**VICTIM OF COLLISION WILL BE BURIED HERE**

Burial of Mrs. Edith Imogene Wood, wife of Leonard F. Wood, of this city, who was killed at Corvallis last Friday night when a Union Oil company truck struck her, will be made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery in Eugene Tuesday afternoon. The remains will lie in state at the Bramstetter chapel from 1:30 to 3 o'clock, preceding the interment. Funeral services will be held Tuesday morning at the home of W. M. Darnell, one mile south of Corvallis, at 10 o'clock.

Mr. and Mrs. Wood left Eugene last Friday noon in a Ford truck for Lexington in eastern Oregon where they were going to look at a tract of land. They stopped in Corvallis to visit with a sister of Mr. Wood and were to have resumed their journey the next day. That evening Mr. and Mrs. Wood were driving down Jefferson street in Corvallis when a truck coming down Ninth street barely missed running into their car from the rear. In swerving around to avoid hitting their car the truck collided with another machine. The Woods climbed out of their truck and were talking to bystanders about the accident when the Union Oil company truck, driven by H. J. Sprague, approached in the dark and not seeing Mrs. Wood, ran into her and crushed her between the two cars. She died 30 minutes later.

Mrs. Wood, who was 51 years old, has lived in Lane county nearly all of her life, having lived near Junction City for a long time before coming to Eugene. They have recently been making their home at Fifteenth avenue east and Oak street. Ralph E. Wood, driver for the Eugene Clarifying and Pasteurizing company, a son, left immediately for Corvallis after being notified of the accident. A daughter, Mrs. Olga Clabaugh, resides in Caldwell, Idaho.

**GREAT NATURAL GAS FIELD IS DISCOVERED**

Baton Rouge, La., Nov. 21.—Government engineers have discovered what is believed to be the greatest natural gas field in the country in Northern Louisiana, according to reports here today.

A productive area of 212 square miles in a sold block near Monroe, La., is outlined in a report to the bureau of mines at Washington, following an investigation made at the request of Governor Parker.

The report indicated that the Monroe field has production potentialities unsurpassed in the history of the natural gas inquiry. Sixty-five wells have a total overflow capacity of more than 620,000 cubic feet daily.

**Chinese Are Out to Thwart Japan's Expressed Desire**

Washington, Nov. 21.—China's delegation will try to thwart Japan's openly expressed desire for striking "deals" in the far eastern conference. Seeing what they call a Japanese effort to escape the washing of soiled diplomatic linen, the Chinese let it be known today in advance of the far eastern committee session at 4 o'clock that they will soon press for an open discussion of a number of details such as the Shantung, Manchurian and secret treaty questions.
