

PORTLAND CHEERS WAR HERO IN RAIN

Portland, Ore., Dec. 1.—Portland stood under an umbrella today and cheered Marshal Ferdinand Foch as he doubtfully braved a driving rain to inspect the city. Long before 8:30 this morning, when the marshal finally put in an appearance at the Union depot, crowds were assembling patiently in puddles and beneath dripping awnings to welcome him to the rose city.

While the rain ran down Portland's neck, the marshal dozed cozily in his special car.

But when he did appear—

"Foch—"

That one shouted name, followed by

the glimpse of the marshal's red cap, with an aura of blue smoke from the famous briar pipe clinging to its golden band, electrified the dripping thousands into frenzied enthusiasm.

Children Pipe Greetings.

The mighty roar which greeted his first appearance, taken up all along the line, was broken here and there by the shrill pipings of school children who had been stationed at strategic points to cheer his progress. Even though the great general was an hour late, teachers allowed their charges to brave a soaking rather than miss the second Lafayette.

The parade extended into a real tour on the city's outskirts and the marshal was taken for a spin over the Columbia highway. Lunch was served at the Crown Point Chalet.

The festivities here will conclude with a mass meeting tonight at the civic auditorium, preceded by a civic banquet. The marshal's train will depart for San Francisco at 9 o'clock.

CHARGE IMPROPER REMARKS IN TRIAL OF 'FAT' ARBUCKLE

San Francisco, Dec. 1.—Charges that a representative of the district attorneys office made improper remarks in the presence of the jury before which Roscoe (Fatty) Arbuckle is being tried, for alleged manslaughter, were made public during the morning session of Arbuckle's case. The remarks were said to have been made to a bailiff in charge of the jury.

Mrs. Lulu Corey, who testified yesterday she had seen Miss Rappe at Wheelers hot springs, Ventura county, in August, 1921, was given additional cross examination by the state. She was shown a record book from the resort and closely questioned as to each entry in an evident attempt to impeach her testimony.

Captain Theodore Hampton Oswald Rayward, formerly of the Canadian army was called as the day's first witness to attack the testimony of Miss Irene Morgan, Los Angeles nurse. She had said she served in the war as a nurse with the Canadian army. His testimony was designed to show the unit she claimed to have served with did not exist.

"If Roscoe Arbuckle goes free, it will be proof that juries are built for the poor," District Attorney Matthew Brady declared here today as the trial of the movie comedian for manslaughter in the death of Virginia Rappe drew near a close.

"Hard to Convict Rich."

"If this man was a poor man he would go to jail," Brady said.

"But he is 'Fatty' Arbuckle, backed by his own money and all the money of the motion picture industry.

"It is easy to convict a poor man, but the rich—well, that's different."

"Arbuckle committed his crime in a big 'shack' on Powell street—a fashionable hotel," the prosecutor charged. "Men who committed assault in a little shack on Howard street, off there 'South of Market' now are in San Quentin penitentiary."

"Everywhere we have turned in this case we have hit a stone wall and it certainly has taken the heart out of me," the district attorney said.

Brady seemed plainly discouraged over his fight to punish Arbuckle.

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Attorneys for both sides agreed on four hours for arguments.

friendly but the people of both countries generally are friendly and their governments certainly are.

"Feed Us and Wear Furs."

When I mentioned the Russian famine, Lenin said:

"The work is progressing quite as we expected but we need more grain. Winter is coming and the situation will be worse. Why don't American farmers send us wheat and receive our raw materials?"

"What have you?" I asked.

"Feed our famine victims and wear furs," replied Lenin quickly.

"We can put furs on our wives. We have inexhaustible supplies of minerals, forests to make pulp for years, bristles, carvings, etc."

"Why don't you do business with us?"

"It's your fault, otherwise you would have all the champagne you needed."

Lenin said he appreciated my congratulations sent last year to the British labor party on its decision to discontinue making munitions to support the Poles in a war on Russia. He asked me to come in the next day and continue the conversation.

Returning the next day, the premier asked whether I had enjoyed a good meal after our last talk. When I gave him a positive affirmative, Lenin exclaimed:

"Good—you're in a good humor. You must send us wheat."

I promised to do my utmost and asked:

"What happened to your program?"

"It's all gone right to the bottom, the

soviet program as well as mine," he said.

Photographs Are Taken.

Lenin then said: "I want to have a photograph taken of you and myself."

It will show Lenin and Christensen talking about sending American wheat to the famine victims, the next capitalistic war between America and Japan, and discussing Christensen's letter to the British labor party."

The premier wrote this title for the photograph on a piece of paper and handed it to me and then we sat for several photographs together and parted in the most friendly manner.

Lenin put his automobile at my disposal. Two commissaries rode with me to the station. I received an excellent impression of Lenin and returned more enthusiastic than when I went to Russia, absolutely convinced that there are immediate large business possibilities with that country.
