Cheered by hundreds of Oregon students, who rallied in the downtown business section last night in spite of the heavy rain, 14 University of Oregon football players, accompanied by Head Coach "Shy" Huntington, Trainer Bill Hayward and Graduate Manager Jack Benefield left last night on the 8 o'clock train for San Francisco from which port they will sail Wednesday on the steamer Maoli for the Hawaiian islands for two football games with Hawaiian teams. The first game will be with the University of Hawaii in Honolulu December 26 and the second will be with an all-star island team on January 1.

The fourteen men making the trip are Captain Mart Howard, "Spike" Leslie, "Tide" Shields, "Frank" Callison, Lloyd Shields, Carl Von der Ahe, Budd Broad, "Hal" Chapman, George King, "Duke" Gram, "Hank" Latham, Bill Reinhardt, Charles Parsons, and "Bert" Laughlin. The party was also accompanied by Mrs. Charles Huntington, Mrs. Jack Benefield, both recent brides, and Mrs. William Hayward.

Although official announcement that "Shy" Huntington has been asked to return to Oregon as head coach another year has not been made it is understood that the football committee appointed by the executive council of the student body favors the retention of Huntington and that definite action will be taken following the holidays.

FORM INFANTRY CO. AT COTTAGE GROVE

Cottage Grove is organizing an infantry company which is to be part of a separate battalion authorized by the war department, according to Major W. G. White. The company was authorized by the state general staff at its last meeting to be part of the battalion. Other companies of the battalion are to be stationed at Hood River and Gresham.

Cottage Grove was the home station of the old Sixth company, C. A. C., and the town is back of the new organization, says Major White. The Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce and the Legion are the leaders in the movement.

EVANS SAYS BEAVER HILL MINE NOW IN GOOD SHAPE

George W. Evans, managing engineer of the Beaver Hill Coal company, is in the city today. Mr. Evans says the coal mine is in excellent condition and ready to turn out many times the number of tons of coal that it is now producing.

Mr. Evans, who is consulting engineer for the coal department of the Southern Pacific, O. W. H. & N. Northern Pacific and several other large owners of coal mines and users of coal, declares that the Beaver Hill coal is of a better grade than 300,000 tons of coal burned each year in the city of Seattle.

Mr. Evans is planning on making an experiment with Beaver Hill pea coal fed by automatic stokers in locomotives. He believes this will demonstrate that there is a new field for marketing pea coal.

WHEAT GROWERS' ASSOCIATION MOVE HEADQUARTERS TO OREGON

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 13.—Officers of the Northwest Wheat Growers' association are to be moved from Spokane to Portland within sixty days according to the decision of the board of directors. The association has a limitation of one office of the organization are reasons assigned.

Officers who will transfer their activities from Spokane are: General manager, C. W. Nelson, sales manager; Gaston J. Levy, head of the statistical department. The majority of the clerks will lose their jobs, as clerical help will be recruited in Portland.

The Spokane office will be maintained in the headquarters of the Washington-Idaho wheat growers' association with a sales representative here. Earl G. Jewett, general manager of the Washington-Idaho association, will be in charge in Spokane with C. A. Adams, secretary. Francis A. Gurecht, general counsel of the Northwest, will remain here. The headquarters of the Farmers' Warehouse corporation, the Washington Growers' Warehouse corporation and the Farmers' Union Mutual Fire Insurance company are not affected.

Nelson will make his headquarters in Seattle and Jewett will handle sales in Portland. The change cuts the personnel of the Spokane office in two. Headquarters of the Northwest organization have been in Spokane since organization last June.

Man Wanted in Roseburg On Check Charge Caught

The report of the secretary showed that during the year 784 women were enrolled in the Red Cross home nursing classes in the county, 657 in the classes last spring and 127 in the fall course just recently completed. During the year \$1003.52 was expended in financial assistance to ex-service men or to families of ex-service men. Two thousand and forty-three persons were given assistance, either financial or some other form, who were either ex-soldiers or families of ex-soldiers.

Washington, Dec. 13.—A new thrift bond drive will be started by the trade at once it was learned today. Bonds of \$25, \$50, \$100 denominations will be offered to the public.

The thrift bonds are similar to the thrift stamp, sold by the government during the war.

A bond purchased for \$20 will in five years be worth \$25.

PRISONERS RIOT, SO JAILORS STARVE 'EM

North Caldwell, N. J., Dec. 13.—Prisoners of the Essex county penitentiary here must undergo a compulsory hunger strike. Officials announced that they would not be fed until they had quit.

Inspired by the jail breaks of Chicago and Little Rock, 89 shrieking, singing and swearing prisoners attempted to wreck the jail and force their freedom. Cots were demolished, the plumbing in cells torn up and the bed clothes torn.

John Griffen was the direct cause of the riot. Carried to the punishment cell for knocking down a guard, Griffen threatened to tear up the place.

The riot followed, ending late today.

Shantung Wrangle May Be Settled Satisfactorily

Washington, Dec. 13.—Argument over the price China must pay Japan as indemnification when the Shantung railway is turned over to the Chinese government will be satisfactorily ended, it was declared today by a direct member of the mediation group, confirming United Press announcement of the fact.

China, it is understood, is ready to pay \$50,000,000 which Japan insists be obligated to pay Germany for the loan, but the hitch appears to be over the amounts to be given Japan for improvements during her operation of the road, also as to what offset should be made for profits Japan obtained during that period.

POWERS IN AGREEMENT

Washington, Dec. 13.—The naval powers are in "general agreement" over the naval holiday. Britain's semi-official spokesman indicated today. This agreement carries out the spirit of the Hughes ten year naval vacation, but he indicated that "some modifications might be necessary."

There is still talk that the Mutsu will be conceded Japan, whereupon America could probably retain the West Virginia and complete another modern vessel, while Great Britain would have the right to build one or two Hoods.

TYPHOID AT MYRTLE POINT

Parties from Myrtle Point today said that the citizens generally are conforming with the request that all drinking water be boiled. This is to check any further spread of typhoid fever. No new cases have been reported in the last day or two. It is claimed that a number of cases were traced to wells.—Marshfield Times.

DIES OF INJURIES

Aberdeen, Wash., Dec. 13.—John Lind, 25, construction laborer, died here today from injuries received when he was swept from the Clemons Logging road by a slide near Montesano yesterday. This brings the total deaths due to the slide up to six.

BURNS AT SEA

Washington, Dec. 13.—The American schooner Blue Peter, owned by the Wyndrove line, Inc., burned at sea on December 12, according to a report to the state department today from the American legation at Montevideo, Uruguay. All hands were rescued.

CHASE IS CHAMBER LUNCHEON SPEAKER

Elmo Chase, of the Chase gardens, will be the chief speaker on the program of the Thursday noon luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce this week. Mr. Chase and his father, F. B. Chase, have just returned from the east where they attended the National Vegetable Growers' convention in Albany, New York, and visited many of the vegetable growing sections.

The Chase Gardens won second prize of the best half acre of celery exhibit at the national convention. It is believed that if the Lane county celery had not been shipped so far it would have won first place which was awarded to New York state.

Mr. Chase will tell the chamber membership a few of the interesting details of vegetable growing and outline future prospects for the industry in the Willamette valley, it is reported.

JURY RENDER VERDICT

Molalla, Ore., Dec. 13.—Death due to blows of an axe in the hands of a person unknown was the verdict of a juror's jury following its inquest today into the mysterious murder of Everett Davis here recently.

Davis, it was brought out at the inquest, had been in the habit of bringing strange men from Portland to work his farm. A boy, about 18 years old, was the last person seen with the homesteader. Coroner Pace directed that a youth answering his description be sought.

CHICAGO GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, Dec. 13.—Wheat prices slumped on the Chicago board of trade today. The decline was chiefly due to fear on the part of operators of a favorable crop report. Bull sentiment was much less confident. Corn and oats opened lower due to a wave of selling but made some recovery later. Provisions closed irregular.

December wheat opened off 1-2 at \$1.09 1-4 and closed 1 lower. May wheat was 1-2 off at the opening of \$1.12 3-4 and closed off 7-8. July was off 1-8 at opening of \$1.02 at 47 1-8 and closed off 1-2. May corn opened at \$3 3-8 off 1-8 and closed up 1-8. July opened at 54 3-4, off 1-4 and closed off 3-8.

December oats opened at 32c off 1-4 and closed unchanged. May oats opened at 37 3-4 off 1-8 and closed off 1-8. July oats opened at 38 1-4 off 1-8 and closed up 1-8.
