### Good Week's Showing In Lumber Orders

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 21.—New lumber business totaled 77,453,396 feet for the week ending October 15th, according to reports from 100 mills to West Coast Lumbermen's association.

The volume of new business fell off slightly from the preceding two weeks, but still remained above both production and shipments.

Thirty-six per cent of the total new business was for water delivery. This amounted to 28,196,366 feet, of which 18,388,393 feet was represented in coastwise and intercoastal orders; and 9,778,000 feet in export orders.

Business for delivery by rail amounted to 1,043 cars. Shipments by rail totaled 1,554 cars. The unshipped balance in the rail trade is reported at 3,592 cars.

Production at 65,025,043 was only 15 per cent below normal for mills in operation.

Shipments totaled 63,792,927 feet. Of water shipments, 9,007,890 feet moved coastwise and 8,105,028 feet cleared for overseas.

### CITY SCHOOL BUDGET \$5,607.20 LESS THAN EXPENDED PAST YEAR

The amount to be raised by a special tax levy to run the city schools for the ensuing year will be \$5,607.20 less than last year, according to the estimate of the budget committee, under the provisions of the new law passed by the legislature. The school board has just completed preparing the detailed statement of the estimate as proposed by the budget committee.

The amount needed to run the schools for the ensuing year is \$109,035.30, according to the budget estimate. The district will receive from the state and county school funds, from special funds and tuition \$58,728, leaving \$110,307.30 to be raised by taxation.

Under the new law provision is made for a meeting of the taxpayers of the district with the tax levying board for the purpose of discussing the various items of the budget, and to give school patrons an opportunity to present the needs of any particular school.

Problem Was Difficult. Owing to the increased attendance, and the crowded conditions of the building, the board found it a difficult problem to make this year's levy lower than that of last year. The board thought best, however, in the interest of economy, to keep all improvements down to the lowest possible until such time as material prices return to normal.

For the same reason the board has asked all teachers to assist by carrying heavier work this year than heretofore. Such a distribution of the work has been made and the teachers have cheerfully accepted these conditions.

The new law places the full authority of making the levy upon the school board but provision is made for a public hearing in order that the board may learn the wishes of the people.

In another column of this issue of The Guard appears the proposed budget. It is the wish of the board that all patrons and taxpayers of the district give this statement careful consideration, and to meet with them at 7:30 p. m. November 14, for a full discussion of the budget and to advise in the matter of maintaining efficiency in our school system.

The budget committee consisted of Hollis W. Libby, chairman, Alberta S. McMurphy secretary, Dr. P. J. Bartle, Charles Emery, Mrs. F. L. Shinn, B. B. Brundage, W. J. Gordon, Dr. H. Y. A. A. Brigham and Mrs. C. V. Ford.

### Upper Silesia Divided Between Two Nations

Paris, Oct. 21.—The decision of the council of the league of nations on the Upper Silesian question, made public here today, divides the plebiscite area in almost equal parts between Poland and Germany, as to the number of communes, and provides administrative machinery for the gradual inauguration of the new regime over a period of 15 years.

The long awarded boundary line according to an official communique, will follow the Oder river to Niebeschau, assigning 22 communes in this southern section to Germany and 19 to Poland. The line is further traced in detail by the names of villages, the communique stating that the more northerly section to Germany obtained 20 communes and Poland 21. North of Lissau, the frontier will follow the old boundary line to the point where it joins that already fixed between Germany and Poland.

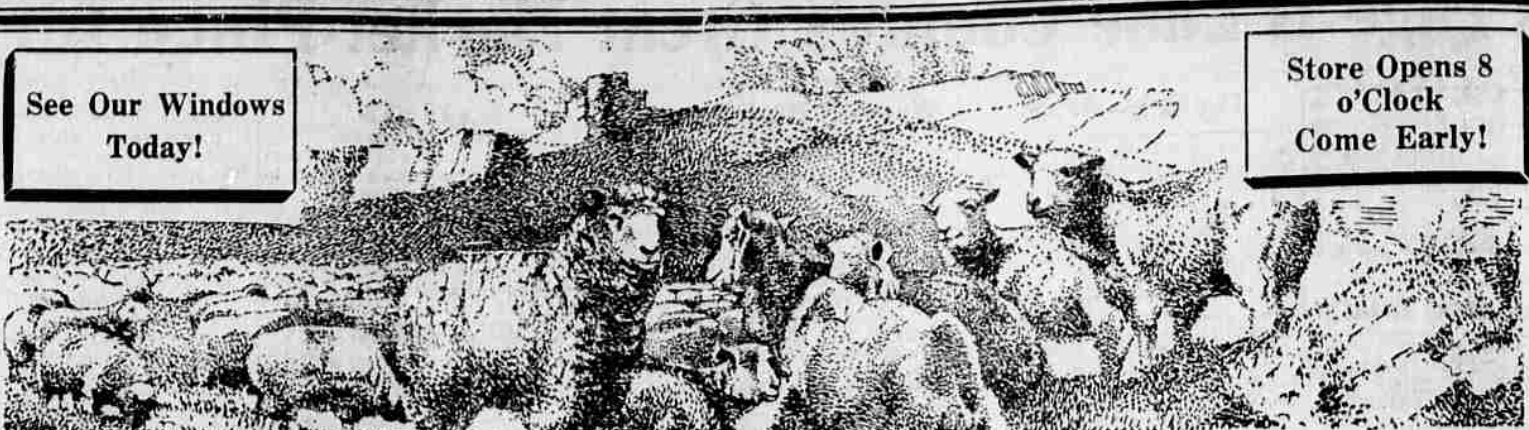

### Dramatic Scene in Alabama Murder Trial

Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 21.—Taking of testimony was expected to be completed today in the trial of the Rev. Edwin R. Stephenson, who is charged with second degree murder in connection with the shooting of Father James E. Coyle, Catholic priest, August 11.

Yesterday's session, marked by many tense situations, was brought to a dramatic close by the appearance before the jury of Pedro Gussman, who as a communicant of Father Coyle's church, was married to Stephenson's daughter by the priest.

Stephenson had concluded his narrative of events which led up to the shooting and had described the manner in which he slew the priest when he was

interrupted by Judge Hugo D. Black, chief counsel for the defense, who said: "Mr. Sheriff, call Pedro Gussman." Witness Is Silent.

Gussman was called. "Walk before the jury," Judge Black commanded. Gussman, without show of emotion, stood before the twelve men in whose hands rests the fate of his father-in-law.

"That will do," said Judge Black. "Bring him closer," broke in a juror in the back row.

"The sheriff instructed Gussman to return. He walked within a few feet of the jury box. Not another word was spoken. He stood for a moment, turned on his heel and left the room. Mr. Gussman testified at the preliminary trial he was a native of Porto Rico. It was the first time in the history of Alabama criminal procedure, legal observers said, that a witness had actually been called before a jury without speaking.

### Pastor of Deaf Mute Congregation Lectures

According to the latest census there are one hundred thousand deaf mutes in the United States. The vast majority of these are living without religious guidance and instruction. Thirteen Lutheran pastors, however, are ministering to six thousand deaf annually in seventy cities of the United States and Canada, a number surpassed by no other religious body in this country.

Rev. J. A. Beyer, pastor of the only deaf-mute congregation in the state, at Portland, and regular pastor at the state institutions at Salem and Vancouver, Wash., will deliver a sermon and give a lecture on the deaf Sunday morning at 11 in Grace Lutheran church of that city. He will teach upon their language and the religious work being done among them. The eyes of those who will be opened who think nates cannot sing when the Rev. Mr. Beyer sings the well known hymns "Rock of Ages" and "Jesus, Lover of My Soul" in the sign language while a local trio renders them vocally.

### COLLEGE GIRLS WORKING

Of the 125 freshmen women who are registered for positions with the Y. W. C. A. employment bureau, 18 are at present working for their room and board, 5 have half-day positions as stenographers and bookkeepers, 13 are seeking work of the same sort, and the remaining 61 are doing any work that comes up.

"The principal thing I am worrying about," said Miss Louise Davis, assistant secretary of the Y. W. C. A., "is that these girls who are depending entirely upon themselves for support often have others dependent upon them."
