POINCARÉ MINISTRY HAS TEST THURSDAY

Paris, Jan. 16.—The Poincaré ministry, composed entirely of conservatives, will face its first test Thursday. The new cabinet which held its first formal meeting after word had been received that the last doubtful post, that of minister of colonies, had been accepted by Albert Sarraut, now in Washington, decided not to call the chamber of deputies until Thursday.

The government in the meantime, will formulate its policy which will be presented in the chamber of deputies. The Poincaré government, comprised entirely of French nationalists without a single representative of the strong left party, must weather stormy seas if it is to remain in power. The Clemenceau group, which carries on the ideals of the "Tiger," will also be lined up against the new cabinet.

As the World Wags

EVOLUTIONISTS have been the most unimpaired critics of their own hypothesis. While there has been an unceasing but gradually diminishing attack upon the theory by unscientific opponents usually animated by religious or philosophical motives due to the destructive forces of evolution upon the theology and dependent philosophy of what we loosely call orthodox Christianity, it has availed little. But scientists themselves have applied every test to which an inductive theory can be subjected.

THE THEORY STANDS. The evolutionary process of creation is firmly grounded on the logic of facts like the house referred to in the parable "which was built upon the rock." But the creative force of evolution remains shrouded in mystery. In the earlier controversies between the supporters of the evolutionary hypothesis on the one side and the religiousists or theists on the other, both sides seem, in the light of later modifications of the evolutionary hypothesis, to have claimed too much.

RELIGIONISTS said we have the one

and only revealed plan already given to us. God worked thus and so. It is impossible to question the interpretation. Our descendant of anthropoid ape is no man at all. But more modernized minds in the church holding fast to their theistic interpretation of the universe say that evolution is but the method of God revealed to men when they had become sufficiently intelligent to perceive it.

WHILE the religionist has tended to become thus a kind of theistic evolutionist, the evolutionist has gradually approached a similar position as he has gathered and classified the facts which have proved that evolution is the method of development but which point with increasing force to an energy explanation to give reasonableness to the theory. That there is a directive energy flowing through the universe which in its highest manifestations becomes conscious is the conclusion advanced with increasing frequency by many scientific thinkers. Thus in the phrase of a poet, the religionist and the evolutionist may meet on common ground and "Call it Evolution or call it God."

ASTORIA QUARANTINE STATION FOR CATTLE

The second quarantine station for imported cattle in the United States is to be established at the Port of Astoria, Oregon, at the mouth of the Columbia river, an announcement by the federal bureau of animal industry declares. Construction of the station is expected to begin at once, as a number of large importations of Jersey and Guernsey cattle are planned by western dealers who expect to take advantage of the new quarantine establishment.

Heretofore all cattle brought into this country from abroad were landed at Astoria, New Jersey. The fact that they had to be transported overland and then freight rates ran their cost up heavily for western purchasers and proved a depressing influence on the efforts of western stockmen and dairymen to improve their herds.

With a station to be established at Astoria, importations can be made direct from Europe by way of the Panama canal far more cheaply than when the animals were relayed overland by rail. The care which can be given the stock in the quiet southern waters will be an advantage over rail shipping conditions. The shipping connections enjoyed by the Port of Astoria with all parts of the world, and particularly with the British Isles, and the continent, is assurance that adequate transportation will always be available for animals brought in at the new station.

At least one considerable importation is already under way. About 35 head of horses and 100 head of Jerseys and Guernseys are to be imported at once. A. C. Ruby of Portland, Ore., is shipping to Clifford E. Reid of the Great Northwest Livestock association.

Prisoner, Who Escaped Crocker, Was in Portland

Charles Rovers, one of the alleged thieves who stole Dr. Winard's automobile and later escaped from Deputy Sheriff George Crocker at the Southern Pacific depot on New Year's day, has been located at Portland, according to word received at the sheriff's office.

Rovers escaped by twisting a handcuff in two and darting around the train as Crocker and the two prisoners were getting off the train. He carried part of the handcuff with him and this part of the cuff has been found in an apartment at 3504 1/2 East Morrison street in Portland. The handcuff was found in the apartment of a waitress but it is known that Rovers has visited the apartment, according to the information received.

Pajama Clad, Crook Escapes From Custody in Automobile

Chicago, Jan. 16.—Clad only in his pajamas, Walter Wallace, accused of stealing automobiles, escaped from the Cook county hospital by sliding down a rope made out of sheets today.

Wallace, was wounded when he was captured but had about recovered. After reaching the ground, Wallace made his escape in an automobile, in which friends had apparently been waiting for him.

BURCH JURY STILL OUT

Los Angeles, Jan. 16.—The Arthur C. Burch murder jury, out 64 hours, had failed to reach an agreement at 10 a. m. No report whatever was made from the jury room.

Superior Judge Sidney N. Reeve was rumored to be preparing to dismiss the jury because of the apparently hopeless ten to two deadlock.

Poverty of Blacklisted Union Miners Told Harding
Washington, Jan. 16.—Sufferings of the blacklisted union miners of West Virginia were placed before President Harding today by a delegation led by a woman and her two little girls.

Mrs. Alice Underwood, Mahanost, W. Va., a widow and the children shabbily attired and visibly nervous in the presence of the president, told Harding the suffering imposed by blacklisting in the coal fields.

The miners and their families are practically penniless having been out of work for several months, the committee said. Hundreds of men, women and children are clothed in rags and scores are without shoes and most of the children cannot attend school because they lack clothing, Harding was told.

Copper Miners Go Back To Work at Butte Today
Butte, Mont., Jan. 16.—More than 2000 men marched back to work in three copper mines here at 8 o'clock this morning. For the first time since April, 1921, the "dinner bucket brigade" formed about the mine shafts and smelters.

The Anaconda, Butte and Superior, and W. A. Clark mines all employed forces of men on full time.
