

MANY NEW HOMES TO BE BUILT WITH BONUS IN COUNTY

That ex-service men are going to build many homes in Eugene and other cities of the county as well as purchase and improve numerous farms with the state bonus, seems evident from the number of applications for loans going forward to the state commission. The applications for loans and cash bonuses are being sent in in Eugene to the Red Cross while in Cottage Grove, Junction City, Creswell, and Springfield the American Legion posts are handling the applications.

There have been about 1000 applications for loans sent to the bonus commission by the local Red Cross. While 60 per cent of this number have applied for cash bonuses and 40 per cent for home and farm loans, Miss Azile Howard, secretary of the Red Cross, believes that the percentage will be reversed when all the applications are in. There are probably more than 1500 ex-service men in Lane county eligible for the bonus. Those who have made up their minds to take the cash bonus have sent in their applications at once, says Miss Howard, but those who desire to take the loans have held off. This has been due to the fact that many of the rules under which the loans are to be made have not yet been formulated by the commission and the ex-service men are desirous of seeing just what conditions will be imposed on them. Then there is another class who cannot give security for the loan at present and are holding off with the hopes of becoming better fixed.

Cash for loans is expected to be available about February 1.

WORK OF CONGRESS STARTS WEDNESDAY

Washington, Jan. 3.—Congress today set out on a long road at the other end of which lies the congressional election of 1922.

Between now and next summer, when the legislatures must go home to make sure that the folks nominate the right candidates for the house and senate, congress has decisions to make on which may turn the popular decision of next November as to the political makeup of the next congress.

Tariff, further tax revision, the Newberry case, treaties growing out of the disarmament conference, foreign debt refunding, railroad relief, ship subsidy—these are some of the problems just ahead.

Penrose Death Causes Halt.

Pausing today out of respect to a departed colleague, Senator Penrose, both houses were to get to work tomorrow in whatever legislative program their leaders had mapped out. There was some uncertainty about the program. In the senate the foreign debt refunding bill, which President Harding marked "urgent" in his message, seems hopelessly bogged in the finance committee.

Tax Law Unpopular.

Tariff revision has been in progress for many months, but the senate finance committee today seemed no nearer completion of the measure than it was last November.

Newberry Case Up Soon.

Senate leaders spent the day canvassing the situation created by Penrose's death and preparing to make committee shifts necessitated by that event.

Newberg, Ore., Jan. 3.—Notice of a 10 per cent reduction in wages posted by the Charles K. Spanning Logging company Saturday night led to a walkout by the 100 employees of the company Monday morning. The company's sawmill was shut down.

Explanations by company officials that the cut was intended to apply only to the more highly paid employees in said to be placating the men and the mill was expected to resume operations today. The men remonstrated at any reduction from the present \$3 minimum wage.

As The World Wags

EDUCATION is the universal solution for all the ills of society. Every reformer after stating his case and after suggesting the dire consequences of drunkenness, or jazz dancing or drug doping or whatever it is, usually asks for more laws but admits that the final adequate solution lies in education.

BUT THIS is really to beg the question. Certainly if everyone were properly educated he would know how to live without making a beast or a brute of himself. But the difficulties are immense when we attempt to educate men and women for higher living.

RE-EDUCATING the adult part of the population is practically impossible. We learn a little new knowledge from time to time from experience, by running our heads into things and getting bumped, but not much. The only hope is in the young whose minds and characters are plastic. If we could only properly and completely educate a single generation of children from the cradle through their teens, most of the ills of human society would automatically disappear.

RIGHT HERE we meet the first insurmountable difficulty, which is teachers. Educational authorities are continually telling us that even teachers properly prepared are not to be had for the school-rooms. As far as that goes, we do not need to be told, for anyone who has eyes to see and who has any knowledge of rural life, knows that such is the case. But school teachers are not the only kind needed if the child is to be

properly educated. His parents, the leading citizens of his town, the young men and women who are just one lap ahead of him, broadly speaking every older who comes in contact with him must help educate him.

ACTUALLY that is what takes place and that is the reason why so many of our young people get a wrong start in life. The atmosphere of society does more educating than all the schools or churches or even the homes.

LEGISLATION against this, that or the other admittedly harmful practice, as for instance against drinking alcoholic beverages, helps only so far as it is the reflection of public sentiment. What folks think and what folks will say has more influence than all our laws in directing both old and young in our social relations.

HENCE educating the race is a big business, that is if we educate for progress. On the other hand it is easy to educate for degeneracy and sloth and social decay. Virtue for the individual or the race is always something conquered and basically is always some phase of self-mastery.

COST PRISONER'S "FEED" CUT
Tacoma, Jan. 3.—The "high cost" of feeding prisoners in the city jail dropped noticeably in 1921, reports to the police showed today.

In 1920 there were 30,550 meals served at an average cost of 16.7 cent as compared with 40,728 meals at an average cost of 12.8 cent last year.

Jim Slagle, Wife Slayer, Will Be Arraigned Today

County Attorney Herman Allen this morning filed an information formally charging Slagle with the murder. The accused man has not indicated what his course of defense will be.

Tacoma, Jan. 3.—Mrs. Stella Brown, proprietor of a rooming house made an unsuccessful attempt yesterday to commit suicide by slitting her wrists with a safety razor blade.

Eugene Fire Department Answers 140 Calls in 1921

The Eugene fire department answered 140 calls during the year 1921, according to the report of Fire Chief William Nussbaum. The Pierce garage was the only bad fire during the year and the loss is estimated at more than \$50,000. Outside the loss on this one fire the loss from fire in the city is estimated at \$3200 and insurance on fires is given at \$4,723.43.

The fire department traveled 320 miles in responding to the 140 alarms. There were 69 flue fires, three from defective flues, 22 rubbish fires, one gas stove fire, two false alarms, four automobile fires, one electric store fire, two from electric irons, six from carelessness, six gasoline fires, 11 from sparks on roof, one from a cigarette, three from kerosene stoves and nine grass fires.
