As The World Wags

GENERAL FOCH addressing the convention which represents the millions of young men who composed the great fighting machine of the United States only a few years ago when Foch finally in the stress of war, was given supreme command of the allied troops, brings memories of bleak, grey days filled with strained apprehension. Memories there are in the hearts of the older generation whose boys were overseas and whose girls were perhaps in hospital or Red Cross work of the harassed worry they knew as they heard of the gruesome and muddy trenches and the horrors which flowed back in broken and mangled men in the wake of every great engagement.

LIKEWISE we remember how we all turned to this quiet, cool man as the most likely to act as the master of strategy in a situation which made large demands than possibly any other general in the world's history ever had to face, for never before were military problems stretched all over the globe and never before were there such colossal human units to handle and move on the chessboard of a military campaign.

WHY FOCH? Why at that time did the harassed leaders of governments sink their differences and turn to Foch? He was efficient. That is the answer. Possibly he does not possess the dazzling military genius of Napoleon. But possibly Napoleon would have been less efficient than Foch under the circumstances, for the situation called for the slow development of movements in a campaign involving the use of several

million of soldiers which could not be managed in less than months, which might lengthen into years. Such battles as decided in a day the whole issue like Waterloo in this modern war were little more than skirmishes in a far-flung battle.

FOCH THEN was given the huge responsibility and mighty task of directing the allied campaign because it became recognized that he was the master strategist, the one man who was apparently most completely the master of the art of modern warfare and who at the same time had the calm and steady will to command in practical execution.

THE PERSONALITY of Foch is most interesting. Thoroughly trained and cold-bloodedly logical in the art of war, in fact almost super-humanly competent in this respect, he is yet one who in private aspects of character is extremely kindly and very deeply religious, with a strong bent toward mysticism.

GREETINGS, heartfelt and sincere, are due from all soldiers whether in uniform or civilian garb to this quiet, deeply religious little man who is nevertheless the master of military art and with all proven in the hour of trial a man of iron endurance, a grimly relentless general of fighting men.

EGG MARKET ON FIRM BASIS
Portland, Ore., Nov. 1.—There was a moderate inquiry for butter on the market yesterday and cube prices were steady and unchanged from last week, with the best grades held at 42 to 43 cents. The shipment of a car to San Francisco at the close of the week helped the situation.

Eggs were firm, the increase in receipts having not yet caught up with the demand. Production will gain from now on, but it may be some time before the supply affects prices.

There were light arrivals in the poultry and dressed meat markets. Both lines were slow and prices were unchanged.

Larger Shipments From Yakima.
The reduction in freight rates on grain and hay, says a Yakima report, has stimulated the shipment of hay from the Yakima valley, which with a 15,000-car crop ships approximately 12,000 cars. Of this amount about 60 per cent ordinarily goes to coast points for horse consumption, about 15 per cent to the Palouse districts and 10 per cent to western Oregon.

Milling Oats Scarce.
A shortage of milling oats has developed in this section and prices have strengthened to a considerable degree. Good white milling oats can be sold at prices ranging from \$29 to \$31, while gray milling oats are quotable at from \$23 to \$25 according to quality. It is possible that millers will have to be brought in from outside before the season is over. Feed oats are also fewer. Bids for December white feed oats were raised 50 cents at the Merchants' Exchange session.

The wheat market was quiet. Offers at the exchange session were the same as Saturday. Club in the local market was worth \$1.04 and hard winter \$1.06. There was not much business passing in the country.

Hogs Drop Lower.
Arrivals over Sunday at the local stockyards were 108 loads, of which 12 loads went through. The volume of trading was large.
