## OREGON PRACTICING AT BERKELEY TODAY

Berkeley, Cal., Oct. 21.—The University of Oregon's football squad, 23 strong, was to turn out today on California field for a light practice before the final workout before tomorrow's game with the University of California. The Lemon Yellow warriors arrived here late last night from Eugene. Coach Shy Huntington reported all of his men in good condition and expressed the belief that brief signal practices which he staged wherever the train made a few minutes' stop, had done much to relieve the strain of the train trip. A few of the men still were nursing bruises and minor injuries which resulted from the game with Idaho a week ago.

Huntington said he had not decided on his final lineup but that Howard and Latham probably will play the ends; Leslie and Strachan tackle; Brown and Shields, guards; and Callison center. The backfield will be selected from among Sitfelds, D'Armond, Parsons, Hall, Chapman and Johnson. California held its final practice yesterday afternoon and was resting today except for brief signal practices.

Indications were that the blue and gold team will line up much the same as it did in the previous game of the season, with the exception of some possible changes in the backfield. Reports from the campus were that the demand for seats for tomorrow's game—the first conference meet of the season—was exceptionally heavy.

**"Trick" Numerals Used.**  
Chicago, Oct. 21.—Profuse apologies have been made to all western conference universities by the committee on inter-collegiate sports of the University of Oregon for Coach Williams' trick numbering of players in the game with Northwestern. The conference rules this year require that all players be numbered. In the Northwestern game, Williams' men carried four early numbers such as 5788, 5385 and so on, so that it was impossible for spectators to pick out players by their numbers.

In the Ohio game however, the players were numbered starting with number 1 and no player carried more than two numbers. James Paize, chairman of the committee on inter-collegiate sports, apologized for the coaches' action in a letter to each of the conference schools and said that university had been much embarrassed by Williams' action.

A strong aggregation of Eugene high school football players leave Saturday morning for Roseburg where they will battle against the Roseburg high school team for honors in the scheduled game of the season. Over a hundred rooters will make the trip by train and auto while several faculty members have signified their intentions of being on hand for the game also.

**Red Cross Trains 147 Blind Vets In Useful Work**

Training designed to fit them for the battle of life was taken by 147 blind ex-service men at the Red Cross Institute for the Blind, near Baltimore, Md., during the fiscal year 1920-1921, according to the report of the Institute for that period.

Of this number, 19 have gone on to other institutions, in almost every case to institutions where those having sight are receiving advanced education. The blind ex-service men who have entered such institutions are provided with special text-books in Braille, reading which they were taught at the Red Cross Institute.

Twelve men have passed from the Institute to successfully carry on some occupation or business for which they were fitted by special training. A few have withdrawn from the Institute because of poor physical condition, 14 are receiving further "training on the job" and 87 are still in training.

**Red Cross Plans \$6,000,000 Effort To Save Children**

Medical care and clothing for thousands of children in Central and Eastern Europe are outlined as the activities of the American Red Cross in Europe for the current year, says a statement on the eve of the Annual Roll Call of the organization. These activities, supplemental to the feeding operations of the European Relief Council of which Herbert Hoover is chairman, are designed to provide the most adequate and balanced relief within the resources of private philanthropy.

Through the establishment of child welfare stations in the centers of population of those countries where adequate medical care is not now obtainable, the American Red Cross plans to provide the medical assistance needed to restore these children to a normally healthy life. The sum of \$3,000,000 has been made available for this work.
