OREGON'S EXPENSES \$30,862,536 IN YEAR

Salem, Ore., Jan. 2.—During the 12 months ended Saturday night there had been disbursed on account of the state departments, institutions and other activities through the offices of the secretary of state a total of \$30,862,536, according to a report prepared by Sam A. Kester, in charge of the state department.

For state highways there was disbursed \$18,048,000, while for general governmental expenses, including state departments, state institutions, institutions of higher learning and the governmental activities there has been disbursed the sum of \$10,551,490. Disbursements by the industrial accident commission totaled \$2,262,947.

In order to make these disbursements a total of 65,142 state warrants were issued, or an average of approximately 230 for each business day of the year.

Tilden II and Mrs. Mallory Head Tennis in United States

New York, Jan. 2.—William T. Tilden, II, and Mrs. Franklin I. Mallory, today stood officially at the head of the tennis ranks of the United States. The speedy Philadelphia was placed at the head of the mens singles ranking by the U. S. Lawn Tennis association in their official announcement. Mrs. Franklin I. Mallory for the sixth time headed the list of women stars in the singles.

Tilden divided honors with Vincent Richards in the mens doubles while Mrs. Mallory and Mrs. Mary K. Brown of Los Angeles headed the womens doubles.

Mrs. Brown ranked second to Mrs. Mallory in the womens singles. William M. Johnston, San Francisco, was rated just behind Tilden in the mens singles, Richards being placed in third position.

In the first nineteen in the mens singles, four are from Philadelphia, three from San Francisco, seven from New York city, one from Portland, Ore., one from Chicago and three from Massachusetts.

Poindexter Out to Succeed Himself, He Declares Today

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 2.—Senator Miles Poindexter, spending a portion of his vacation here, spent the morning in his room at the Hotel Butler receiving delegations of ex-soldiers, postoffice men and other communities and individuals with matters of public interests and welfare to discuss.

Speaking of politics, the senator said: "Very briefly, I am a candidate to succeed myself. I expect to make a campaign in the usual way, getting around over the state talking things over with the people. I may be my own campaign manager—at least, I haven't any campaign manager yet."

Prominent Woman Killed in Automobile Wreck

Portland, Ore., Jan. 2.—The automobile accident that killed Mrs. Junia Miller Miles, only daughter of Former Internal Revenue Collector Milton A. Miller and wife of State Representative Sherman Miles, banker at St. Helens, happened shortly after 7 o'clock Saturday evening. A striking coincidence is that about the same time in the evening exactly one year before, a sister of Miller and aunt of Mrs. Miles was killed in the same way near Ashland.

At St. Helens, Mr. and Mrs. Miles lived at the home of Harold McCormick of the McCormick Shipbuilding & Lumbering Co., after which Miles went to a garage to have his car repaired. The job took longer than was expected. Mr. Miles phoned the fact to the McCormick home, and George Perkins, brother of Mrs. McCormick, started to drive Mrs. Miles to her home two miles away, where her two children left during the day in the care of the mother of Mr. Miles, were to be brought back to the McCormick home where all were to have spent the evening.

Momentarily mistaking the road, Perkins tried to recover the highway by a sharp turn, and the heavy car turned turtle, pinning Mrs. Miles under it. Dr. Flynn, the attending physician, believed that death was almost instantaneous.

Mrs. Miles was well known in Eugene, as is her husband. They were the owners of an orchard in the Creswell district and spent several weeks in Lane county every year.
