JAPAN FORWARDS PROTEST TO CHITA

Tokio, Jan. 7.—The Japanese government has forwarded a strong protest to the Chita government against its action in publishing documents designed to show an alleged Franco-Japanese secret agreement.

The protest includes a recital of the Chita "exposures" made at Washington and warned that negotiations with the Chita government would be discontinued if "falsehoods do not cease."
