Harding Agrees on Debt Refunding Bill Compromise

Washington, Oct. 13.—President Harding today agreed to a compromise on the foreign debt refunding bill which may bring early passage of the measure. He told Republican Leader Mondell that he had no objection to giving the power to refund the debt to a commission headed by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon. Congressional objection has been raised to the administration bill because it proposes to center all refunding authority in one man—the secretary of the treasury.

Mellon Announces Plans

Washington, Oct. 13.—All foreign loans will be funded into long term bonds bearing five per cent interest under present plans, Secretary Mellon announced today.
