Combination Bridge on Row River to Be Repaired

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HUGE BLOCK COUNTY ROAD BONDS BOUGHT

Lane county road bonds to the amount of \$300,000 were bid at 101 1/2 per cent of their face value by the Ladd and Tilton bank and the Blyth, Whittier and company at a meeting of representatives of the two institutions and the county court last night. As bonds must be sold at face value \$300,000, subscribed by farmers living along the road projects to be improved, will be paid the purchasers.

As previous bids had been 99 cents on the dollar the increased bids were satisfactory to the court. They mean that \$200,000 will be paid as discount on the \$300,000 issue instead of \$30,000 as anticipated by the committee in underwriting the bonds. C. H. Baker represented Ladd and Tilton and T. H. Boyd appeared for Blyth, Whittier and company. The bonds bear five per cent interest and are payable \$20,000 annually from 1931 to 1945.

The roads on which the money is to be expended are as follows:

Elmira to Noti, \$48,000; Elmira to Franklin, \$48,000; Camp Creek road from Hayden bridge to Camp Creek bridge, \$30,000; from Coast Fork bridge through Cloverdale to the ford opposite Creswell, \$30,000; McKenzie highway east of Blue River in co-operation with the state, \$30,000; the Eugene Lake creek highway over the summit of the Coast mountains by way of the low pass to finish grading and to surface the grade, \$45,000; from a point a short distance north of Naticum toward Fall Creek, \$10,000 (\$15,000 to be expended on this project from the market road fund); Eugene-Lorane highway from the end of the present macadam over Conrad hill, \$40,000; Cottage Grove-Lorane highway \$10,000.

May Let Contracts Soon.

The sale of these bonds means that work on the above projects will be started at once by the county surveyor and contracts will be let early in the spring.

STATE WOULD STAMP OUT DRUG PEDDLING

Portland, Ore., Jan. 11.—Oregon has opened its fight on the drug evil. Representatives from all over the state gathered at the call of Governor Olcott to work out plans for combating the traffic in narcotics and checking their consumption, and as the result of a joint meeting of the state board of health and pharmacy at Salem yesterday, many participants in the conference today were prepared to favor more stringent laws governing the traffic than have been enacted in any state in the union.

Dr. George W. H. Smith, health officer of the city of Portland, had his plan for a state industrial institution for the cure of addicts ready to present to the conference, but the minds of county representatives from outside Portland seemed swayed by the punitive rather than the curative aspects of the campaign to be waged.

The meeting today is the culmination of months of investigation of the drug traffic by federal, state and city authorities. Mayor Baker, of Portland, after some weeks has held regular Tuesday conferences with the city council with the drug evil as the sole topic. Governor Olcott has instigated a state-wide survey, and federal officers engaged in preventing smuggling and empowered to enforce the provisions of the Harrison narcotics act of 1914 have prepared voluminous data to present to the conference. Governor Olcott, at the meeting at Salem yesterday, characterized the traffic and consumption of drugs as the worst evil facing the people of the state and has called for active measures to stamp out the public problem now needful of solution.

BUTTER STILL SLUMPS

Portland, Ore., Jan. 11.—It looks like a further drop in the price of butter in the local trade. Weakness permeates the entire local market and there is an accumulation of supplies everywhere. The intense weakness of the butter situation is the most demoralizing that has been known here for a very extended period. While extra butters are nominally quoted as 33¢ a pound and a very limited volume of sales may be shown a fraction above this, there is really no demand of volume of this class of offerings at prevailing figures. The result is that the trade here scarcely knows which way to turn in an effort to unload.

Egg Market Inclined Lower.

Market for eggs is inclined downward, although no early change was shown in Portland Tuesday morning. Sharp decline in Chicago is expected to force lower values here as the surplus must compete with the eastern stock. Later, private firms cut the selling price of select 2s to 24¢-25¢. The buying price for current receipts was reduced to 23¢ for Wednesday.

Prince Yamagata, Japan, Losing Strength Rapidly

Tokyo, Jan. 11.—The illness of Prince Yamagata has become much more serious. It was learned here today. The last leader of the "Genro" who has never been ill is now battling the final contest of his career against age and sickness and the odds are against the old warrior and statesman who for many years has been the real ruler of Japan.

Yamagata who is 85 years old—a year older than Marquis Okuma who died two days ago—will remain boss to the last. Sick though he is he is still the most powerful figure behind the scenes in the Japanese government. Yamagata is the sole survivor of the original group of dynamic men known as "genro" or "elder statesmen" who bridged the gap between medievalism and modernity.

From Yamagata's beautiful villa near Odawara the old field marshal continues from his last sick bed to exercise his leadership. From the capital party leaders and officials are constantly calling to confer with "him who must be obeyed"—and to obey him.

State Dog Tax Law Declared Constitutional

Salem, Ore., Jan. 11.—The constitutionality of the dog tax law, enacted by the state legislature of 1919, is upheld in an opinion written by Justice Rand and handed down by the supreme court yesterday. In his opinion Justice Bingham of the Marion county circuit court in the case of E. Hofer vs. John Carson, district attorney, and other officials of Marion county.

After, at the owner of a dog, sought to enjoin officials of Marion county from collecting the license fee fixed by the state law at \$1 annually for male dogs or \$2 for female dogs, and \$2 annually for female dogs. Hofer in his complaint asserted that his dog was already regularly assessed and taxed as personal property, that he had paid this tax and that under the act of 1919, under attack, he would be compelled to pay an additional sum as license fee, which in reality is not a license fee but a tax levied wholly for the purpose of raising a revenue to create and maintain a "dog fund."

DODGE CAR PRICES DROP

New York, Jan. 11.—President F. J. Haynes of the Dodge Motor Car company has announced a reduction in the price of automobiles manufactured by the company effective January 1. The amount of the reduction, however, will not be made public until February 1. Purchasers of cars since January 1 will receive rebates.

Stubbs, shortly before Christmas, resulted in Stubbs' release by Justice Hackett here yesterday. The sensational charge that her husband sought to force her into a life of shame, was brought by Mrs. Stubbs the day following her return from Knoxville, Tenn., where she was accused of the murder of Leroy H. Harth, wealthy automobile dealer.

Mrs. Stubbs has filed suit for divorce.

As the World Wags

BLUE LAWS have time and again proved ineffective for the promotion of righteousness. Yet there is a type of uplifter who labors zealously for legislation of coercion designed to make everyone behave just as the said reformer believes to be most decent and proper.

PLAINTIVE one speaker before the congressional committee yesterday, which was considering an amendment to the postal bill which would prohibit newspapers from printing any news of races or other sports which would result in the laying of odds or betting on the results of races or contests, spoke up in the name of a lot of "good fellows" and pleaded that the zealous of puritanical ideals should not be allowed "to take all the joy out of life."

THE EFFECTIVENESS of laws is at the best very limited. Lawyers thrive because language is such an inexact thing that we never succeed in defining precisely what we intend to prohibit or limit. Thus this law which would prohibit the publication of prevailing odds relating to such things as races and horse fights could only be effectively believed if so stringent that it would amount to putting in the hands of some officials a virtual censorship of the press.

WE HAVE all kinds of laws which

don't work. There is the anti-prostitution law, the "blue sky" law, the anti-vice laws including the national vice act. In fact, there are laws enough on the statute books of this republic to place all of us under a dictatorship of officials that would leave little personal liberty of action. But all cheerfully become law-breakers every day, ignoring the multitude of restrictions which are the inner enemies of the law. Meanwhile the reformer, fitfully from legislative hall to legislative hall, busy as so many bees annually to the collection of official and flannel blue laws of the nation.

THE AVERAGE citizen after a shakes the customs and practices which reign in society. When some practice comes a vicious nuisance to the man on the street as the saloon did, it must be. But no law can be practically effective which tries to reform the average citizen against his will. The task of uplifting society is the inner enemy of the law. One of building up the common conscience and the common will to the point where it will react on the social life. That is very different from lobbying measures through legislatures and congresses.

Santa Clara People Will Replace Firs With Prunes

W. L. Coppennell and C. H. Biderback are each planning to plant 25 acres of pruner on their land on the river east, near Santa Clara. The latter has already purchased his trees for this spring's planting, but the former may not get his land cleared in time to plant this year. In order to get his land in shape for planting, Mr. Coppennell has let a contract for removing a number of fir trees along the east side of the highway. This action is expected to call for censure from people who believe that land owned by the state should be kept in a state of ground 50 feet wide on either side of the highway, in order to preserve the scenic beauty.

"Prune trees look better to me than fir," says Mr. Coppennell. "Land taxes are so high that owners can scarcely afford to let ground lie idle."

Linville Says Japs Bring Imitation Booze to State

Washington, Jan. 11.—Japanese rum runners are smuggling imitation Scotch whiskey in along the Oregon coast according to official reports received today by State Prohibition Director Linville on Oregon. The rum ships are protected by wireless messages sent out by the Japanese steamship agency in the U. S. he reported.
