**Judge Barnard Lobbying for 5-Cent Gasoline Tax Bill**  
County Judge C. P. Barnard spent the day in Salem at the state capital. The judge proposes a gasoline tax bill, charging five cents a gallon, two cents for the county and three cents to the state. The recent convention of the state highway commission adopted the proposed measure and it will be submitted to the legislature by the legislative committee of that body. The state is collecting two cents a gallon on gasoline now. The money raised by the gasoline tax would be used on state and county road improvement and maintenance.
