

OREGON FACES IDAHO WITH 12 GAMES WON

With a record of 12 games won by the Oregon university football team in the 13 games played between Oregon and Idaho since 1901 the Oregon squad is doing heavy duty practice for the game on Multnomah field Portland, Saturday afternoon. Twenty men will go down to Portland on the 7:25 Oregon Electric train tomorrow morning, accompanied by "Bill" Hayward, trainer, and the coaching staff for a workout on Multnomah field tomorrow afternoon.

Runners from Idaho are to the effect that the Idaho team this year is stronger even than the speedy aggregation that lost to Oregon on Hayward field last year by the score of 13 to 7 on what was considered a flake. The smooth backfield of the Idaho aggregation is back this year with every last year man in place. But two men were lost since last year. Phoston, center, and Pierce, right tackle.

In the 17 games played between Oregon and Idaho since 1901 the Oregon team have piled up a total score of 225 points against the 86 of Idaho. No games were lost in that time and but one, that of 1901, had by a 6-0 score.

The University students will gather at 6:45 in the morning at the depot for a rally and departing basket to the team. All are asked to attend the rally by Dr. Oberholfer, who will be there with his three assistants, Reed, Woods, Ole Johnson and Arthur Rosenburgh, to lead the yell and the singing of Oregon songs.

A large number of students and teachers are expected to go down to see the game Saturday morning several automobile parties already being announced. Orders will go down tomorrow afternoon and remain over for the week end.

CHICAGO GRAIN MARKETS
Chicago, Oct. 13.—Grain prices slumped on the Chicago board of trade today. Postponement of the government report on wheat reserves from today until Saturday was a contributing factor. Provisions were lower.

December wheat opened off 1-3-4 at 113 1-2 and later sagged to 112 1-2. May wheat opened at 118 off 1-2 and slumped to 117. December corn opened off 7-8 at 48 and later declined 1-2. May opened at 53 1-2, off 1-2 and dropped 1-8 later. December oats opened off 1-2 at 34 3-8 and slumped 3-4. May oats opened at 37 7-8 up 3-8 and lost 1-2.

HOTEL AT CRESWELL ROBBED LAST NIGHT

The Creswell hotel was entered and guests robbed of nearly \$150 in money and other valuables, by unknown burglars last night, according to reports received at the sheriff's office today. Money, watches and other valuables were taken while the guests slept and so stealthily was the job done that there is no clue to the burglars.

A traveling man is reported to be the heaviest loser when \$110 and a gold watch was taken from his pockets. Another man lost \$15 and one \$5. Three rooms were entered, according to the report. Two watches stolen, and money in the above known sums taken. Some change was stolen as well as other valuables, the amount and description of which has not been announced.

The Creswell hotel is a two-story structure and has quite a number of guests but none were awakened, it is reported.

ARBUCKLE TRIAL TO START NOVEMBER 7

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—November the seventh was set today as the date for the trial of Roscoe (Fatty) Arbuckle, accused of manslaughter in connection with the death of Virginia Rappe.

Request for a continuance of the arraignment was denied after a lengthy argument.

Arbuckle is a pleaded not guilty and his trial was set.

He will be arraigned this afternoon in federal court on a charge of violation of the prohibition law.

Arbuckle had reached San Francisco early today from Los Angeles to plead to the manslaughter charge and also to a charge of violating the prohibition law. No additional attorney to take the place of Frank Dominguez of Los Angeles, who withdrew from the case, has been named, it was announced.
