

C. Hughes' Prominence Causes President Concern

Washington, Jan. 7.—Without referring to the merits or demerits of the Hughes administration, the conflicting interests placed upon it by President Harding, and the other American delegates, and the making of the treaty of present interest and may be of great political significance.

COLONEL WATTERSON'S BIOGRAPHY

The following from the autobiography of the late Colonel "Marion" Watterson, former publisher of the Louisville, Ky., Courier-Journal, sets forth the creed of the noted editor, his faith in mankind and his desire to be of assistance to the deserving, however humble.

It has been my rule, aim and effort in my newspaper career to print nothing of a man which I would not say to his face; to print nothing of a man in malice; to look well and think twice before consigning a suspect to the ruin of printer's ink; to respect the old and defend the weak; and lastly, at work and play, day-time and night-time, to be good to the girls and square to the boys, for both it and not been written "of such is the kingdom of heaven?"

I suppose I must have been born an infidel. Pursuing the story of the dark ages, when men were burnt at the stake for the heresy of refusing to bow to the will of the majority, it is not the voice of the Protestant or the Catholic that issues from the flames and reaches my heart, but the cry of suffering man, my brother. To me a saint is a saint, whether he wears wooden shoes or goes barefoot; whether he gets his baptism secretly out of a font of consecrated water or comes dripping from the depths of the nearest brook shouting "Glory, hallelujah!" From my boyhood the persecution of man for opinion's sake—and no matter for what opinion's sake—has aroused within me the only devil I have ever personally known.

"I Know Nothing"

"My reading has embraced not a few words which seek or which affect to deal with the mastery of life and death. Each and every one of them leaves a mystery still. For all their learning and research—their positivism and contradictions—none of the writers I have read than I think I know myself, and all that I think I know myself may be abridged to the simple receipt, I know nothing. The wisest of us seek not whence we came or whither we go; the human mind is unable to conceive the eternal in either direction; the soul of man inevitably even to himself.

The day but one:
Yet the light of the bright world dies
With the dying sun.
The mind has a thousand eyes,
The heart but one;
Yet the light of a whole life dies
When love is done.

Answers Not Satisfying

I have often in talking with intelligent Jews expressed a wonder that they should stigmatize the most illustrious Jew as an impostor, saying to them: "What matters it whether Jesus was so divine or human parentage—a human being or an immortal spirit? He was a Jew; a glorious unoffending Jew, done to death by a mob of hoodlums in Jerusalem. Why should not you and I call him master—and kneel together in love and pity at his feet?"

Never have I received any satisfying answer. Partisanship—churchism—will ever stick to its fetish. Too many churches—or, shall I say, church fabrics—breeding controversy where there should be agreement, each sect and subdivision fighting phantoms of its fancy.

Too many churches and too much partisanship! It is love—love through grace of God—truth where we can find it—which shall irradiate the life that is. If when we have prepared ourselves for the life to come, love be wanting, nothing else is much worth while. Not alone the

perfunctory position of spokesman, with his presidential boom deflated by the conjectures of the administration press pens the president took the initiative in interpreting the four power treaty, which, according to the principal administration organ here, he is said to have sketched last winter. This interpretation it seems in direct conflict with the interpretation placed upon it by Secretary Hughes and the other American delegates. Under Mr. Harding's interpretation the guarantee of the insular possessions and dominions of Japan does not apply to the main islands constituting Japan proper. The American delegates construe the treaty to apply to the Japanese homeland; that is to say, to the Japanese empire.

What effect if any this conflict of view will have from a party political point of view upon the relations of the president and his secretary of state remains to be seen, but in view of what has preceded it, as set forth herein, it has created a situation which will cause much speculation and conjecture and the development of which will be watched with national interest.
