PREMIER TAKAHASHI FAVORS NEW TREATY

Tokio, Dec. 11 (Delayed).—The quadrilateral agreement will prove efficient in preventing future wars, Premier Takahashi of Japan declared today in an interview with the United Press.

It was his first expression since the announcement of the agreement to prevent peace in the Pacific.

Other high officials indicated particular satisfaction with the expected effects of the agreement on American-Japanese relations.

Despite general official satisfaction, however, newspapers continued to express bitter disapproval.

The alliance is unfair and restrictive toward Japan, declared the newspaper editors.

The attitude of the Japanese delegates to the Washington conference is "unfriendly," charged the Hochi, another Tokyo newspaper.

"The quadrilateral agreement is better than nothing," was the comment of Baron Ino, opposition leader.

Christmas present to W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the liberal party, which triumphed at the polls last week over Premier Meighen and his conservative following.

Premier Meighen in a few days will present his resignation to the governor-general, Lord Byng of Vinny. The reins of power will be handed over to Mackenzie King a few days before Christmas.

OCTETS BORN TO WOMAN
Mexico City, Dec. 13.—From Tampico comes a report, published by El Universal, that Senora Enriqueta Rubio, at that place, gave birth yesterday to eight children, but none of them survived. The mother is well.

The Mexico City Medical association is showing much interest in the report and will institute an investigation as to its authenticity.

BAN ON CABARETS
Seattle, Dec. 13.—Licenses of all cabarets in Seattle were ordered cancelled by the council license committee last night.

An ordinance was introduced in the council placing exclusive jurisdiction over the cafes in the hands of the police department.

Under the terms of the proposed bill the cabarets will be permitted to operate only by permission of the police, which will have the power to revoke permits at any time for cause.

NEW ALLIANCE IS BREEDER OF WAR, SAYS MR. BORAH

Washington, D. C., Dec. 13.—The proposed four-power Pacific alliance is a war breeder, unless there is "real disarmament," is the opinion of Senator Borah of Idaho.

And "real disarmament" has not been attempted by anything the arms conference has thus far done, Borah holds. The Idaho senator attacked the union from the floor of the senate Monday, and served notice on that body that he would oppose the ratification unless disarmament went further than is now contemplated. Capital ships, he argued, are not a proper basis for armament reduction, because they are obsolete and the new weapons of warfare—submarines and aircraft—are left unrestricted. Further, he declared, the powers are left with huge armies and navies.

League's Military Alliances.
Leagues or alliances of nations, Borah contended, become military alliances when the nations maintain heavy armaments.

Borah's attack was the first criticism of the conference to be made from the senate floor. It revealed the form which arguments against the treaty will take when it is submitted to the senate and the objections that will be raised by those who were irreconcilably opposed to the treaty of Versailles.

Senator Reed of Missouri, democrat and irreconcilable, supported Borah's arguments, while they were combated by Senator Poindestre of Washington, republican, who opposed the Versailles pact, but favors the present treaty.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, democrat, agreed with Borah's interpretation of the meaning of the new treaty, but did not object to it. It went further, Robinson declared, than did the League of Nations in providing for the use of force. Robinson's argument was accepted as indicating the view held by many democrats.

Most of Borah's objections centered about clause 2 of the treaty, which provides for a conference among the four powers to decide on the "most efficient measures to be taken" if their rights are threatened. This, Borah insisted, would bind the United States to the use of force, morally, should such a conference deem force necessary.

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VIDA POWER SITE IS FILED ON BY EUGENE

The city of Eugene acquired a water power site yesterday when J. W. McArthur and A. T. Cokerline, members of the water board, and Superintendent C. A. McClain filed on the Martin Rapids site near Vida at the office of the state engineer in Salem. The filing was also renewed on the site at the mouth of the present intake.

While it is expected to utilize the site at the intake within the next year, widen the canal and install another generator in the plant, the Martin Rapids site has been filed on for investigation purposes, according to Mr. McClain.

So fast is the electrical industry growing and such a rapid increase in demand for light and power is taking place that in a few years even the city big three-quarter million dollar plant may be too small, says the superintendent. If the city is ever called on to build another and larger plant naturally we feel that we should have a fine power site without paying some individual for it who has filed first, continued the superintendent.

The increase this year over last in the amount of power is 250 kilowatts at this rate in five or six years the Waterville plant will be called on to furnish double the power it generates now.

BRYAN WOULD ASK GERMANY TO DISARM

It is a wonderful month—epoch making in the world's history—that the armistice conference has spent in working out a solution of the peace problem.

It is hard to realize that only a month ago the world was startled by the proposed scrapping of half the battleship tonnage of the leading nations. It took a while for the people to grasp the situation, but in a week's time the nations settled down to the new program and began to suspend work in the shipyards.

Then followed Briand's statement of France's position, which seemed to halt progress in the direction of land disarmament. This is the only thing that has been disappointing during the entire conference.

Those on the inside may be musing a plan for dealing with the military establishments of the world, but the general public is in doubt.

It is even intimated that the subject will be turned over to the next conference without any action being taken. It is strange that so direct a challenge to the new German republic has not brought forth an answer.

France charges Germany with contemplating another war and on that ground justifies herself in keeping a considerable army ready to repel invasion. It is not possible to put the question directly to Germany? A negative reply accompanied by willingness to join the other nations in any guarantees deemed essential to peace would enable the conference to go ahead and provide for a land reduction in line with the naval reduction.

Why the delay?

But while the reduction of land forces is at a standstill, the conference has been making splendid headway in ironing out the problems of the Far East. China's demands have received consideration and a number of conclusions have been reached which improve the relations between Japan and China.

HARVESTER COMPANY DENIES

Chicago, Dec. 6, 1921.
Editor Guard:—In your issue of November 15, headed "Farmers' Deadly Rate of Exchange," you say:

"The higher protected manufacturers form trusts like the International Harvester Company, the United States Steel Corporation, and the American Woolens Company, and put up prices to the farmers and other consumers because the high tariff shuts out foreign competition. They soak the American consumer good and hard and then sell their surplus output abroad, underselling foreign competitors at home."

As far as the International Harvester Company is concerned, this statement is entirely untrue and without any foundation whatsoever. We beg to remind you of our letter to you dated July 27, 1921, in which we said:

"We call your attention to the fact that all agricultural implements have been on the free list since 1914 and that they are not made dutiable under the Fordney Tariff Bill as recently passed by the house. Our company does not now and never did seek or desire any tariff protection for its manufactures."

We are at a loss to understand how you can include us among "highly protected manufacturers" or charge that we "put up prices to the farmers and other consumers because the high tariff shuts out foreign competition," when the fact is that farm implements have now been on the free list for nearly eight years. The tariff bill now before Congress contains no mention of agricultural implements.

All our experience with the editors of America has gone to show that they desire above all things to be accurate and to be fair. In this case there can be no question about the facts, as set forth in this letter and our previous letter of July 27th, and we are loath to believe that you do not wish to be fair to our company.

Bull Slaughtered Which Infected Herd With T. B.

The sire which transmitted tuberculosis to the Pleasant Hill herd of 10 animals was slaughtered yesterday by Dr. G. D. Loder, federal expert. All other animals on the place are infected and will be sent to Portland to be slaughtered under federal supervision.

The bull showed that he was in advanced stages of tuberculosis and it was decided to slaughter him at once, says Dr. Loder. The animals here he says were practically gone. The incident shows the importance of testing sires or other animals before bringing them into a herd. In regard to the question is the re-

actor test sure, Ira P. Whitney, county agricultural agent, declared today that he had personally seen 100 reactors slaughtered and only one of that number failed to show tuberculosis when an autopsy was made.
