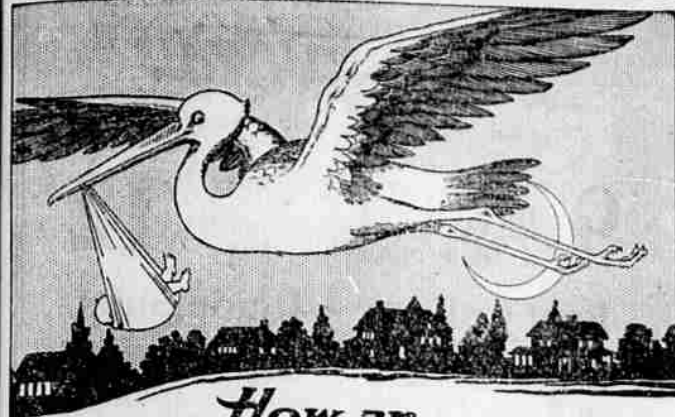

As The World Wags

SENATOR BORAH is not always right but he is always pugnacious. He is fortunate just now in having an issue which makes a wide public appeal. The world is sick of militarism; and the folly of vast expenditures for war or in other words for waste. Senator Borah stands in the very advantageous position of being spokesman for the public on this question of disarmament.

A DESCRIPTION of Borah by William Hard runs as follows: "Senator Borah has a firm deep line that brings the corners of his mouth down over his chin, a firm deep additional line that runs around under his chin, a little very firm and very deep line that lies up and down in the middle of his chin, and a roll of firm flesh that rises from his throat and supports his chin. He is the watch-dog of disarmament, standing on the Capitol lawn and sniffing the air of the conference as it blows up along Pennsylvania avenue from the executive and diplomatic section of the city."

THE BORAH IDEA of disarmament is much like that of the man on the street which is that the way to disarm

is to disarm and neither by nor the public will be satisfied with a discussion of the Far Eastern question which bristles with difficulties.

A STORY told by Borah in one of his speeches on the subject illustrates the point that removing the weapons of two belligerents makes the discussion of such questions as that of the Far East more peaceable. He said:

"So we came to that town where we were going to try that case between the cattle men and the sheep men; and the cattle men were all there with their guns and the sheep men were all there with their guns. They were there to see that justice was done. We carefully conversed with them and discovered that such was their motive. So we disarmed them first and tried the case afterwards. It made the case much calmer. And we arrived at the next town."

THE UNITED STATES will have some inconsistencies to explain in her own foreign policy in making a stand for the "open door" in China while maintaining a Monroe doctrine in the western hemisphere. In tomorrow's Wag, I will suggest some of these.

SOLDIERS ASK BONDS.

Salem, Ore., Oct. 23.—A total of 7955 ex-service men, who enlisted in the world war from Oregon, have filed applications for benefits under the so-called bonus law, according to a report prepared by Captain Harry Brumbaugh, secretary of the world war veterans' state aid commission, today. The report was submitted for the consideration of the commission, which was in session here.

Of the total number of applications filed with the commission, 4224 seek cash bonus, while 3721 request loans.

MINERS TRIALS POSITIONED

Logan, W. Va., Oct. 13.—The trial of union miners charged with murder and insurrection in connection with the armed march into Logan county in September was postponed when called up in circuit court here late today. The continuance was until January 16. It was granted on appeal of attorneys for the 365 defendants. Only 31 of the accused appeared in court today.

WIFE SHOTS HUSBAND

San Diego, Cal., Oct. 13.—Walter J. Conley, 25, special policeman at the office of Secretary of State Robert Lansing during the war, was dead here today. He was shot, officers said, by his wife, Ruth Conley at their home. Conley was drunk, according to witnesses and making threats against his wife, who is an expectant mother. No charge has been placed against Mrs. Conley.

Estell Boreck of The Dalles has been elected president of the freshmen class at Oregon Agricultural college, and Bertha Peterson of Portland, secretary.

A \$250,000 public auditorium as a memorial to Unafilla county soldiers in the world war will be erected at Pendleton, provided bonds are voted for the purpose.
