New Orleans, La., Jan. 17.—Johnny Wilson, middleweight champion, will be barred from fighting for seven months in sixteen states of the United States and in Australia and Canada, following his suspension late yesterday by the National Boxing Association. The action was taken after Wilson and his manager were charged by L. H. Nighting of Ohio with "conduct unbecoming a fighter and manager." The suspension will be effective until September 22 this year.

Columbus, Jan. 17.—Stanislaus Zbyszko, heavyweight champion wrestler, threw John Olin, the giant Finn, after 20 minutes of grappling here last night.

White Whips Dundee.
Boston, Jan. 17.—Charles White, Chicago, bested Johnny Dundee, New York, in a fast 10-round bout here last night.

Hansen Outpoints Brown.
Philadelphia, Jan. 17.—Jimmy Hanson of Denver outpointed Harry Brown of Philadelphia, in eight rounds here. The men are lightweights.

Ski Experts Enter.
Gary, Ill., Jan. 17.—Over 50 entries have been made in the national ski championship tournament which will be held here Sunday. The entries include international, national and state champions from five states besides scattering entries from Canada, Norway and Sweden.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 17.—Either Sam Langford or Harry Wills will be "knocked out" when they tangle tonight at the Milwaukee arena near here, fans believed today.

**Members of Police Force
Are Accused of Extortion**
Seattle, Jan. 17.—Accused of extorting \$250 from Torao Tanaka, Japanese sporting goods merchant, two members of the police dry squad, a federal prohibition agent and a police interpreter were under arrest today while information was being prepared against them by Prosecuting Attorney Malcomb Douglas. N. J. Stenson, 38, federal prohibition agent, was arrested Monday and released under \$1500 bail.

Ralph Bowen, 41, and Ora R. Bolton, 34, of the police dry squad, were released on their personal recognizance but will each have to post \$1500 bail today. Frank Kato, 40, Japanese interpreter, has been in custody since Saturday.

The arrests were made at the instance of Sheriff Matts Starwick who took up the matter when he was told that one of the men had impersonated a deputy sheriff.

Desiring games with the University of Oregon and the University of California, the Ohio State University basketball team, which is arranging a barnstorming tour of the west, has written to the district agent of the Southern Pacific railroad, The Ohioans have signed up a full schedule for the southwest and California. BANK MESSENGERS SHOT; CASH STOLEN

Chicago, Jan. 17.—Two bank messengers were wounded today in a battle with four bandits, who escaped with a \$12,000 payroll for the Ward Baking Company.

The messengers from the Citizens' Trust and Savings Bank, a southside institution, were enroute to the Ward plant in an automobile when the bandit car pulled up alongside and forced them to turn into the curb and stop.

As the bank car stopped four foreigners jumped from the bandit car and started firing without warning. Anthony Korfoot was shot three times and critically wounded. Joseph Ross was hit in the face by one bullet but was not seriously hurt.

**Parking Corsets Barred
At Sigma Nu House Parties**

Philadelphia.—The "parking" of corsets at college house parties has been put under the ban by the Sigma Nu fraternity, a national organization, with chapters in 87 colleges throughout the United States, meeting in its 20th biennial grand chapter at the Philadelphia hotel.

Discussion of the "corset checkrooms" at dances and house parties was brought up in executive session. Walter E. Myers, regent of the Sigma Nu fraternity, was emphatic in his statements. "There will be no corset checkrooms at Sigma Nu house parties."

"In fact, the young women who become the guests of our undergraduates at house parties and dances are not of the type who would indulge in the atrociously immediate practice of removing their stays."

"Will there be any fraternal action taken against corset checkrooms?" Regent Myers was asked.

"No, sir," Myers replied hotly. "The Sigma Nu fraternity does not need it. Sigma Nu was founded in the south and is schooled in chivalry and love of real womanhood, and such an action would be a reflection on the women of our choice."

The Sigma Nu was given a considerable newspaper space for publication of its declaration against indulgence in "home brew" within the walls of fraternity houses bearing its insignia.

**Demands Impeachment of
Mayor Because of "Deal"**

Seattle, Jan. 17.—Impeachment of Mayor Caldwell and every official who helped pass the \$3,200,000 Skagit contract was demanded by Councilman R. H. Thomson today.

"I believe we made an absolutely illegal deal," Thomson said. "I will vote for the impeachment of the mayor and any member of the city council or board of public works who helped carry it through."

Thomson's statement followed the action of the council in refusing to probe the mayor's charges that the city had been beaten out of \$100,000 by Seattle's "inner bond ring."

**Night and Day Bank Cashier
Arrested; Out on Big Bond**

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 17.—Arthur O. Melinger, cashier of the Night and Day bank who disappeared following the closing of the bank by state bank examiners who discovered an alleged shortage of \$75,000, was arrested in Belleville, Ill., and brought to St. Louis today. He was released on \$20,000 bond.

Highway Material Dealers Expect Road Building Boom

Chicago, Jan. 17.—The United States stands at the dawn of the greatest road building era in its history.

The nation will soon have the finest and most extensive system of highways the world has ever known.

This is the belief of the road builders who attended the National Asphalt association congress here today.

Nearly \$1,250,000,000 is available under federal, state and county appropriations, tax levies and bond issues, for road work this year, according to J. E. Pennypacker, former chief of the United States bureau of public roads, now secretary of the National Asphalt association.

Over 700,000 men will be employed in road construction and patrol work this year, he states. In addition 200,000 more men will be employed in the road machinery manufacturing plants and in the material plants.

**La Follette's Enemies Wish
Him Expelled from G. O. P.**

Washington, Jan. 17.—Expulsion of Senator Robert M. La Follette, Wisconsin, from the republican party, is being sought by his political and personal enemies.
