

PARENT-TEACHERS OF E. H. S. TO ORGANIZE ARREST POPHAM IN IOWA FOR LARCENY

For the purpose of organizing a Parent Teachers' association of patrons of the Eugene high school a meeting has been called for Wednesday, January 11. Decision to call a meeting of interested patrons was reached at a gathering of faculty members and a committee of the association council of the Parent-Teachers' association of the city.

Every school in the city has a Parent-Teachers' association and it is believed that the excellent results accomplished in the grade schools can be duplicated in the high school with such an organization. It has been found school work can be strengthened by better acquaintance between parents and teachers and a realization of problems of each, says J. G. Swan, county rural school supervisor, and a representative of the state Parent-Teachers' association. The Parent-Teachers' association is not a place for complaints to be aired but an organization which has as its aim to help the schools do good constructive work, says Mr. Swan.

At the meeting of interested parents called for 3:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, the high school faculty and association council desire a large attendance.

CITY SCHOOLS SHOW GAIN IN ATTENDANCE

The report of E. F. Carleton, city superintendent, to F. J. Moore, county superintendent, for the month of December, 1921, shows a total enrollment in the public schools of Eugene of 2600. The actual number of students in school at the end of the month, shows an increase of 122 over last year, and an increase of 314 over that of two years ago.

During the month of December, 21 new pupils entered, 12 of them coming from other parts of the state. The average daily attendance for the month was 2361, an average daily attendance of 85.6 per cent, which is one per cent higher than last year.

One thousand and seventy-six pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the month. There were 155 visits by parents and members of the school board. Last year there were only 114 visitors.

WOULD DEVELOP COLUMBIA BASIN

Portland, Ore., Jan. 6.—Development of the Columbia basin irrigation project can be made only if the reclamation work is placed upon a national basis so that federal aid funds become available, in the opinion of a group of business leaders from Spokane who arrived here today.

The Spokane men are here to confer with the directors of the Chamber of Commerce and leading business men of this city and suggest that the local commercial organization appoint a permanent committee to handle problems of the irrigation project in collaboration with committees of other northwestern cities.

The visitors also came to ask the endorsement of the Chamber of Commerce of this city to the bringing of General George Goethals of Panama canal building fame so that he may make a survey of the project and determine the most feasible method of developing it.

The visitors placed their plans before a group of business men gathered at luncheon in the Chamber of Commerce at noon today. They were assured of Portland's support. The party will leave tonight for Spokane.

SEAMEN'S WAGES CUT

Washington, Jan. 6.—Wages of all officers and seamen on United States shipping board vessels today were ordered reduced within 30 days. Chairman Powell of the emergency fleet corporation announced late today. This follows reduction by private operators, the amount of the cut was not stated but it was believed to range from 15 to 30 percent.

Arrangements will be discussed for the publication of a supplement to the judgment book, including approximately 1000 judgments and 150 bankrupts in Lane county during 1920 and 1921. Officers for the ensuing year will also be elected.

plant is laid out and planned to add new units as needed.

The cooperative method of pooling and selling means prosperity to all and the most efficient manner of handling farm produce. Never does any of the fruit of stockholders of the association go to waste as it does where there are private companies handling the packing and marketing. Each year the amount of produce grown is accurately estimated by the officials of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association and provision is made to handle it at the various plants, marketing plans are laid early and every effort is exerted to sell the product at the best possible prices.

The Eugene Fruit Growers' association never gets enough and the farmer is never told to drive on with his truck loads of fruit, as occurs yearly in other sections.

Has Remarkable Record.

The Eugene Fruit Growers' association has one of the most remarkable records of any concern in the west dealing in agricultural products and probably has contributed more to the development of Lane county than any other single industry.

Motion for New Highway Hearing Denied Turners

The motion of Frank and Laura Turner, of Divide, for a new trial in the case over the disputed payment of the Pacific highway right of way brought against them by the State Highway commission, has been denied by Judge G. F. Skipworth in circuit court.

The Turners were awarded \$630 damage to their property as the result of the right-of-way by a jury at last term of court. They had asked more than three times this amount, in an answer to the proceedings of the state highway commission to condemn the right-of-way. The judge says the jurors made the award on their own judgment, that the trial was without error and that it is the ruling of the court that the judgment should stand.

Specific Charges on File Against Governor Small

Waukegan, Ill., Jan. 6.—Specific charges that Governor Len Small and others conspired and took \$535,000 in state funds, were on file with Judge Claire C. Edwards today. The allegations were contained in a bill filed by the prosecution those alleged to have conspired with the governor are: Fred Sterling, Lieutenant Governor; Verne Curtis, Grant Park, Ill., banker, and the late Edward Curtis.

State funds were deposited with the Grant Park bank at 2 per cent interest and afterward loaned to Chicago packers at five and eight and a half per cent, the state alleged.

Governor Small's attorneys will appear in court tomorrow to present their objections to the bill. The actual trial is expected to start within a week.

Fine Terminal Station Is Dedicated to Motor Travel

Several hundred dancers enjoyed the opening of the motor stage terminal in the Elks building at Seventh avenue and Olive street, last evening. A six piece orchestra in the balcony furnished music for the dance which dedicated the new terminal depot to automobile passenger and freight traffic.

Stages in all direction with the regularity of railroad trains will run on schedules out of the terminal station. Every modern convenience for the motor passenger has been arranged and from last night on prospects for a good business seems apparent.

Eighteen Eugene employees of the Standard Oil company banqueted in the Osburn last evening and "talked shop." L. R. Jeffries, special agent of the company, outlined the policies and quotas of his management here employees of the company presented Mr. Jeffries with a gift.

E. G. Davis, assistant special agent, talked on service; and A. J. Rogers, chief clerk, discussed sales accountability.

Salem Woman Suicides by Jumping Into Mill Creek

Salem, Ore., Jan. 6.—Mrs. Martha A. Williams, 58, committed suicide by jumping from the bridge over Mill creek near her home on Fourteenth street here about 3 o'clock this morning. The body was found an hour later near the Southern Pacific railroad bridge, a few hundred yards below the wagon bridge. Despondency, caused by ill health, is thought to be responsible.

Big Booze Fine Paid by Dougherty for Release

Mack Dougherty, arrested on his farm near Junction City, several weeks ago and fined \$350 in justice court for illegal possession of liquor, has paid his fine and was released from the county jail today. Dougherty paid \$311.35 due on his fine, which he had not laid out.

When arrested officers declare Dougherty was well supplied with liquor and it was believed he was making moonshine.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CASE

Boston, Mass., Jan. 6.—Judge Crosby in supreme court late today declined to appoint Frank M. Lamson, vice-president of the Old Colony Trust company, as temporary trustee for the Christian Science Publishing society until a hearing had been held on the claims of the former trustees, Herbert W. Eastue and Paul Harvey, that they were removed by the directors in bad faith.

MILK PRICES CUT

Tacoma, Jan. 6.—War among dairymen here today caused a cut of 2 1/2 cents in retail milk prices. The product is now retailing at 10 cents a quart and 7 1/2 cents a pint.

According to dairymen, the producer will suffer from the cut, which is said to be the result of jealous rivalry among Swiss dairymen.

Washington, Jan. 6.—The war finance corporation has loaned nearly \$150,000,000 to agricultural interests in \$50,000,000 more to encourage exports in 1921, it was stated officially today.
