### OVERHEAD CROSSING IS FAVORED BY S. P.

The Southern Pacific seems favorable to the lowering of its tracks at the site of the proposed overhead crossing north of Creswell, according to Judge C. P. Barnard, who conferred with representatives of the state highway and the railroad at that place yesterday. The proposed overhead crossing would eliminate all grade crossings between Eugene and Cottage Grove. Twenty-two feet clearance from the tracks to the bottom of the bridge is required for an overhead crossing, says Judge Barnard, and the fact that the tracks are several feet higher in the cut where the overhead crossing is proposed makes the project simpler than otherwise. It is believed that a better grade

will be provided the railroad by the improvement. As it is necessary to make the cut wide enough for three tracks the excavation can be made first and track laid so as not to interfere with train service, it is said.

Representing the highway commission were Attorneys Rosecrans and DeVore and Resident Engineer Jones. For the Southern Pacific company, Attorney Farriss and Engineers H. A. Hampton and F. A. Folkerd and for Lane county, Judge C. P. Barnard and Engineer P. M. Morse were present.

### MEXICAN SENT TO PEN FOR 2 YEARS

Alejandra Negra, Mexican, found guilty by the jury two days ago for larceny of \$102 from fellow countrymen, was sentenced not to exceed two years in the penitentiary by Judge G. F. Skelworth in circuit court today. The two years' sentence will be sufficient reasons for the immigration authorities to deport her, according to District Attorney Clyde N. Robinson, who believes this action will be taken. Negra was arrested several weeks ago by Sheriff Fred Stickels in a local restaurant, on a warrant charging him with stealing the money from Mexicans working on the section gang near Walton. When taken into custody he had \$100 in currency hidden in his hat band.
