Oregon Bank Resources Grow Since Last June

Salem, Ore., Oct. 8.—Financial statements received at the office of Frank Bramwell, state superintendent of banks, disclosing the condition of the 286 banks operating in Oregon at the close of business September 6, 1921, showed an aggregate decline in resources of \$50,161,500.19 since a previous compilation bearing date of September 8, 1920.

The report of the banking superintendent further showed, however, that there has been a net gain in the resources of the institutions of approximately \$3,000,000 since June 30, 1921, and an increase of about \$79,000,000 since September 11, 1917.

"The liquidation of loans and discounts during the past year discloses a substantial reduction," said Mr. Bramwell's latest report. "On September 6, 1921, these assets aggregated \$180,851,738.55, as compared with \$210,021,238.91 on September 8, 1920, of a decrease of approximately \$30,000,000."

Notwithstanding this, the loans and discounts September 6, 1921, were \$63,000,000 more than reported September

11, 1917, approximately \$40,000,000 in excess of those reported August 31, 1918 and \$3,000,000 less than the aggregate reported September 12, 1919.

"Overdrafts" on September 6, 1921, were \$757,915.63, showing a decrease of \$422,431.39. This condition indicates that the efforts of this department to discourage the undesirable practice of permitting overdrafts are steadily accomplishing the desired results," said the report.

O. A. C. Registration Is Announced in Detail

Registration at the close of the 15th day was 3339 in comparison with 2990 for the same date last year, or an increase of 25.25 per cent. The freshman class numbers 1004; sophomore 716; junior 686; and senior 893. Men total 2312 and women 1026, while new students number 1356 and old 1982. Of the 3339 students, 3112 are of college standing and 227 are vocationalists. Commerce leads the schools with 787. Registration in the other schools is as follows: Engineering 735; agriculture 687; home economics 521; pharmacy 185; forestry and logging engineering 94; mines 79; chemical engineering 78; vocational education 73; optionals 59; music, 35; and military science

and tactics 6. Students registered in all branches of engineering, including those in the school of engineering, and in forestry and logging engineering, mines, and chemical engineering, 1855.—Corvallis Gazette-Times.

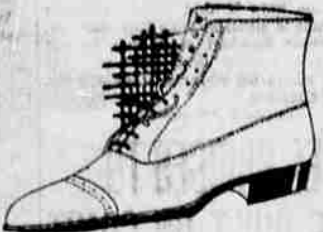
