Creswell, Ore., Oct. 13.—Prune pickers are moving out of the L. D. Scarborough orchard where they had been working for four weeks. The yard employed about 150 people. This year's crop was the largest in history, the prunes were large and yielded six hundred thousand pounds of dried prunes. Fifty per cent of the run are 30s, about 35 per cent 40-50s and only 10 per cent 50-60s.

The processing of prunes is in full swing and they are processing a carload every two days of 60,000 pounds, planning to get out seven carloads a week. The processor is packing for the packing association for Lane county 70 per cent of the crop is sold, and the first carload is to be sent to Liverpool and London.

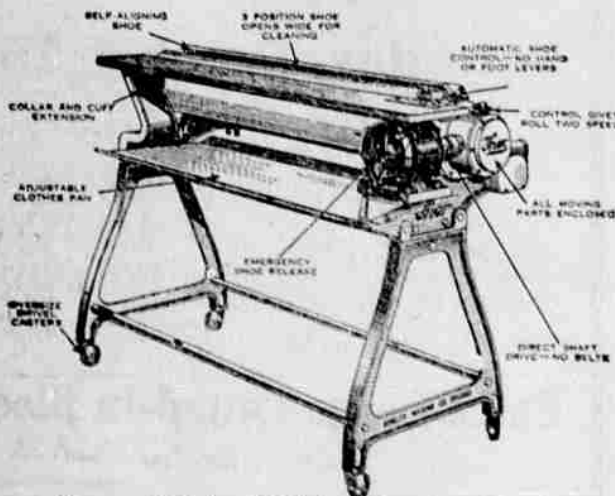
