

"SHY" TO REMAIN COACH FOR OREGON FOR ANOTHER YEAR

Huntington will coach the Oregon varsity eleven next year. Although the executive council of the University has not yet definitely re-elected Huntington, it is practically certain that they will accept the recommendation of the sub-committee on football which late yesterday afternoon unanimously decided upon Huntington.

The Oregon mentor left Eugene last night with fourteen players, Bill Hayward, trainer, and Jack Benefield, graduate manager, for the Hawaiian isles where the Lemau-Yellow eleven will play two post-season games with island teams. Huntington was assured before he left that he would be re-elected coach for next year.

No definite offer was ever made to any other prospective coach this year by the executive council or the sub-committee on football, although this sub-committee is thought to have been interested in activities of Portland alumni to secure Hugo Bezdek, former Oregon mentor, now coaching Penn State, as the coach here. Bezdek, however, replied to those alumni who undertook to sound him out that he could not consider an offer from Oregon this year. The football committee did not at any time consider another coach, according to members.

A question as to whether line coach Earl Spellman and end coach "Brick" Mitchell will be retained next year has come up recently, but so far as is known, on this matter, Spellman is expected to be favored for re-election, although the desirability of retaining Mitchell may cause debate. Mitchell is understood to have been unpopular among the players and to have indirectly been the cause of petty difficulties, although no member of the football committee has made such a statement.

Formal re-election of Huntington may not be made until next term, since the proximity of exams, which begin tomorrow, seems to prevent a meeting of the executive council. In case a special meeting is not called, the matter will be concluded on January 4 at the next executive council meeting according to Lyle Bartholomew, student president.

BANK TO CELEBRATE 38TH ANNIVERSARY

Thirty-eight years of successful banking business will be closed next Friday, December 16, when the First National Bank of Eugene will celebrate the anniversary of its founding. December 16, 1883, during the 38 years of existence the resources of the bank have increased from \$25,000 to \$1,018,141.83.

The First National Bank of Eugene was organized by T. G. Hendricks and S. B. Eakin who formed a partnership to conduct a general banking business. The business continued till February 27, 1886, when it became the First National Bank. It had continued under the management of these two men practically all of the time since its founding.

The growth in the resources of the bank shows the ever increasing amount of business done as the bank developed in strength and gained the confidence of the people. Following are some of the reports of resources which show the growth of the institution: 1883, \$25,000; 1888, \$229,732.44; 1893, \$261,252.80; 1898, \$450,732.10; 1903, \$1,021,252.12; 1908, \$1,804,393.06; 1913, \$2,003,683.55; 1918, \$2,884,741.83.

The officers of the bank are P. E. Snodgrass, president; L. L. Goodrich, vice-president; Darwin Deister, vice-president; A. A. Rogers, cashier; W. T. Gordon, assistant cashier. Directors of the bank are P. E. Snodgrass, W. T. Gordon, L. L. Goodrich, F. L. Chambers, Darwin Bristow, A. A. Rogers, Richard Shore Smith.

Bulletins

Washington, Dec. 13.—Senator Spencer today was named chairman of the senate committee in Indian affairs and Senator Capper, Kas., to succeed him as chairman of the claims committee. Dublin, Dec. 13.—The Catholic hierarchy of Ireland today went on record approving the work of the Irish delegates in negotiating the peace treaty with Great Britain. A meeting of Cardinal Logue and archbishops from every diocese, held at the University college here to pass upon the treaty, issued a statement expressing confidence in the manner in which the Irish delegates had conducted the negotiations.

New York, Dec. 13.—Appointment of a new board of directors was announced following a National league board meeting today. Charles A. Stogdham, New York Giants; Geo. Washington Grant, Boston Braves; William Veeck, Chicago Cubs and Barney Dreyfus, Pittsburgh Pirates, are the members.

Eight Persons Burned to Death in Fire at Detroit

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 13.—Eight members of a family were burned to death and four seriously injured today when their home near here was destroyed by fire. Seven of the dead are children from one to ten years of age. The father was thought to have been the eighth.

The mother, reported to be Mrs. Margaret Waken, escaped death, but she and an infant child are near death at a hospital. Two children taken to the hospital were believed to be named Janny Oskonek and Joe Weismoky.

The nearest telephone to the home was two and a half miles. The home, on a country road, was inaccessible to the fire department.

Tacoma's Police Force Suffering from Shake Up

Tacoma, Wn., Dec. 13.—Strike in police department here culminated today when Chief Harry M. Smith tendered his resignation to Public Safety Commissioner Shoemaker. A crisis was precipitated when Smith suspended Detective Captain J. S. Strickland for 30 days for insubordination.

Shoemaker wrote Smith that dictating must cease or some of the officers would be demanded.

Strickland and Smith have been at odds ever since the famous Stagg kidnapping case 18 months ago.

The suspension of Strickland came when he went to Seattle last Saturday to make important arrests without asking permission from Chief Smith.

Radio Club to Elect At Membership Dinner

The Eugene Radio club is planning a banquet for December 18 at which time the semi-annual election of officers will occur. Enthusiasm is growing rapidly in the club and it is believed that the membership dinner will be the big event of the club.

A social committee has also been appointed to install a complete receiving set in the banquet hall. This will increase the interest. A fine time is expected by all the members of the club. Invitations will be extended to radio men of the city to attend the banquet.

HUNT NOW ON FOR BODIES OF VICTIMS

Seattle, Dec. 13.—Work of cleaning up flood wreckage and searching for bodies of victims of landslides and washouts in Seattle and western Washington was in full swing today.

The bodies of Mrs. Samuel C. Andrews and her two small sons, Tommy and Jack, buried in mud at the foot of the slide that wrecked their home in west Seattle are still unrecovered.

Added to the death toll is a 12 year old girl drowned at Yakima, making the total known dead in the storm 11.

W. L. Lobelle, rescue worker, is missing. He was helping in attempts to recover the bodies of Gerald Willis, engineer, his wife and daughter, and H. Olson, logger, from the wreck of a logging train at Melbourne, near Montesano, County Engineer Reeman has ordered motorists to stay off country roads in order not to hamper the work of clearing slides in mending washouts.

The record rain storm for this locality ceased suddenly yesterday afternoon, in 41 hours, 5.27 inches of water had fallen.

Rain gave way to gales on the coast. Southwest storm warnings are displayed today along the coast north of Cape Blanco.

Rivers Are Still Rising.

Mr. Vernon is wholly surrounded by water from the Skagit river, except for the hill to the west. The Skagit is 25 feet higher than its previous high mark, and still climbing. Houses, barns, outbuildings and logs from up the valley are floating past the town. Other homes are completely covered by the flood waters. All night inhabitants stood on the bank watching the raging torrent. Thieves looted houses.

The dykes north and south of the town burst, lowering the river somewhat at those points but adding to the destruction. The only means of exit and ingress is by the old steam highway.

Two new slides occurred today on the Lake Burien street car line 700 feet apart, one at Oxbow and one at Hillside. At the latter place a whole mountain was reported to have slid.

Rescuer Is Missing.

Montesano, Wn., Dec. 13.—W. L. Lobelle, of Hoquiam, member of a rescue party that went to the wreck of the Clemons Logging company train at Melbourne, near here yesterday, was missing today. His name may be added to the list of dead, which includes Gerald Willis, engineer, his wife and 18 months old daughter, and H. Olson, a logger.

J. W. Hunsay and John Lind, loggers, injured in the wreck, are not expected to live. The train was hit by a landslide.

Repair Work Suspended.

Skykomish, Wn., Dec. 13.—Rising waters have forced suspension of repair work on Miller river bridge where Great Northern mail train Number 27 crashed through, carrying Samuel E. Hileman, Seattle mail clerk, and Geo. Irvin, fireman of Everett, to death.

Water Still Rising.

Kent, Wn., Dec. 13.—Flood waters are estimated today three inches higher than yesterday and are still rising. Several families have been forced to abandon their homes. A log jam at the De Moines bridge was dynamited and danger to that structure is declared past. The streets are full of water.

Repairing Tracks.

Startup, Wash., Dec. 13.—A track crew is at work here today repairing a 200-foot washout on the Great Northern tracks.

Many Families Rescued.

Everett, Wash., Dec. 13.—Several families rescued from flooded homes at Home Acres, near here, were safe today.

Big Bridge Destroyed.

Sultan, Wash., Dec. 13.—A 100-foot span of the Great Northern bridge No. 443 is swept away, leaving the tracks suspended in midair.

Landslide Removed.

Richmond Beach, Wash., Dec. 13.—A landslide covering both coast line tracks west of here was being removed today.

Damaged Wires Repaired.

Edmonds, Wash., Dec. 13.—Wires down by the storm, were being repaired here today.

Road Conditions Better.

Auburn, Wash., Dec. 13.—"There has been no flood in Auburn," the city clerk said today. Road conditions about the town, however, are reported "improving."

Bridge Is Repaired.

Arlington, Dec. 13.—County road workers expected to have the bridge at Holtermann's spur repaired for travel today. One approach was washed out.

Crews at Work.

Monroe, Wash., Dec. 13.—Repair work at the washout bridge between Monroe and Tualen on the paved highway was under way today.

Chetliss, Wash., Dec. 13.—Chetliss and Newkum valleys, flood rising at rate of six inches an hour. There is heavy property damage here.

Highway Closed.

Castle Rock, Wash., Dec. 13.—The Pacific highway has been closed by washouts.

Basements Washed Out.

Centralia, Wash., Dec. 13.—There has been no let up in the heavy rains here, which has washed out basements in the entire town.

Railroad Bridge Out.

Port Angeles, Wash., Dec. 13.—The railroad bridge over Morris creek has been washed out and the bridge over the Duganese river near Sequim has been carried away by flood waters. The Olympic highway has been badly damaged by several washouts.

Traffic Tied Up.

Gate, Wash., Dec. 13.—Traffic between here and Olympia is tied up as a result of a washout on the Northern Pacific road at Precival Creek. Rain has been falling steadily for 40 hours.

Streets Are Rivers.

Everett, Wash., Dec. 13.—The Nook-nack river has flooded the streets here with a foot of water.

AFRAID OF SANTA

Black Tots at African Mission Make for Place of Safety.

Presents of Apparel and Sweets Bring Confidence to the Men, Women and Kiddies.

AN AMUSING story of how Santa Claus frightened the black children at a mission station when he first appeared to them a few years ago, is told by the wife of a missionary stationed at Baidunda, Africa. They had celebrated Christmas at Baidunda before, but they never had had Santa Claus; so Mr. Stover, the missionary, dressed up as good Saint Nick.

"He had been padded and powdered and packed until his own mother would not have known him," Mrs. Stover afterward related. "Presently we gave the signal, the door flew open and in walked Santa Claus. But, dear me! What consternation! He was greeted with shrieks and groans and cries of 'Let me out! It is the evil one. It is the day of judgment!'"

"The urchins, catching the infection of terror from the older black people, fled to their bedrooms, fell down upon their faces, crept under chairs and tables—anywhere to hide themselves. Poor old Santa Claus never had such a greeting before. As soon as he realized the panic he had caused, he tore off his tall hat and white cotton beard. Then from the bags on his back he began to throw gifts right and left and to tell who he was.

"Reassured once more, everyone was soon laughing and chatting, munching the great 'red breads' (doughnuts), tasting their fruits or nibbling at the sweets from the familiar little bags. One man wondered which end up he was to hold the fork Santa Claus had given him. Another immediately tried on his new shirt. The girls arranged their bright-lined handkerchiefs into turbans, while others sought to find some place about their scanty clothing where they could stow away their bunch of bread, as well as the paper of needles and cake of soap given to each.

"It seemed as though everyone tried to talk louder than his neighbor as they examined the costume of Santa Claus, whom they now no longer feared. One man said that he thought it was John the Baptist; another that it was Elijah returned. Yet another thought it was Satan himself.

LANDSBURY CONCERT IS WELL RECEIVED

A piano concert, the last of a series arranged by the Woman's League, was given Saturday evening in Villard hall by Dean John Landsbury, dean of the University of Oregon school of music.

The program opened with the exceedingly difficult Sonata—op 5—by Johannes Brahms. It was given a most masterly presentation. Being one of the most stupendous piano Sonatas, it is infrequently played, and its reception Saturday evening was proof of the musical appreciation of a Eugene audience.

Following was a group of modern compositions by Debussy, Ravel, and Glazounov. Perhaps the most satisfying of the group was "Jeux d'Eau" (Sparkling Waters) by Ravel, which displayed a most beautiful piano legato and tone, as did also the "Spiraling Song" from the "Flying Dutchman" by Wagner-Liszt in the last group. In it there seemed to be no flaw in the succession of beautiful tones which dropped so easily from his finger tips.

The last number on the program was the Paganini-Liszt "Campanella," a stupendous thing to play, which, in the hands of Dr. Landsbury, gave no idea of its terrific technical demands.

As encores he played Jensen's "Murmuring Zephyrs," Tchaikovsky's "Sky-lark," Chopin's "Polonaise" and "Waltz in C minor," and his own Etude which is a beautiful succession of modulating chords, demanding a most dextrous left hand.
