TAXPAYERS' MEETING CALLED TO PROTEST OR APPROVE BUDGET

To voice protests or approvals of the estimated Lane county budget for 1922, taxpayers of the county will meet with the county court Thursday morning in the court house at 10 o'clock. The budget as compiled for 1922 represents an increase over 1921 from 24.5 to 25.5% mills or from \$787,716.40 to \$894,122.

The increase in the budget is practically all in the county expense estimates for next year. State taxes this year are 10.839 mills and last year they were 10.743. A comparison of this year's budget estimate with last year's budget shows increases chiefly in the following departments:

The care of the poor is raised from \$12,000 to \$13,000 over 1921. The amount to be raised for general county purposes has been raised from \$283,452.05 to \$307,694.

There will be no voting in taxpayers' meetings under the new law. The county court, which is the taxing board, will meet, hear protests and approvals, make any changes it sees necessary in the estimate and proceed to vote the levy.

The only limitations placed on the court is that it cannot increase the budget estimate of the committee more than 10 per cent. It may decrease it in any amount.

The amount charged to market roads and Pacific highway is \$114,074 compared with \$110,000 last year.

Among decreases noted in the 1922 estimates are some in the following departments: County school superintendent's office from \$5,970 to \$5,850.

The Lane county public health nurse from \$3,000 to \$2,400. General roads and bridges from \$150,000 to \$148,000.

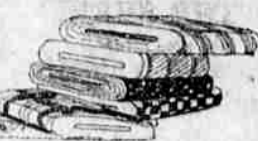

DYNAMITE IS STOLEN FROM POWDER HOUSE

No clue that might lead to apprehension was left by the person or persons who entered the R. A. Babby Powder company's warehouse just across the Willamette river, northeast of Eugene, several nights ago, and took one box of 60 per cent dynamite, the highest-powered explosive stored in the warehouse.

In entering the store room the thieves had broken into the smaller storage room first but finding only shells and lighter explosives there had forced the lock to the door of the larger room where, the high-power explosives are kept. So far as is known only one box of the dynamite is gone.

The theory has been offered that the persons who stole the dynamite were eggmen and that they may intend, by boiling the dynamite down, to secure nitro-glycerine for use in their anti-cracking activities.

Harding Will Warn Aides to Stay Within Appropriations

Washington, Dec. 21.—President Harding personally will warn department heads at a government business meeting in January that they will make themselves liable to dismissal and a fine if they exceed their appropriations without proper authority, it was stated today at the federal budget bureau.

Charles Dawes, in announcing the meeting, stated that Harding would point out that a statute against such expenditures is in existence. Should the head of any department exhaust his appropriation he will under the decision to enforce the act, be forced to ask congress for authority to incur new obligations until such time as a deficiency appropriation is granted.

FOCH SENDS MESSAGE

Havre, Dec. 21.—Marshal Foch dispatched a message to the people of America through the United Press on his arrival here today. The message read: "I bring back an impression of a sympathetic welcome that I can never forget. I am most touched."

"I consider America a country of vast economic possibilities, infinite resources and immense realizations. Furthermore, Americans are guided in their movements by disinterested and noble sentiments. I am glad to express to them my unalterable affection."
