Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 21.—After four trials and 14 months in the county jail here, James W. Anderson, 24 year old naval radio operator of this city was a free man today, following his acquittal on the charge of murdering Harry E. Stevens, here in July of last year.

Anderson's defense was temporary insanity brought on by knowledge of alleged illicit relations between Anderson's girl bride, Lillian, and her monster father, Stevens. He shot Stevens for "wrecking" his life, Anderson declared during the trial. Anderson's enlistment in the United States navy expires tomorrow.

As The World Wags

THE RAILROAD STRIKE which impends within the next ten days unless measures of compromise are effective, illustrates in a marked way the attitude of labor and capital toward each other in our modern society. In relation to the railroads all the factors of the situation are clearly expressed.

THE MANAGEMENT of the railroads has always been in the hands of big business. The stock of the companies is of course widely distributed but the small holders of stock do not figure at all in the direction of the railroads. Moreover, in the development of railroad transportation in this country promoting and building groups plundered right and left from the public and from individuals to whom they sold stock beyond the legitimate valuations of the railroads. The history of railroad building and management in the United States exhibits capitalism in its most unscrupulous aspects.

THE BIG FIVE and associated railways labor unions on the other hand exhibit the working man organized into its most cohesive and powerful combine. It is no idle threat when they assert that they will stop the movement of trade and travel. They have exercised their power during the era of war conditions to increase their wages to a point above the income of most workers and even above the income of quite a proportion of the so-called white collar workers. So on this side we have the workers represented in their most aggressive form.

THE PUBLIC is always present in such a situation but little regarded. The real issue between the railroad directors and the railroad workers is just the desire to have a fight to a finish to show which is the stronger. The workers say that the recent reduction in wages at the behest of the Interstate Commerce commission was followed by no reduction in rates and assert that the management is taking advantage of a time of wide-spread unemployment and industrial depression to "break the back" of the unions. In doing this the railroad capitalists would be playing true to form for there can be no doubt that such is the general attitude of the employing class just at the present time.

BUT THE PUBLIC, which will go without coal and without regular mail and which will suffer in innumerable ways, seems powerless to make itself heard during this time of disputation. However, the public in the end must always be the final arbitrator. If the strike comes and if it really interferes with the social life of the nation, a public opinion will develop which will compel action by the federal government in some way which will end it. Both sides know this.

A STRIKE is war, social war. As such it is disruptive and altogether

harmful in all its material aspects. Wealth is destroyed and idle hands and plants and equipments create nothing. But as in war, so in strikes, concessions are won and strength is demonstrated which in the long run establish a working basis between nations and between

antagonistic social groups. Will we ever advance to a point where neither war nor strikes are inevitable; when these old antagonisms between nations and social groups have ebbed to extinction?
