department.

SHERIFF BACK FROM SCENE OF SHOOTING

If the shooting of Earl Hebert at Bristow prairie had occurred a quarter of a mile farther south it would have been a case for Douglas county, says Sheriff Fred Stickels, who returned last night from a three day trip to the scene of the killing. E. F. Martin, Walter Elmer and Charles Stickels accompanied him to the summit of the range which divides the Willamette and Umpqua waters, 70 miles southeast of Eugene, where Elmer Yeoman mistook Hebert, a fellow hunter, for a deer and fatally wounded him.

The party went from Eugene to Camper's prairie in an automobile, then packed in for about 10 miles to the scene of the shooting. Jap Hills, guide, took them over the ground where examinations were made and photographs taken for the benefit of the grand jury and court when the case comes up again. The grand jury has been called to reconsider the case, and also the McKen-Pitney case, next Monday, October 10.

Methodists May Build Big Portland Hospital

Forest Grove, Ore., Oct. 7.—The probability of a large Methodist hospital being constructed in Portland to cost between \$300,000 and \$375,000 was announced yesterday by Bishop William O. Shepard, who has worked out a plan with the First Methodist church and the former Wilbur church members to utilize the old Taylor street church property at Third and Taylor streets as a means of financing the project.

This property has been appraised at \$150,000, and the plan worked out by Bishop Shepard provides that it shall either be sold of the income from it used toward the erection of the big hospital. Agreements with all the heirs have been sealed covering any claims they might have had and papers have been drawn up and signed by the bishop and the trustees of the First church whereby it is agreed that the church will deed the property at Third and Taylor streets to the Methodist Episcopal hospital board.

Consideration of the advisability of transferring The Dalles district from the Columbia river conference to the Oregon conference was under way yesterday afternoon following the arrival of a commission from the Columbia section. The Dalles district includes all the Methodist churches in eastern Oregon each of the Multnomah county line and several leading southern Washington cities, such as Goldendale and White Salmon.

If the transfer is effected it will mean that 40 more churches will have their headquarters in Portland and that all business transacted by them will come through this city. The Dalles district is said to favor the transfer to the Oregon conference, but the Columbia river conference objects to losing the large number of attractive appointments the district holds.

Officers Are Elected. It is probable that a compromise will be effected whereby the district will be transferred with the exception of the churches in Umatilla county. At the termination of the session between the two committees it will be announced whether the transfer will be made.

New officers of the conference were elected yesterday, with Bishop Shepard presiding. J. C. Spencer of Albany was elected secretary, Henry T. Atkinson of Portland treasurer, and T. D. Yarns of Springfield statistical secretary.

JUDGE HAS BIG JOLT FOR FLOWER THIEVES

"Everyone caught stealing flowers in the future will get a good stiff sentence in this court," said Judge G. Alta King, of the police court, this morning in discussing the case yesterday in which he fined a woman \$50 after she had pleaded guilty to picking another woman's flowers on two occasions without her permission. The judge first sentenced the convicted woman to jail but later changed the penalty to a fine, after pleas had been made in her behalf.

Many complaints come to the police continually of someone stealing flowers but the offenders are hard to catch. "We are determined to stop the practice by inflicting heavy penalties on those convicted," declared the judge. "It's getting so people can't raise flowers or improve their yards without someone defacing the premises."

Irish Extremists Continue Outrages on Eve of Parley

Dublin, Oct. 7.—Extremists seeking to prevent a peaceful settlement of the Irish problem, by the peace conference called for tomorrow in London, today continued the outrages which have made this week's casualty list read almost like those of the pre-armistice period.

Armed and masked men, claiming to be members of the Irish republican army, entered a number of houses in Thurles, during the night.

They attacked and seriously injured a number of men who were not identified with politics.

Many of the victims were left lying unconscious.
