Organization of the Federation of Women's clubs of Eugene was perfected Thursday afternoon at a meeting of the representatives of practically every women's organization of the city at the Chamber of Commerce when officers were elected and a tentative outline of plans for the activities of the new cooperative association were discussed. A constitution and by-laws will be ready for submission to the affiliated members at a meeting of the organization to be held in January. Miss Clara L. Fitch was named president and Mrs. Morgan Watson, secretary. The organization will be composed of the members of the

women's clubs in the city and a central board consisting of representatives from each unit of the federation will act as the governing body. The purpose of the amalgamation is to increase the effectiveness and efficiency of the various clubs of Eugene and the promoters say they believe that with the central organization of delegates from each separate organization the resulting cooperation of effort will be of great benefit and have the further advantage of bringing the influence of every women's organization to bear on the solution of problems that are common to all the clubs affiliated.

WILL RAISE FUNDS FOR DEVELOPMENT DURING THIS YEAR

To at once begin an energetic campaign for a 1922 development fund was unanimously decided upon at last night's Chamber of Commerce meeting of subscribers to the fund used last year.

President L. L. Ray is to appoint a committee to have charge of the work. A get-together mass meeting will likely be held in the near future. In order to start the campaign off with the enthusiasm which characterized last night's meeting.

Everyone present favored carrying on with increased vigor the work of development begun last year, which received hearty commendation at last night's meeting. The president and secretary were highly complimented for their unflinching zeal and unselfish devotion to the cause of building up a greater Eugene and a more prosperous and populous Lane county. The \$12,000 budget for 1922 was approved, in a general way, although one speaker was of the opinion that the estimated overhead of \$4,500 seemed too high. The only other note of disapproval sounded referred to the lack of legality of the pledge cards, but this objection was seemingly answered by the explanation that the work of the chamber was supported entirely voluntary contributions and there was no thought of forcing anyone to pay.

\$4000 to Be Raised.

The three-year pledges amount to \$247, leaving \$4000 to be raised by new subscriptions and by inducing those who subscribed for one year to renew their pledges. The opinion was voiced that since it was the duty of the directors to spend the funds raised they should not be required to solicit subscriptions.

The biggest project in the way of development work which now confronts the chamber was conceded to be the drainage of swamp lands, of which there are 20,000 to 25,000 acres in Lane county. It was pointed out that if the productivity of these lands were increased only \$10 per acre each year, the income from this source would amount to a quarter of a million dollars yearly. The need of enlarging the accommodations of Eugene's auto park was also pointed out, in view of the immense number of tourists which are expected to stop here during the next few years.

Accounting for Year Made.

Of the \$13,034.50 pledged for development work last year, \$10,748.51 was paid in and \$203.32 collected from other sources, making the total receipts \$11,951.73. Unpaid bills total \$1012. Organization expenses amounted to \$1,239.02. The abandoned Elks lease cost \$805, the grange dinner \$110.00, photo-

graphic work \$510.95, American Legion convention \$225, publicity \$220, legislators' trip to Eugene \$180, aviation bungalow \$332.67, state fair exhibit \$143.64, auto tags \$200, returned to house fund \$500, miscellaneous items \$262.05. Monroe's salary for six months was \$2100; Chadwick's for four months \$800; office help, \$938.50; other office expenses, \$852.18.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH ELECTS OFFICERS

An increase of 100 per cent in attendance at the preaching services at the Christian church during the past year, 50 per cent increase in the Sunday school and 33 per cent in the membership, which now totals 1200, was reported at the annual meeting held in the church last evening. Referring to these and other evidences of the church's growth, Dr. E. V. Stivers, pastor, said they indicated a wonderful victory for the kingdom and constituted great cause for rejoicing. The maximum attendance at the Sunday school was 1402 and the minimum 311, with an average of 519. The collections totaled over \$1500, of which \$771 was for benevolences.

The receipts of the church for general expenses were more than \$7000 and nearly \$2000 for benevolences, an increase of \$1200 for the former and \$1000 for the latter over the previous 12 months. A total of \$16,000 was received and expended by the church. The pastor conducted 58 funerals and solemnized 50 weddings.

The pastor's report and the ensuing business meeting followed the very enjoyable annual dinner served in the basement by the ladies of the congregation. Five veteran members were elected elders emeriti, as a signal recognition of long and faithful service.

Those so honored are P. L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon, J. S. McCallum, P. R. Burnett, D. M. McCrady and Dr. E. C. Sanderson, president of the Eugene Bible university.

New elders were chosen as follows: Ora A. Rhodes, J. M. Williams, W. E. Knott, Ira P. Whitney and J. A. Gowling. New deacons to serve this year are J. E. Clark, Frank Bailor, J. W. Haines, P. E. Iseninger, Victor Hoare, M. W. Weber, L. L. Woods, C. P. Sylvester, Guy X. Barton, C. L. Close, W. J. Litherland, George W. Hicks, Dr. Chilton and W. M. Kirkley.

A committee of women served a bounteous dinner in the basement dining room just before the business meeting. Hundreds enjoyed the spread.
