LANE FAIR HAS BIG DEFICIT THIS YEAR

That there was a \$2000 deficit in the
operations of this year's exhibition of the
Lane County fair and that the fair may
be discontinued if better support is not
in sight next year, were assertions of
members of the fair board after the
meeting late yesterday afternoon. The
question will be left up to the annual
membership meeting of the fair associa-
tion on November 5.

"The fair this year was a success from
every angle except attendance," said Ira
P. Whitney, county agent and a member
of the board of directors. "It failed to get
the support of either the farmers or the
people of Eugene. The farmers failed to
turn out in appreciable numbers at any
time and the townspeople turned out
only on one day. The big question to
come up at the annual meeting is whether
or not Lane county can support a fair or
let it go into the discard. A fair of
such magnitude as the one put on this
year cannot be maintained without the
active support of the people."
